COTTON CONSUMPTION OF UNITED STATES

Washington, D. C., Sept. 24.—The census bureau reported today that for the year ending August 31st last, 5,296,783 running bales of cotton were taken by American manufacturers as compared with 4,820,990 for last year, and 4,987,071 bales were consumed as compared with 4,094,479 last year. The manufacturers' stock at the close of the year was 996,279 bales as compared with 688,312 last year. The active cotton spindles numbered 2,242,407 as compared with 25,259,096 last year.
