VISITORS FROM OMAHA.

Distinguished Nebraskans Spend the Day in Santa Fe—Entertained by Secretary Wallace.

General C. F. Manderson, general solicitor of the Burlington road, and a former senator from Nebraska, accompanied by his sister, Mrs. Evans, Mrs. Gannett, and Mr. and Mrs. Wallace, arrived in the city this morning in the general manager's private car. The party left Omaha, March 3, and are now en route home from a pleasure trip to Pacific coast points. They were the guests of Secretary Wallace today and were shown about the city. General Manderson is related to Secretary Wallace and has a tender spot in his heart for New Mexico in general and Santa Fe in particular. He made a visit to the city ten years ago, while acting in the capacity of a member of the territorial committee in the United States senate, and does not now consider himself a stranger in these parts. General Manderson expressed himself as highly pleased with the numerous improvements noticeable in Santa Fe, but regretted the abandonment of Fort Marcy. During his previous visit to the city the officers at the fort tendered him a brilliant reception and bestowed many marks of courtesy on the young Nebraska statesman who evinced such deep interest in the welfare of New Mexico.

The party paid their respects to Governor Otero and remarked that they were sorry that a lack of time necessitated their return home without the pleasure of visiting the Indian pueblos and investigating some of the mineral resources of the region. Mr. Wallace, who is an Omaha banker, expressed pleasure that New Mexicans were taking the proper steps to represent their manifold resources at the Transmississippi exposition. The party will leave for Omaha this evening at 9:40.

Death of an old Timer.

Albert G. T. Jacobs died this morning at 3 o'clock after an illness of about three weeks. He was a member of Paradise lodge No. 2, I. O. O. F. of this city, and also an elected member of Carleton Post, G. A. R., but was taken sick before being mustered in. His army record from the books of the adjutant general's office show that he was a private in company G, First California Cavalry, of Nevada City, Calif., mustered in the United States service, May 1, 1863; mustered out at Fort Sumner, N. M., on April 18, 1866, at the expiration of enlistment. At the time of his death he was engaged as a Spanish mission in company G, First California Cavalry. The funeral will take place tomorrow at 2 p. m. at the Methodist church, under the auspices of the local Odd Fellows, assisted by the G. A. R., and Dr. Thomas Harwood assisted by the pastor and Revs. A. Hoffman and J. B. Sanchez, to which all his friends are given a cordial invitation. The interment will be at the National cemetery.

Where is the Police Force?

About midnight Saturday, as Moses White, Will and George Parsons were going home, they were halted by three men, while going along the "cut-off" back of Dr. Diaz' office, and peremptorily ordered to stop. The boys failed to stop for obvious reasons, and were treated to a shower of rocks and clubs. U. S. weather bureau forecast for New Mexico: Fair tonight and Tuesday. The band boys were out today hustling up the business men on their subscriptions. It cost a man \$100 to attempt to kiss a Santa Fe girl the other day. She was very dear to him. Anthony Windsor began work on the foundation for the new building at the sanitarium this morning. Another Raymond-Whitcomb excursion train, consisting of two Pullman sleepers and a dining car, passed through the city Saturday evening en route to Los Angeles. When called on to join in a song at a party the other night, a Santa Fe man remarked seriously: "I really haven't sung any since I got married." Another horrible example.

There are a number of ugly and dangerous holes in the streets that should be repaired at once. These holes have been holes for some time past, and they do not grow smaller as time passes. J. E. Hurley, division superintendent of the Santa Fe, has arranged with the governor of Isleta pueblo to have all the Indians in that pueblo kept at home, until all contagious diseases among them have been stamped out.

Last night a number of inmates in the city jail sprung the doors of that institution and escaped. The roll called showed four prisoners missing, and the five remaining were taken to the county jail for safe keeping.

Joe Perez, who was confined in the county jail, jumped from the wall of that institution last night in an attempt to escape. The jailer corralled the young man just as he was climbing the gate leading from Beatty's yard to the street, and re-assisted him to the confines of the bastille.

Can it be that in the intense excitement of the coming municipal election the city authorities have lost the sprinkling wagon in some of the dark lantern meetings held the past week? The question is somewhat difficult to answer, but the fact that the sprinkler is lost is written on the faces of pedestrians, in the dust that settles thereon from the streets.

