TALES OF THE CAMP.

Trooper Williams, of Bland, is in town from Mantank Point and Being Welcomed by Many Friends.

Trooper Thomas C. Williams, of 1 troop, 1st volunteer cavalry, is in town and talked pleasantly with a New Mexican representative last evening. The trooper was one of the unfortunate business who had to remain behind at Camp Tampa; but he never grumbled, remembering that he was a soldier. However, to use a naval expression, he is "out of commission" now and can talk. He enlisted in troop E in this city, and suffered his first adverse experience at San Antonio when he found himself among the 20 men taken from the Santa Fe troop and located in troop L, which was organized by transferring 20 men to the new command from each troop in the squadron. When the eight fortunate troops left for Cuba it was understood that the remaining squadrons would be sent for shortly; but "shortly" never materialized, and the boys had to remain in Florida. They would have had a better time but for the shortage in provisions, for one thing. There was naturally some disposition to complain at the fact that army rations were found to be army rations, whether in the sub-zero wilds of Montana or in the torrid heat of the south-tropics, and there was just claim that a distinction should be made in these things. But even then, the boys would not have evinced a disposition to "rise to object" had there been enough to eat of what they were given. The regimental quartermaster department was suspected of getting away with a lot of supplies that should have reached the troopers, but which never did. So there was a change in the quartermaster later on, and then things seemed to go much better.

Another just complaint the men had to make was the way they were shined up in camp. Lieutenant Sayre, a young sprig of an officer, who had charge of the passes, such as are given, appeared in particular delight in cutting down the time of absence asked for by the men who wanted to leave the camp. This got to be monotonous after a while, and the boys were heartily glad to get away from local control and come once more under the command of the colonel at Mantank Point. There, they came and went as they pleased, and were not one to say nay. Mr. Williams found the 5th cavalry mighty good people and regretted leaving their society.

At Mantank, Mr. Williams got sick for the first time, which more or less astonished him, as he believed he was going to pull through without seeing a sick day. He got his feet wet every day leading horses to water, and the first thing he knew he was down with a fever. However, he was among the fortunate ones cared for by millionaires, and was taken to a hospital with a number of other soldiers, he was given the very best of care. A special physician was on hand, and they were given the most delicate and careful attention and treated the best their entertainers knew how. So it was with full hearts, as well as full stomachs, that the convalescents left their kindly hosts for the west, and they will not forget the kindness and the bounteous hospitality shown the sick soldiers by the wealthy New Yorkers on Long Island. Mr. Williams met special attention of Helen Gould, who did so much for the soldiers, and it was her house on East 16th street that she threw open to the sick and cared for them here. Then she gave orders on the railroads to have the hospitalities of the lunch counters extended to the traveling soldier boys so that they did not have to pay for their eating on route to their homes.

What a contrast was this to the attitude of the St. Louis & San Francisco road, where courtesies were extended to the boys, and where they had to pay in full for everything they bought. Trooper Williams proved a good soldier, and it is his regret that he has not given a chance to face the enemy under the inspiration and guidance of his country's flag. He leaves for his home in Bland later in the week.

MINOR CITY TOPICS.

F. S. weather bureau forecast for New Mexico: Fair with rising temperature tonight and tomorrow. Regular meeting of Santa Fe lodge No. 2, K. of P., this evening, at 8 o'clock, at Castle hall. Visiting knights given a fraternal welcome.

Yesterday the thermometer at the local weather bureau registered as follows: Maximum temperature, 51 degrees, at 3:30 p. m.; minimum, 23, at 5:00 a. m. The mean temperature for the 24 hours was 37 degrees; mean daily relative humidity, 49 per cent.

SAN JUAN COUNTY COURT.

In Session Nine Days and 18 Cases Tried—
—One Penitentiary Sentence Imposed—
Statement of Expenses.

The report of the business transacted by the district court for San Juan county at the term just closed, made by Clerk Berge, certainly speaks highly of Judge McPle's close attention to all matters coming before him, and promptness in deciding cases.

Court was in session nine days, and in that time the grand jury found six indictments, two criminal and 16 civil cases were tried. On the criminal docket there were two cases remaining over from the previous session of court, which were tried. In the one against Font Cabines, charged with flourishing a deadly weapon, the defendant was convicted and sentenced to six months and one day in the penitentiary; in the other, against E. M. Gibson, charged with assault to kill, trial was had, but jury failed to return a verdict. The six new cases, being for minor offenses, all went over to the next term of court.

On the civil docket seven new cases were filed, of which five were tried and disposed of, and two cases were disposed of, leaving 19 cases on the docket. No jury cases went over.

Charles A. Brown and F. C. Perkins, two attorneys of Durango, Colo., were granted temporary license to practice in the courts of the first judicial district of New Mexico, pending the meeting of the supreme court.

A statement of the expenses of the court for San Juan county for three years past, at this time, will be of interest to the tax payers of the county, and is as follows:

In 1896 court was in session six days, the expenditures being \$1,786.45; in 1897 court was in session eight days, and the expenditures were \$2,000.88, and in 1898 court was in session nine days and \$1,580.60 were spent.

Sheriff Brown will bring Font Cabines to Santa Fe to serve out the prison sentence imposed on him, some time this week.

In speaking of Judge McPle and the members of the court and the work done at the speed of time, the San Juan County Index says:

Judge McPle and the other court officials departed Thursday morning for Santa Fe, having completed the special term of court at San Juan county. They left a creditable record of business transacted, having cleared up the docket with the exception of two or three unimportant cases, continued to the next term. They also left a favorable impression among the people as to their actions and abilities as officers of the law, and his decisions are invariably clear, lucid and logical. Clerk Berge is courteous and approachable, a pleasing contrast to many officials who occupy similar positions.

The Republican county convention of Mora will be held at the county seat of that county on Friday, the 21st inst. The convention from all indications will be well attended and harmonious and will nominate a strong ticket which will sweep the county upon the Union ticket.
