

MANY SCHOOL DISTRICTS FORMED

IN COUNTIES OF TERRITORY WHERE IMMIGRATION WAS HEAVY—REPORTS RECEIVED BY SUPT. HADLEY.

The desk of Professor Hiram Hadley, superintendent of public instruction, at the Capitol building in Santa Fe, is literally loaded down with the voluminous reports from the various county superintendents of schools. There are many noticeable things in the reports. The most striking, however, is the increase of new school districts caused by immigration during the past year in some counties. Thus far, Roosevelt county leads with sixteen new school districts established. Quay county is a close second with twelve new school districts, while Torrance county has three districts established since a year ago and is preparing to establish several more. Some of these districts have no school houses as yet, but school is being held. Others have temporary structures while a number have good comfortable buildings. In many districts the reports show that the new immigrants with commendable spirit have issued bonds with which to erect school houses.

A very striking feature of the reports, however, is the number of errors in simple addition. Some of the superintendents show impossible balances and their reports contain glaring miscalculations. In cases where such errors are not too striking, the reports are being corrected, and but some of them will have to be returned to the compilers in order to have the corrections made.

SOME DON'TS FOR AGENTS

PASSENGER MAN HANDS OUT RULES FOR LOSING JOBS UNDER NEW LAW.

In consideration of the provisions of the new rate law, and especially the anti-pass clause, it is suggested by a general passenger agent that railroad men adopt the following don'ts for their future guidance and conduct:

Don't shake hands with anybody your motives may be misconstrued.

Don't ask a friend or stranger to have a drink; you may be after trade.

Don't mention a pass; you may be talking to a spotter.

Don't be a good fellow; you may be reported.

Don't be sociable; you should assume a grumpy attitude.

Don't go after freight; make the shipper come to you.

To these his official adds: "Follow these rules, which the new rate bill fosters, and you will soon be looking for another job."

SEBASTIAN PRAISES THE SANTA FE ROAD

John Sebastian of the Rock Island who passed through Newton the other day had this to say about the Santa Fe road and train 116 on which he was traveling:

"In all my experience as a railway man in the west, I have never traveled over a more perfect roadbed than the Santa Fe from Fort Worth to Wichita, and I must certainly take off my hat to the men who have put it in such splendid condition. At different places between stations, we made time that exceeded the famous Scott special which made the record run from Los Angeles to Chicago last fall. I have never seen a better equipped train that the one on which I am now traveling. It would be pleased to stop off and remain in Wichita a day, but cannot spare the time."

The branch store of Gross, Kelly & Co., at Vaughn, N. M., where the Santa Fe cut-off crosses the El Paso & Southwestern railway, has been sold to the contracting firm of Langtry, Sharpe & Co., who will run it until their work is done; after which it will be discontinued and a new town will probably be started near Bonita canyon.

H. F. Stanley has met with a serious accident. While coupling cars at Kanabek, Ill., his right hand was caught and crushed so that amputation was necessary. Mr. Stanley spent last winter in El Paso.

The late congestion of freight traffic on the Mexican Central is reported to be relieved, and the trains are now leaving on schedule time.

The Mexican Central is planning to replace a number of wooden bridges on the Chichauhua division with iron structures.

HERE ARE SOME CIVIL SERVICE SITUATIONS

The demand for civil service employees of all kinds is constantly on the increase. The commission has announced the following examinations to be held during the coming month:

On November 10, for the position of logger for the San Juan agency, New Mexico, pay \$55 a month; marine fireman, quartermaster's department at large, San Francisco, salary \$900 a year; repair man for the weather bureau, for duty on the Port Crescent, Tatoosh Island, Washington, telegraph line, pay \$750 a year; wagon-maker in the Haskell, Kas., institute, pay \$750 a year. On November 14, for railway mail clerk, fourteen vacancies, one of which is in Arizona; for interpreter of Arabic and Greek in the immigration service at El Paso, salary, \$1200 a year; for electrician in quartermaster's department at large, San Francisco, for duty at Fort D. A. Russell, Wyo. On November 21 for expert lock fitter in mail lock repair shop, postoffice department, Washington, D. C., \$3.25 a day. November 20, 21 and 22, for architectural draftsman, junior architectural draftsman, engineer draftsman, electrical engineer and draftsman, heating and ventilating engineer and draftsman in supervising architect's office and junior architectural draftsman in the bureau of animal industry. The salaries in these positions range from \$480 to \$1800 a year. November 31 and December 1, assistant and teacher in the Philippines service. Most of these examinations may be taken in Albuquerque. Further information regarding all of them may be secured on application to the secretary of the local board at the post-office.

ESCAPED JAIL BIRD BEHIND THE BARS

JOSE S. BACA, WHO FLED FROM BERNALILLO COUNTY, CAUGHT BY MOUNTED POLICEMAN.

A message to Captain Fred Fornoff at Santa Fe yesterday, conveyed the information that Jose S. Baca, who served three terms in the territorial penitentiary, and who escaped from the Bernalillo county jail while awaiting a fourth sentence for cattle stealing, about a year ago, is again behind the bars. Baca was run to cover and arrested by Mounted Policeman Rafael Gomez, who has been after him for weeks. Baca was found in the mountains of McKinley county, living from hand to mouth and keeping always in secluded districts, to avoid detection. His reputation as a bad man prevented his betrayal by the people of the district. Details of the arrest have not been received.