Late Saturday afternoon a number of Republicans held a meeting for the purpose of talking over matters involved in the coming city election. The meeting was not of a public nature, and because the results of the conference are not known by everybody on the streets, many rumors are afloat which are erroneous. The only thing positively known is that Captain Hudson was requested to make the race for mayor on the Republican ticket. The captain has the matter under consideration, and if assurances are given him that the rest of the ticket will be composed of substantial citizens, he may accept.

Members of Carleton post G. A. R., and other veterans will unite tomorrow with the parade of the Odd Fellows, in paying the last tribute of respect to Albert G. T. Jacobs.

The ball game on the college grounds yesterday between the Santa Fe Juniors and the College Browns resulted in a victory for the former. Score 13 to 12.

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NEW MEXICO MINING NEWS.

The past week at Bland was one of surprising activity. New strikes in Peralta canon, and general prospecting and development work indicates that the determination to open a new El Dorado in the southwest is infecting every visitor to the region. Bland has a building boom on, and the sounds of hammer and saw occasion an industrial hum familiar to the ear of those who have resided in Colorado cities during the early days. The Bland mill was closed temporarily last week to put in machinery for the wet process. It has been demonstrated, beyond doubt, that the ores of the district can be treated at a profit. The intelligence that two telephone and telegraph lines are being built into the district has had the effect of stimulating work to a great extent. That Bland has a great future in store for her is no longer questioned and the ensuing year will launch the district into the mining world as a steady and profitable producer.

Bland Mining Notes.

The ore in the St. Patrick in Peralta canon is steadily improving in value as depth is gained.

The force on the Albemarle is being increased.

It is estimated that the Albemarle has a three years' supply of ore on hand.

H. Clausen is sinking the shaft on the Julia, in Colla canon.

The Lone Star is shipping regularly to the Bland mill.

Over 20 small mining properties are being developed.

Peralta canon claim owners are pushing work on their properties.

Extensive development on the Ermine, in Colla canon, will soon be started by Hoffman & Rhodes. The property shows a four-foot vein.

The Bruce & Wilson contract on the Crown Point is nearly completed. When Mr. Posey takes charge he will conduct the operations on the property on an extensive scale.

General Mining.

Work on the I Own tunnel at Red River has been temporarily discontinued.

The Mallette property at Red River is showing up some fine free gold specimens.

R. Wheeler is doing development work on the extension of the I Own tunnel at Red River.

H. B. Tompkins is down 35 feet on his Black Mountain property near Red River. A four foot vein is disclosed which pans well.

A number of Colorado Springs machinists are pushing work on the Hematite custom mill.

Former employes on the Midnight, situated in the La Belle district, are endeavoring to secure a lease from the Ohio owners of the property. They demand an option clause of \$30,000, and offer to pay 15 per cent royalty on the ores mined.

Henry Young, of Cerro, sent out ore samples from his claim at Red River to the assayer last week, and received a return of \$500 per ton.

H. Buell has located a claim on Comanche creek, near Elizabethtown, which pans free gold.

It is said that Thomas A. Edison is experimenting with Red River ores and will visit the section in the near future.

Several applications for final survey and patent have been made by the La Belle mine owners.

Erick Anderson, John Johnson and Pete Larson report \$100 ore in their Elizabethtown property.

The troubles of the Black Copper Mining company have been settled and work on the property resumed. Three shafts are working in the cross-cut tunnel.

O. L. Perry will ship 100 tons of ore from his East End mountain property to the north smelter at San Pedro.

Andy Anderson was hurt last week in the Ortiz mine at Dolores by a rock falling on him. He will be laid up several weeks.

Thomas Brown, of Atlanta, Ga., is a new assayer and chemist at the Brown smelter in San Pedro.

M. E. Becker, operating near Albuquerque, shipped six tons of ore to the Mary smelter at Cerrillos last week for test. It returned 60 per cent lead, 35 in gold and \$3 silver.

The Ortiz mine at Dolores is equipped with a 100-horse power boiler and engine. This mine is now producing 50 tons of ore per day, producing two mills with the product. Concentrators will be placed in the mills shortly.

A new shaft is being sunk on the Shoshone property at Dolores. At a 20-foot depth the shaft shows four feet of mineral.
