

DEWEY'S TRIUMPH

Entire Spanish Fleet Destroyed--Greatest and Most Successful Naval Battle on Record.

"REMEMBERED THE MAINE"

Fort's Demolished--Stars and Stripes Float Over Manila--Seven Hundred Spaniards Killed and Wounded--Only Six Americans Injured.

Hong Kong, May 7.--Result of Dewey's fight: Eleven Spanish ships destroyed, 300 Spaniards killed and 400 wounded. Only six Americans injured, not a vessel damaged.

Washington, May 7.--Secretary Long at 10:30, read the following to the newspaper men as Commodore Dewey's report: Manila, May 1.--The squadron arrived at Manila at day break this morning and immediately engaged the enemy and destroyed the following Spanish war vessels: Reina Christina, Castilla, Ulaos, Isla de Cuba, General Lezo, The Duero, Corro, Velasco, Mindanao. One transport and water battery at Fort Cavite. The squadron is uninjured and only a few men were slightly wounded. The only means of telegraphing is to the American consul at Hong Kong. I shall communicate with him. In brief Commodore Dewey's message states that he has silenced the batteries completely; cut the cable and has the bay and everything else completely at his mercy. Commodore Dewey's report says none of his men were killed, and but a few were injured. The exact number he does not state. The American ships were uninjured.

Commodore Dewey has, however, been unable to take possession of the town of Manila, for the lack of men.

Commodore Dewey's second dispatch was as follows:

Cavite, May 4.--I have taken possession of the naval station at Cavite on the Philippine islands and have destroyed the fortifications at the bay entrance, paroling the garrison. I control the bay completely and can take the city any time I desire. The squadron is in excellent health and spirits. The Spanish loss is not fully known, but is very heavy, 150 are killed including the captain of the Reina Christina. I am assisting in protecting the Spanish sick and wounded, 250 of whom are in the hospital within our lines. Much excitement prevails at Manila. I will protect all foreign residents.

Owing to the complicated names of the Spanish ships destroyed by Commodore Dewey, the following is taken direct from the list given by Secretary Long: Reina Christina, Castilla, Don Antonio, Isla de Ulaos, Isla de Luzon, Isla de Cuba, General Lezo, Marques del Duero, El Corro, Velasco, one transport, Isla de Mindana, Isla de Cuba probably means Isla de Cuba; El Corro probably means El Cano.

The Don Antonio is the Don Antonio de Ulaos. The Isla de Ulaos is not given in any accessible data of the Spanish ships and is confounded with Don Antonio Ulaos. It is said at the navy department that its advice also show that Commodore Dewey's forces are not sufficient to make a landing, but this in no way interfered with the complete control he exercised over the city and fortifications. Another dispatch from Commodore Dewey announces, he had taken the fortifications, effected a landing at Cavite, had 250 wounded Spaniards as prisoners and Manila could be taken at any time. He said he was not in serious need of anything at present.

Made an Admiral. By direction of the president, Secretary Long sent the following cablegram to Commodore Dewey:

"The president in the name of the American people, thanks you and your officers and men for your splendid achievement and overwhelming victory. In recognition of this service he has appointed you an admiral and will recommend a vote of thanks to you by congress."

Will Send Supplies to Manila. It has been decided to send a transport with troops and supplies to Admiral Dewey at Manila. The City of Pekin will be used, escorted by the cruiser Charleston.

Another Account. Assistant Secretary Vanderlip has received a cablegram from a friend on the McCulloch during the great naval engagement at Manila, in which, he says:

"The Spanish fleet of 11 warships was destroyed totally, and best of all, no American ship was lost or even damaged. No American was killed and only six Americans injured."

Another cablegram received by Secretary Vanderlip from the commander of the McCulloch states that Chief Engineer F. B. Randall died on May 1, the cause not known.

Spaniards Surrendered, All Well. Rochester, N. Y., May 7.--Mrs. O. F. Williams, of this city, wife of the United States consul at Manila, received the following cable message this morning from her husband at Hong Kong:

"The Spaniards surrendered. All well."

SHIP WRECK REPORTED.

Steamer and 68 Persons Believed to Have Been Lost at Broken Bay, New South Wales.

Sydney, N. S. W.--The Spanish steamer, Maitland, Captain Anderson commanding, from Sydney for New Castle, is believed to be ashore at Broken Bay. The crew and passenger numbering sixty-eight souls, are believed to have been lost.

