HORRORS OF AN ARIZONA SNOW

Storm and the Awful Experience of a Mining Man in Escaping Death.

About 1 p. m. last Monday Alex. Ratcliff, the well known mining man, started from Prescott in a livery rig for Maxton, says the Prescott Courier. He arrived there just before dark, found that he could get no lodging for his team, and started for Walker. When he reached the top of the divide, a howling blizzard was raging, the cold was biting and he could not see his hand before him in the driving snow. His wet clothing quickly became a sheet of rattling ice, and his gloves were frozen stiff to his hands. Ever then, he says, he would have gotten through all right but one of his horses floundered and fell in the snow, the other became entangled, and he was so near frozen that he could not get them up. He had only the use of one hand. With this he drew his knife from his pocket, opened the blade with his teeth, cut the harness from the horses, and they were thus enabled to get up and move off. They would have frozen to death had he left them.

Then, partly walking, crawling and dragging himself, he made his way to his cabin, 500 yards distant, found the door locked, broke open the window and piled himself head-first through it. He had plenty of bedding and crawled into it, where he remained for two days and a half before he was discovered.

There was no water in the cabin and he ate snow to quench his thirst; there was plenty of food, but he ate nothing. He made no fire, for the reason that there was a cap on the chimney top to keep out the snow and the rain; and as the door was locked, he could not get out to remove it.

When discovered, he rode a horse to Maxton, and from there took the stage to Prescott, arriving here Thursday. He is now confined to his room in the Scovel block. His feet and left hand are slightly frozen, while his right hand is badly frozen, the ends of the fingers of which hand may have to be taken off.

His experience was certainly a terrible one, and a very unusual one for this section of the country. When the Courier man visited him yesterday, he was eating his dinner, and evidently with a keen appetite. The horses were found all right.

ISLAND OF SMOKE AND FLAMES ARISES FROM NORTHERN SEAS

Nome, Alaska, Jan. 5.—A great, smoking island, cast up by some powerful subterranean force, has been discovered by the crew of the "Perry," which has been cruising in the Behring Sea. This new island, which has been named "Perry," is situated about 45 miles southeast of Dutch Harbor, Alaska. It is a mass of lava, 500 feet high, 1000 feet in length at its base and a little more than half as wide. At the time the island was discovered a tremendous cloud of vapor and smoke hovered about it. The water for several miles about boiled and bubbled like a seething cauldron, and close approach was impossible. As soon as the surrounding water cooled sufficiently to allow a visit to the new island, a party of five officers landed from the steamer "Perry," made a survey of the island and sent an official report of their findings to the proper authorities at Washington, D. C. The island of Perry is serrated with huge crevices and fissures, from which issue constant streams of sulphurous smoke.

MARKET LETTER

Special Correspondence. Kansas City Stock Yards, Jan. 7.—The cattle market has been strong and healthy lately, under moderate receipts and a good demand, until today. The run last week was less than 40,000 head, and all kinds made a small gain, stockers and feeders doing the best, gaining 5 to 15 cents. Today the supply is 21,000 head, with heavy supplies of feed stuff elsewhere, and the market on fed cattle 5c to 15c lower; stock grades and feeders steady to a shade lower. The bulk of the supply today is stockers and feeders, which branch of the trade has been in the best condition lately, and better able to stand a heavy run. Panhandle and Colorado offerings are very scarce today, but there are two trains of New Mexicans here. These were composed of high-grade feeders mainly, weighing close 900 pounds, black cattle selling at \$4.45, and reds at \$4.25. The market on country kinds is now at the best point touched this winter. Top fed steers are selling at \$5.90 to \$6.25; medium-class fed steers, \$4.85 to \$5.50. Colder weather and normal receipts will soon put the cattle market on a firm basis, as the decline today is because of the heavy run at all points. The sheep supply last week was 29,000 head, market averaging about steady, but with weaker indications. The supply today is 5,500 head; market on wethers nearly steady, ewes 5c lower, lambs 10c to 15c lower. One lot of 47-pound lambs from Monte Vista sold at \$7.10 today against \$7.20 for the same stuff Friday, while 114-pound Kansas fed western wethers
