DEATH OF CAPTAIN NORDSTROM.

A Gallant Soldier, An Affectionate Husband and Father and a Faithful Friend Has Gone to His Reward.

Captain Charles E. Nordstrom, of the Tenth United States Cavalry, on detailed service in this city as agent for the Pueblo and Jicarilla Apache Indians, died at his home in Santa Fe this morning at 5 o'clock of heart failure superinduced by chronic kidney trouble.

Captain Nordstrom was born in Perry, Maine, on January 25, 1842. His father was a ship owner and young Nordstrom went to sea as a boy, and finally drifted into the navy, where he served for two years. He then went into the army.

Appended is the official army record of this gallant soldier: Captain Nordstrom entered the army as private in the same regiment August 29, 1860. He served faithfully with his regiment during many Indian campaigns in Texas, Arizona, New Mexico and the Dakotas, and made an excellent record as an officer.

He was detailed as agent for the Pueblo and Jicarilla agencies on April 1, 1867, relieving Major John L. Bullis, and has served as such with great credit and ability up to the time of his untimely demise.

Seven ugly scars on his body bear mute yet eloquent testimony to the perilous service he passed through during the civil war. Two of these scars are upon the head and were caused by saber cuts inflicted in the battle of the Wilderness. He was a prisoner at Belle Island for nine months, and while being transferred from the prison named to Andersonville, he and another prisoner jumped from a moving train. Captain Nordstrom's associate was shot and killed, but he made good his escape and finally reached the Union lines.

Captain Nordstrom was happily married at San Antonio, Tex., in 1883, to Maria Ursula Dwyer, and besides his widow, leaves two beautiful daughters, Anna Francis and Maria Ursula, to mourn the loss of an affectionate and indulgent father. He leaves \$10,000 life insurance and other property to his bereaved wife and children.

His death is profoundly and sincerely deplored by all who knew him. The funeral will take place at the family home on Hillside avenue at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon under the auspices of the Grand Army of the Republic and the body will be buried with military honors in the National cemetery.

AMIZETT GOLD MINES.

Alex. Gusdorf, One of the Fortunate Owners of the Valuable Shoshone Group, Has Reason to Be Elated.

Mr. Alex. Gusdorf, who has been actively engaged in business at Taos for about 30 years, enjoys the distinction of having built and operated the first modern flouring mill in that fertile and prosperous locality, and who is recognized in the business circles of the territory as a man of uncommon energy and enterprise, has been visiting his relatives and friends in Santa Fe for several days and naturally paid a welcome visit to the NEW MEXICAN editorial room.

In addition to his general merchandise business at Taos, Mr. Gusdorf is associated as an equal partner with his brother, Guston, in the ownership and development of the valuable Shoshone group of five gold claims, situated six miles above Amizett, in Taos county, and his evident and comfortable confidence that these claims will soon become large and regular producers of the much coveted yellow stuff is shared by all who are familiar with the facts.

In response to leading questions of a NEW MEXICAN scribe, Mr. Gusdorf said: "My brother and myself have had faith in the value of the Shoshone group ever since we began the development of the same, and every foot of work we have done has strengthened our confidence in the success of our undertaking. Our main shaft is now down 115 feet and we have drifted about 300 feet on the vein, mainly from the 100-foot level, and the ore body steadily improves in appearance."

"We supposed at one time," continued Mr. Gusdorf, "that we had found both wells and that our vein of mineralized quartz was five feet wide, but further work has disclosed the fact that we have not reached the hanging wall. We now have eight feet of ore, measuring from the vein and perfectly defined foot-wall, and we do not know how much further we will have to cross-cut to reach the hanging wall. Our rich streak varies in width from 14 to 24 inches. From this we shipped a carload of ore to Pueblo that yielded \$69.88 in gold and a yield of \$100.00 in the vein runs from \$20 to \$25 in gold and about 3 per cent copper."

"We are now working four men in the mine, with one man on top to run the winch and do the cooking, and my brother, Gerson, who is in charge of the work, expects to be up there. Our plan is to block out enough ore during the winter so that we can begin shipping from two to three carloads of ore per week in the spring."

"The formation is porphyry and quartzite. Our foot-wall is porphyry. Our vein has struck up and down fully as we have gone down and is now almost perpendicular with a slight dip toward the east."

"Our freight rate to Pueblo is \$6 per ton. What we need is a smelter or chlorination works on the ground and the work, upon completion, could be mined and treated at a profit. Preliminary to this we shall undertake to put in a concentrating plant during the coming summer. Owing to the presence of copper ore cannot be treated by the cyanide process."

"I am happy to say in reply to your last question," added the gentleman, "that we are not afflicted with a land grant controversy. Our properties are located on the public domain and hence our titles are perfect."

Numerous Motions Disposed of in the Territorial Supreme Court—Work in the District Courts.

In the Territorial Supreme court yesterday afternoon, a full bench being present, motions were disposed of as follows:

1. Wormser & Co., plaintiffs in error, vs. S. Lindner, defendant in error; motion for rehearing overruled.

Raton Water Works company vs. Town of Raton; motion for rehearing overruled.

Motions for rehearing were overruled in the cases of John Boyle, Jr., vs. Mountain Key Mining Company, New Mexico National Bank vs. George L. Brooks, Lincoln-Lucky-Lee Mining Company vs. A. M. Hendry, Wellington A. Givens vs. J. D. W. Veeder and Bessie Barnett vs. Joseph Barnett.

W. P. Cunningham, sheriff and Mandell Bros. vs. L. D. Sugar; motion for rehearing overruled; motion to retax costs will be heard orally.

George W. Witt et al., appellees, vs. G. Cuneod, appellant; motion for a rehearing overruled, except that the appeal bond should be so amended as only to cover the costs.

The Santa Fe Gas & Electric Company and Santa Fe Electric Company; motion for a rehearing denied, except that the appeal bond should be amended so as only to cover costs.

Horse Springs Cattle company vs. J. W. Schofield et al.; motion for rehearing overruled.

United States of America vs. Frank Lesnet et al.; motion to modify judgment overruled.

In the cases of Bessie Barnett vs. Joseph Barnett, Rio Grande Irrigation & Colonization Company vs. C. H. Gilchrist, and Eberle vs. Carmichael, prayers for appeal to the United States Supreme court were granted. The last two cases were erroneously taken up on writ of error.

The application of Samuel E. Black for admission to the bar was referred to the standing committee on admissions, consisting of Messrs. Bartlett, Collier, Jones, Freeman and Newcomb.

The New Mexico Supreme court met this morning at 10 o'clock in the chambers of the United States district judge, in the federal building, a full bench being present, with the exception of Judge Crumpacker.

Two cases of the United States, plaintiff in error, vs. the Denver & Rio Grande Railroad company, defendant in error, alleged timber trespass, were continued.

The motion to retax the costs in Cunningham vs. Sugar was argued and taken under advisement.

The court met at 2:30 p. m. for the purpose of handing down opinions.

Territorial District Court.

In the case of the Territory vs. Francisco Romero, indicted for assault and battery, the jury brought in a verdict of acquittal about 9 o'clock last night.

The case of the Territory vs. Luis Gonzales, indicted for a larceny of a Navajo blanket from Mrs. Garland, was tried before a jury this forenoon. The jury is now out.

United States District Court.

Owing to Judge Laughlin's urgent engagements in the Supreme court and the Territorial District court, no cases have so far been tried in the United States district court. The grand jury, however, is actively at work.