Later it became definitely known that the steamer ashore at Broken Bay is the Maitland, but only six of her passengers were drowned.

MANIFESTO ISSUED BY DON CARLOS.

All Loyal Followers in America Called Upon to Join the Pretender--Weyler Ready to Join Him.

New York, May 7.--The Commercial Advertiser says: "A manifesto has been issued by Don Carlos, calling upon all loyal followers throughout the United States and South America to join him at once. Rafael Diaz la Cortina, the official representative of Don Carlos in this country, will leave for Europe the coming week. According to Cortina, the general ferment in Spain today, is the beginning of the end of the present dynasty. Emisaries of Don Carlos have reported an overwhelming majority of the people ready to flock to his standard. General Weyler and army are only waiting to receive the word to openly declare their allegiance to him.

FRENCH STEAMER RELEASED.

The Lafayette Captured Off Havana Not a Prize--Arranging for Troops for Philippine Islands.

Washington, May 7.--The French steamer Lafayette, captured by the gunboat Annapolis off Havana, has been released by the State department as the French embassy was assured on April 29 last, that this steamer would be allowed to land its mail and passengers at Havana. Somehow the orders to this effect failed to reach the blockading squadron.

Troops for the Philippine Islands. Arrangements are under way to send troops from the Pacific slope and Idaho to the east to enable Admiral Dewey to take control of the Philippine islands.

SHOT IN THE BACK.

Cousin of the Khedive of Egypt Attacked His Uncle--Under Arrest.

Cairo, Egypt, May 7.--Prince Ahmed Safeldin, a cousin of the Khedive, shot his uncle, Prince Ahmed Faud, with a revolver, in the Khedivial club. Prince Faud received three bullets in the back, and is believed to be dying. Prince Safeldin has been arrested.

ANOTHER ADVANCE IN WHEAT.

The Highest Price in Over 20 Years Reached Today in Chicago. Chicago, May 7.--May wheat scored another sensational advance today, touching \$1.70 a bushel, and closing 17 cents higher than yesterday. July rose 5 1/2 cents.

GRAVE SITUATION IN ITALY.

Disorder Fomented Because of High Price of Bread--Martial Law Proclaimed in Tuscany.

Rome, April 7.--The general situation here is regarded as grave. It now seems clearly demonstrated that politics are mixed up in the disturbances which occurred in various parts of the kingdom, owing to the high price of bread. The clerical party is believed to be fomenting the disorder. A royal decree, issued today, proclaimed martial law throughout Tuscany. There was a renewal of serious rioting at Florence, the capital of Tuscany, last night, and further disturbances at Leghorn, the capital of the province of that name. At both places, a number of rioters were killed or wounded by the troops.

Martial law has been proclaimed at Milan on account of the bread riots.

RIOTERS RAMPANT

Spanish Mobs Burning and Destroying Property--Much Excitement in Madrid Over Riots.

A DICTATORSHIP PROBABLE

An Englishman Suspected of Being a Spy Arrested at Oadis--Denial of Rumor That the Pope Had Advised Queen.

Madrid, May 7.--The provinces are still in a state of disorder. Renewed rioting is reported at various points and there are frequent conflicts between the mobs and police. At Soria the rioters burned the market building and barracks. Women joined in the rioting.

Excitement in Madrid. Much excitement prevails here, as a serious riot is anticipated. Martial law has been proclaimed at Ciudad Real owing to further rioting. A decree has been gazetted allowing the free entry of cereals, etc., into Spain.

Spanish Report of Fighting in Cuba. An official dispatch from Havana says: Since April 30 the hostilities have been pursued against Gomez with the greatest activity and vigor. Several engagements have taken place. Thirty-two rebels have been killed and one Spanish officer and 33 Spanish soldiers wounded.

Military Dictatorship Probable. Hendaye, near Spanish frontier, May 7.--Madrid advises that a military dictatorship, headed by Marshal Campos, is probable as the last chance to save the dynasty.

Englishman Suspected of Being a Spy. Cadiz, May 7.--An Englishman giving the name of Owing Boyer, attempted to telegraph yesterday evening the details of the movements of the Spanish warships. He was arrested and handed over to the military authorities who strongly suspect him of being a spy.

