IMMIGRATION ENTERPRISES.

Secretary Miller Reports That the New Mexico Bureau of Immigration is Receiving Many Inquiries from Home-seekers—What the Bureau is Doing.

Hon. Lorion Miller, secretary of the bureau of immigration, returned to his headquarters in Albuquerque last night, after a most pleasant and apparently profitable visit with Santa Fe friends. But the gentleman was not permitted to leave the capital city until he had confronted and satisfied one of the animated interrogation points of the ever alert NEW MEXICAN.

Secretary Miller affirms that the bureau of immigration is now receiving more inquiries from home-seekers in different parts of the country than ever before in the history of the organization and he takes a decidedly rosy view of the future of the coming Sunshine state. The interest manifested in the gold producing districts of the territory is particularly noticeable and encouraging, proving beyond a peradventure that capital recognizes the rich golden resources of New Mexico and is eager to invest in the development thereof since the United States court of private land claims has dissipated the clouds that so long shrouded the titles to realty in this fair and resourceful land.

Touching the work of the bureau, Mr. Miller says it has been decided to spread information shedding light on the resources and progress of New Mexico by means of neatly printed and concise bulletins dealing with specific subjects of especial interest to prospective investors and home-seekers. Bulletin No. 1, devoted to climate, mineral springs and schools, has already been issued from the presses of the New Mexican, and 10,000 copies thereof will soon be doing missionary work in all parts of the country. The manuscript for bulletin No. 2, devoted to agriculture and horticulture, and bulletin No. 3, dedicated to mines and mining, is now in the hands of the printer, and 20,000 copies of each will soon flutter forth on white wings to the hundreds of our grand, branching republic.

The secretary adds that a fourth bulletin, devoted to colonization enterprises and the spread of information showing the rare opportunities afforded by this territory, is in course of preparation and will probably be printed before the lapse of another month. Twenty thousand copies of this bulletin will be issued, and much good to the territory is anticipated to result therefrom.

As no business of moment demanded immediate attention, the city council did not open probate court this morning.

The usual distressing stories about the total destruction of the fruit buds at Santa Fe are now about ready to pick.

Henry Belsing, of Parsons, Kas., has been appointed blacksmith at the government industrial Indian school here at a salary of \$480 per year.

A. B. Renehan, Esq., has been admitted to practice before the different bureaus of the department of the interior as an attorney and agent.

A private letter from Tularosa, Dona Ana county, says that W. S. Shields, a well known citizen of that town, is very low with pneumonia and may not recover.

The board of county commissioners met in regular session at 2 o'clock this afternoon with Chairman Ludrow in the chair. Commissioners Lucero and McLaughlin and Clerk Romero present. Only routine business was transacted.

The film of snow that fell last night, followed by a flood of golden sunshine during the day, served the pleasing purpose of laying the dust and rendering almost perfect the day before election.

Mrs. Lorenzo Maes de Maestas, the widowed mother of Federico Maestas, who conducts a barber shop on San Francisco street, died this morning at 8 o'clock, of cancer of the stomach, after a long and distressing illness, aged 67 years.

So far as the NEW MEXICAN is able to ascertain the saloon keepers of Santa Fe have unanimously agreed to keep both their front and back doors closed during the progress of the election tomorrow. This is a wise conclusion. A strict compliance with the law is always best under all circumstances.

During the months of February and March just past the volume of cash transactions at the United States land office in this city was larger than for many previous months and Register Otero reports that the prospects for future business are exceedingly bright. During the months mentioned the fees of the office came very near reaching the maximum.
