Grant Rivenburg has just harvested 1,500 tons of ice which will furnish the town next summer with all the congelation necessary. What he now cuts will be surplus stock.  
A special meeting of the board of education has been called by President Fischer for Wednesday evening, and a full attendance is expected as business of importance is to be transacted.  
Yesterday the thermometer at the local weather bureau registered as follows: Maximum temperature, 41 degrees, at 3:00 p. m.; minimum, 21 degrees, at midnight. The mean temperature for the 24 hours was 31 degrees; mean daily relative humidity, 72 per cent.  
Saturday the thermometer at the local weather bureau registered as follows: Maximum temperature, 38 degrees, at 2:10 p. m.; minimum, 22 degrees, at 9:00 a. m. The mean temperature for the 24 hours was 30 degrees; mean daily relative humidity, 81 per cent.  
Twenty-four of the 30 big Baldwin engines recently ordered by the Santa Fe have been received at Chicago, where they are being connected up preparatory to being sent out on the road. These engines will be used between La Junta and Las Vegas.  
It started to snow Saturday after the football game was over, and snowed and "blowed great" until morning. By noon, however, it cleared up, and the afternoon was warm and sunny. Today is bright and bracing, and the atmosphere health inspiring.  
Special car 509 of the Delaware & Hudson Railroad Company was in town yesterday for a few hours containing Rev. Dr. Irvine and party from East Orange, N. J., en route to the coast.  
Yesterday's Raymond & Whitcomb party brought the usual storm along with them. There were 160 people in the excursion, en route to California to see flowers blooming in the winter time. They were mostly New Englanders.

**BAPTIZING AT THE PENITENTIARY.**  
Two Prisoners Baptized By Immersion in the Open Air Yesterday by Rev. R. P. Pope, of Weed, N. M.  
Yesterday was an occasion of some moment in local religious circles, for two prisoners in the penitentiary were baptized by immersion upon open profession of their faith. The parties baptized were J. B. Hiller, formerly of Socorro, who has yet seven years to serve of a 15 years' sentence for staying a man he believed was too intimate with his wife. The second convert baptized was E. W. Trout charged with taking a woman's life in Albuquerque in 1896, but which he stoutly denies having done, and over which there is a difference of opinion in legal circles, which may result in his liberation long before his 40 years' sentence has expired. The officiating clergyman was Rev. R. E. Pope, Baptist missionary for this territory, and who came up from Weed, near Alamogordo, to administer the rite.  
Every courtesy and facility were afforded by the prison officials, and Mr. Pope has expressed himself as delighted with the kindly and appreciative treatment accorded him. Preliminary services were held in the chapel, which were attended by nearly all of the convicts, and at the close the clergyman, candidates for baptism, a number of trustees, Assistant Warden Merrill, the guards and a New Mexican representative repaired to the pond in the northeast corner of the yard, where the thick ice had been cut to make a pool about 12 feet square and waist deep. Descent was by a ladder, and the two candidates went down into that stinging cold water with Rev. Mr. Pope and were entirely immersed without flinching a muscle. They were converted some little time ago through the Christian Endeavor Society that is flourishing at the prison, and were glad to accept this opportunity for baptism, as they believed it should be administered. Both are prominent in the Endeavor society, Mr. Trout being the organizer.  
Rev. Pope returned south this afternoon, and the society held an interesting and well attended meeting in the afternoon, which was marked by Chambers, a life prisoner, raising his hand for prayers. Mr. Pope left an excellent impression, and the prison authorities regard him as a very worthy man.

**The Football Game.**  
The football contest of Saturday resulted disastrously to the Santa Fe Indian team, for the Albuquerque Indians fairly wiped the earth with them, to the tune of 42 to 0. The home team did their level best to avoid being presented with the large and healthy goose egg, but they could not stand up before the visitors. Some 200 people saw the game, which was played in two 30-minute halves. In the first half the first touch down for the visiting team was scored in three minutes from the time "Play ball" was called. An attempt to kick a goal from the field failed. However, three more touch downs were scored ere the referee's whistle blew; score, 15 to nothing in favor of the visitors.  
The Albuquerque Indians scored five touch downs and kicked two goals in the second half of the game, and had things pretty much their own way. All of the Albuquerque boys did well, and for the home team, Messrs. Miner, Brown, Thornton and Norton distinguished themselves. The visitors remained over until yesterday afternoon, returning home on the south bound train, after being extended hospitalities by the Indian school people and their friends in this city. The referee was Arthur Seligman and the umpire W. A. Davis.