Denial of the Pope's Advising Queen Regent. Rome, May 7.--There is no truth in the statement that the pope has advised the queen regent to mediate.

Reported Sighting of Spanish Vessels. London, May 7.--Five Spanish warships are believed to have been sighted off the French West India islands.

Wants Islands Held. The Spectator urges America to raise an army of 20,000 colored men and hold the Philippine islands, Hawaii and Porto Rico.

Sierra Leone, West Coast of Africa, May 7.--Additional advices confirm the report of the assassination of Miss Archer, Miss Hatfield and Mr. Cain, and add to the list of murdered missionaries, Miss Kegg, possibly mispronunciation Schenck. Miss Cain fled into the bushes and her fate is unknown. All these missionaries were Americans sent out here by the United States Brothers of Christian mission of Dayton, O.

Congressional.

Washington, May 7.--Chairman Boutelle, of the house committee on naval affairs, says he will introduce on Monday a resolution of thanks to Admiral Dewey, also a bill creating an additional rear admiral.

A BATTLE IMMINENT

Spanish and American Fleets Expected to Meet Near Porto Rico Tomorrow.

JERKED THE JERKED BEEF

Admiral Sampson and Colonel Lawton Have Completed Arrangements for the Investment and Occupation of Cuba.

New York, May 7.--A special to the World from Washington says: "We expect important news from Rear Admiral Sampson's fleet about Sunday night," said a member of the cabinet.

Admiral Sampson, with a number of his ships, is rapidly sailing toward the Porto Rican coast. He is expected to arrive off Porto Rico Saturday evening. The Spanish fleet, which is believed to be making for San Juan, Porto Rico, should make its appearance some time Sunday. Should the two powerful fleets meet as now seems imminent, the greatest naval battle of the world will be fought.

The Spanish fleet is considered by American authorities as presenting a formidable array of fighting vessels, and the ability of its commander, Admiral Villamil, is well known.

The administration wants to first accomplish the destruction of the Cape Verde Isles. After that has been disposed of, Havana will be given 24 hours to surrender, and American troops will then be landed.

The president hopes that with two of her fleets destroyed, Spain will sue for peace, and Cuba will be conquered without sending American soldiers to the island.

Warships at Porto Rico.

Port Antonio, Puerto Rico, May 7.--The United States cruiser Montgomery arrived at Cape Hayti this morning. She captured yesterday between Hayti and Cuba, the Spanish steamers Lorenzo and Franquito, loaded with cattle, bound from Montevideo to Havana. A prize crew was put aboard.

A French steamer which arrived here, reports three Spanish warships and one French warship at Porto Rico.

Major Seth Captured and Killed.

A special to the World from Tampa says: A telegram to General Loeret received here tonight, gives information that Major Seth, who on April 24 landed at Calbracon to escort a party of newspaper correspondents to General Gomez' camp, has been captured by Spanish troops and killed.

Jerked the Jerked Beef.

Key West, May 7.--The Spanish brigantine Franquito, from Barcelona, bound for Montevideo and Havana, having on board a cargo of jerked beef, was brought in here by the dispatch boat Hamilton. The Franquito was captured off Havana yesterday by the United States cruiser Montgomery, Commander C. A. Converse.

Things Lively With the Flying Squadron.

Old Point Comfort, Va., May 7.--On board flagship Brooklyn, off Fort Monroe.--The arrival of the Minneapolis and the expectation that the St. Paul and New Orleans will be here during the day has made things rather more lively today with the flying squadron. Men are chafing over the enforced inactivity, although going through drills regularly.

Arrangements for Co-operating With Blockading Squadron.

Tampa, Fla., May 7.--Lieutenant Colonel W. H. Lawton, inspector general of the department of the southwest, who went to Key West on Thursday for the purpose of holding a conference with Admiral Sampson and making final arrangements for co-operation with the blockading squadron with a military expedition from Porto Tampa, returned today and reported to General Shafter. It is almost certain that the exact point of landing on the Cuban coast has been decided upon and probably also the date of sailing, but the army officials absolutely refuse to give any information on the subject, merely saying that notice would be given 30 hours before the time set for departure.

General Nunez left for Washington last night for the purpose, it is said, of having a conference with General Mills. He is not expected back before Wednesday, and no movement of either the United States or Cuban troops is looked for before that time.
