It is also reported that the vote of that county will be several hundred votes greater than it was two years ago, as several of the mining camps there are working large forces of men. The Lordsburg Liberal makes the following comment on the ticket: The ticket nominated by the Republicans at Silver City last week is a good one, strong all the way through. It should be elected in its entirety, but judging by the fate of the good tickets in the past, it is too much to hope that all the candidates will be elected. There is no doubt, however, that a portion of the ticket will be elected. Just who will be the lucky ones it will be hard to tell before the 9th of next month.
