WISE PRECAUTION TAKEN.

In Order to Guard Against the Possible Introduction and Spread of Smallpox, Compulsory Vaccination Adopted by City Council.

The city council met last night in special session with Mayor Hudson in the chair and Aldermen Alarid, Baca, Lopez, McPherson, Robal, Sena and Solignac present.

City Physician Knapp reported that, so far as he was advised, there was at present but one case of smallpox in the city, and that well safeguarded by isolation, but in view of the alleged prevalence of the disease elsewhere in the territory, he urged that immediate protective measures against the same should be adopted by the city authorities.

The mayor and members of the finance committee made a report that fully accorded with that of the city physician and recommended instant action in the form of an ordinance or resolution providing for compulsory vaccination. In the same connection the committee reported that the city physician would undertake to vaccinate all persons able to pay 25 cents each, and would be contented to accept whatever sum the council should hereafter see fit to allow him for vaccinating persons unable to pay for the service.

Whereupon the following resolution, offered by Alderman McPherson, was unanimously adopted:

Be it resolved, That all persons now resident within the limits of the city of Santa Fe who have not been vaccinated within the last seven years shall within the next 15 days be vaccinated.

All bona fide residents of the city without exception shall have the right and privilege of being vaccinated by the city physician for the sum of 25 cents, and all persons too poor to pay said sum shall have the right and privilege of being vaccinated free by the city physician.

All persons who do not heed this resolution will be dealt with according to the provisions of Chapter XXV of the city ordinances in such case as may be approved.

This resolution was ordered printed in the DAILY NEW MEXICAN and in EL NERVO MEXICANO for the general information of the people.

On motion of Alderman Baca, 1,000 copies of the resolution were ordered printed in Spanish for circulation by the city marshal in localities that may not be reached by newspapers.

Dr. D. W. Manley's generous tender of 1,000 points of first-class vaccine virus, free of charge to the city, for the vaccination of persons unable to pay for same, was accepted with thanks.

On motion of Alderman McPherson, the city clerk was directed to send written notifications of the action of the council in the premises to the several church pastors in the city and request them to announce the fact of the passage of the compulsory vaccination resolution to their respective congregations on the coming Sunday.

On motion of Alderman McPherson, the police magistrate was ordered hereafter to open his court at 10 o'clock in the morning for the trial of all city cases and to be in attendance at future meetings of the city council.

The meeting thereupon adjourned.

CLOTHING A SCARCE ARTICLE.

Member of the "Rough Riders" Enumerates the Articles in His Wardrobe—Took a Bath.

Fred McCabe has written a letter home from Santiago telling of his experiences in the battles before that city, but as the main points of the letter have been covered by those already published, only a few extracts are taken from it, as follows:

"On the morning of July 22, I went down to the creek and had a good wash, something very rare among the boys. All I have in the clothing line is one suit of underwear, one blue shirt, one pair of trousers, one pair of socks and a pair of shoes. Everything else was laid aside when I went into battle and was stolen. Many of the men are much worse off than I am. We expect new clothing in the morning.

"Hiram Lowitzki is with the pack train, and I have not seen him for over a week. W. E. Dams was promoted some days ago to 2d lieutenant in some other company, and we now have a new 1st sergeant. Colonel Wood has been appointed governor general of the province of Santiago de Cuba. Captain Luna is his interpreter, and Will Griffin is one of his secretaries. They are all in the city of Santiago. Captain Muller was in town yesterday and says he does not like the place, and was glad to get out of it, as it is full of mosquitos and there is nothing to eat there. The Spaniards seem to be glad that the Americans have taken the place since they are fed by the United States. They had had no bread for fully a month, and are ready to trade anything they have for something to eat.

"If there was any fighting done it was by the 'Rough Riders' and the 10th cavalry, colored. They were with us, would fight with no one else, and they are fighters, too."

Fred is now at Montauk Point with the regiment, and judging from the tone of the letters that have been received from different members of the "Rough Riders," the boys are rejected to get back to the United States.
