HAWLEY DENOUNCED AS "HIRED MAN" AND "A TOOL"

to end. There is nothing at all left in the evidence without him."

Denounced Hawley.

Darrow launched into a lengthy, bitter, vituperative denunciation of Attorney James H. Hawley, leading counsel for the state, assailing him as "a hired man" acting by no other name than to get the money of the state of Idaho, that he might build another addition to his house, and saying he had been a friend of labor organizations as he proclaimed only when they got the cash to his office first.

He said Hawley had "Orcharditis," or "Orcharditis" might be the better term.

"Borah is Slicker."

Darrow dismissed Borah with a few words. "I don't mean to intimate," he declared, "that Senator Borah is any more honest than Hawley, but I do believe he is slicker."

He said that he believed Borah was as overcome with the truthfulness of Orchard's story as was Hawley.

Hawley would have you believe that Orchard can not lie since he got religion. I shall have something to say as to that religion later on, but what I want to say now is that if he had not got religion, he had better get it if there is any left after Orchard got his."

Orchard's Sins and Crimes.

Darrow declared that Orchard had been so contradicted that there was no truth left in his story. He said that it would be a disgrace to the state of Idaho to convict a man on such testimony. He reviewed the crimes confessed by Orchard and said that each one showed the man to be a sneaking, craven coward, who had never taken a chance that would endanger his miserable hide.

"It is logical," he argued, "that Orchard should now turn to lying to save his neck."

Turning to Orchard's religious conversion he declared that "before Dean Hicks, the religious advisor, had persuaded him to lay his sins on Jesus, he was a scoundrel, the detective, had persuaded him to lay his crimes on Hayward, Moyer and Pettibone."

Work Will Go On.

Darrow declared that once before in his life Orchard had been converted and had become superintendent of a Sunday school, and he could not see that the second dose would be better than the first.

In closing for the morning Darrow exclaimed, "you men of the prosecution, you men of the Mine Owners' association, you men who are seeking the life of Hayward, don't be so foolish as to suppose that you will strangle W. H. Hahn and Federal of Bill Hayward's neck. When he is gone, millions of other willing hands will carry on his work to a victory in the mine."

Darrow will continue at 6 o'clock this evening and will conclude tomorrow.

ONE CHILD FOUND, OTHER STILL LOST

Bloodhound Did Valuable Service in Discovering Little Wanderer at Cerrillos.

Santa Fe, July 24.—(Special).—One of the two Italian boys who wandered away from their homes at Cerrillos in the southern part of the county Monday afternoon, was found late last night three miles from that place, but no trace of the other has been discovered.

With his trailing bloodhounds did excellent work in aiding in the search. The boy who was found last night is in a badly emaciated condition from thirst and hunger and nearly dead from exposure.

It is now believed that the other lad is dead as he could hardly have survived this long and there is some danger that he may have fallen into some deep hole and perished. The boys were six and five years of age respectively, the eldest being the one recovered.

FAIR ADVERTISING CAR WILL LEAVE ON AUGUST 21

Will Make Much More Extended Tour Than Last Year.

The advertising car for the territorial fair will start on its tour of the southwest on August 21. It will be in charge of Mr. Mitchell, who is well up on all the ways and means of exploiting big events. A great mass of attractive lithographs have been ordered by the fair association, and beside carrying this, the car will have a large stock of signs, dodgers, banners and other advertising matter.

This advertising matter will be posted in all towns on the railroads from El Paso on the south to Trinidad on the north and as far west as Ash Fork, Ariz.

The car itself, which is to be supplied and carried free by the Santa Fe Railroad company, will be a big advertisement for the fair. It will be suitably decorated to let the curious know what is its mission.

In the trip of the car twenty more towns will be visited this year than last and considerably more paper will be put out. It is the intention of the fair officials to advertise the big fair thoroughly, making use of every fence and bill board in the two territories for the purpose if necessary.

In addition to the paper to be distributed by the fair association, there will be the advertising printed by the Santa Fe railroad which will be scattered broadcast. Advertisements also are now appearing in the various newspapers of the southwest.
