THE JUDICIAL MILLS.

After Disposing of Important Business, the Supreme Court has Adjourned—Convictions in District Court.

The New Mexico Supreme court, Chief Justice Smith presiding and Associate Justices Laughlin, Hamilton and Bantz being present, concluded the work of the last July term at the federal building yesterday evening.

Appeals to the United States Supreme court were granted in the following cases: Raton Water Works Company vs. Town of Raton; Santa Fe Gas & Electric Company vs. Santa Fe Electric Company vs. Charles C. Hitchcock and Horse Springs Cattle Company vs. J. W. Schellkopf, receiver.

Rehearings were granted in the appended cases: Wells, Fargo & Co., appellee, vs. William A. Walker; Henry Lockhart, plaintiff in error, vs. J. Q. Wills et al., defendants in error.

In the case of M. W. Flournoy, appellant, vs. Bullock, Baker & Co. and Geo. W. Chambliss, reversed and set down the opinion of the court, reversing the judgment of the lower court and remanding the cause for a new trial. Chief Justice Smith and Associate Justices Hamilton and Laughlin concurred. The appellant was given judgment for the accrued costs.

In the matter of the Denver & Rio Grande Railroad company, plaintiff in error, vs. the United States of America, defendant in error, one of the three causes for timber trespass wherein the lower court awarded damages to the government, the motion to dismiss the writ of error and affirm the judgment of the court below was denied in an opinion by Chief Justice Smith, concurred in by Associate Justices Hamilton and Bantz.

In re Pedro Perera, administrator, appellee, vs. George W. Harrison, administrator, et al., appellants, reversed and remanded by the United States Supreme court, the decree of the Territorial Supreme court of August 26, 1905, was modified to conform to the judgment of the court of last resort. As a result of this action, Dr. Harrison paid into court \$20,306.35 in settlement of his administration of the estate of Jose L. Perera and the money has since been paid over to the attorney of Pedro Perera.

Territorial District Court.

In the case of the Territory vs. Luis Gonzales, indicted for larceny, the jury last evening returned a verdict finding the defendant guilty as charged.

The case of the Territory vs. Felix Crespin, indicted for assault with intent to commit rape, was tried before a jury yesterday afternoon. The jury returned a verdict of guilty this morning.

After a brief session of the Supreme court this afternoon, for the purpose of formally closing the term, the trial of the Territory vs. Ignacio Garcia, indicted for wife murder, was commenced in the District court.

The Bitner Theatre Company will play a return engagement at the Santa Fe Opera House for three nights, commencing January 13, 1908.

The marriage of Mr. E. H. Salazar to Miss Apolonia Serrano is announced, to take place in the cathedral at Las Vegas on Tuesday, January 18. Mr. Salazar is the editor of El Independiente in Las Vegas, and is well known in this city. The New Mexican extends congratulations.

Until a successor as Pueblo Indian agent is named, Mr. J. T. Newhall, who was clerk at the agency under the late Captain Nordstrom, will remain in charge of the agency and the government property, according to instructions sent by Commissioner of Indian Affairs Jones to Mr. Newhall.

This afternoon Mr. Abe Gold sent 50 men to Flagstaff, A. T., where they will work on a tie contract for the Southern Pacific road. The men were in charge of Mr. C. W. Kennedy, the contractor. A similar party will leave on Saturday for Arizona to work on the contract.

FUNERAL OF CAPTAIN NORDSTROM.

Very Largely Attended This Afternoon Under Auspices of Grand Army of the Republic—Suitable Military Honors.

The funeral of the late Captain Charles E. Nordstrom, of the Tenth United States cavalry and agent of the Pueblo and Jicarilla Indians, at Santa Fe, was largely attended from the family residence on Hillside avenue at 2 o'clock this afternoon.

The funeral was impressively conducted in conformity with the ritual of the Grand Army of the Republic, of which organization the deceased was an active and honored member. The body of the gallant soldier was buried in the National cemetery, Tenth cavalry, military honors due this rank, his long service and brilliant career.

The following orders were issued yesterday afternoon: Captain T. J. Matthews, Company B, First Infantry, U. S. Army, Fe. N. M. Santa Fe, N. M., Jan. 11, 1908.—Captain: You will please report your company at 1:30 p. m., January 12, properly equipped for escort duty, at the funeral of Captain C. E. Nordstrom, Tenth cavalry, U. S. army, and furnish music for the ceremony.

The band should report at the late residence of the deceased at 1:30 p. m., January 12. Very respectfully, H. B. HERSEY, Adjutant General.

In compliance with the above orders company B, First Infantry, New Mexico National Guards, Captain Matthews commanding, acted as an escort of honor, and the First regimental band provided music suitable to the solemn occasion.

The local cavalry troop and artillery squad also attended the funeral in bodies.

Besides the comrades of the Grand Army of the Republic and the local military organizations, the funeral was generally attended by the United States, territorial, county and city officials and representative citizens.

The officers of the Tenth cavalry, ordered by telegram from the Clarendon garden beautiful floral tributes to be placed upon the casket of their loved companion in arms as a last mark of respect and esteem. They were a superb casket-crest of white and pink roses, carnations, hyacinths and choice hot-house flowers, and a beautiful white wreath adorned with American beauty roses. The order for flowers was wired by Lieutenant M. H. Barnum, adjutant of the Tenth cavalry.

Governor Otero, who is suffering from a severe cold, was prevented from attending the funeral of the late Captain C. E. Nordstrom.

The procession to the National cemetery was one of the longest and most imposing ever witnessed in the city. It was preceded by the military band followed by the infantry company. Then came the body of a caisson, with the pall bearers walking on either side. Following next in order were the members of Clarendon post, G. A. R., the cavalry and artillery companies, and a long line of carriages.

PROSPEROUS UNION COUNTY.

A Boom Has Struck Northeastern New Mexico, the People Have Money and the Prospects for the Coming Year Are Very Bright.

Hon. Olin E. Smith, of Clayton, district attorney for Union and Colfax counties, was in the city on legal business, and in a conversation with a representative of the New Mexican yesterday said:

"Clayton is growing rapidly, and the first boom the town ever had is on. In the past year we have gained 100 per cent in population, and buildings are going up in every part of the place. Some of the buildings in course of construction are a \$16,000 stone hotel, eight or ten new residences, and a Catholic church and a convent will soon be established. An electric light plant has been ordered and will be in running order within 60 days. Sheriff Gallegos and Mr. Luis F. Garcia have organized a bank under the territorial laws, with a capital stock of \$65,000, which will be doing business in the course of three months. The capital stock has been subscribed and the business arrangements are being pushed to completion as rapidly as possible.

"The sheep and cattlemen of the county have done well the past year. The range in Union county is acknowledged to be one of the finest in the territory, and there will be more stock on the plains the coming year than for years past. The Matoro Cattle company is putting 5,000 head of cattle on the ranges near Clayton, and rangers are coming in from the Panhandle country in Texas with thousands more. There are already 300,000 head of sheep in the county, and that number will be largely increased in the spring.

"Union county is in the most prosperous condition it has ever been. The people have plenty of money and are planning to make more. I can safely say that prosperity has arrived in Union county, and no one is making any objections to the turn for the better."
