We still favor its admission, believing that there is no good and substantial reason for keeping us out of the Union as a state and believe that this can best be accomplished by the election of a delegate to congress who is in harmony with Republican politics and principles—Republican Platform, New Mexico, 1898.

An exchange is already talking about turning over new leaves for the New Year. But, really, is it not a little soon for that? The New Year is almost five days off yet.

The extra session of the Kansas Popular legislature is developing into a regular Kilkenny cat affair with the Republican members, who are very few, as spectators and shouters. However, Kansas will profit by the useless session and the wanton expenditure of public funds. "There won't be any more" Pop legislatures in the Sunflower state.

Small wonder that Congressman-elect Roberts, of Utah, is very anxious to occupy that seat in the house of representatives. There is some talk of amending the constitution by submitting to a vote of the people, an amendment prohibiting polygamy, and Roberts wants to be where he can be of "influence" against any such fool proposition.

The Cuban method of celebrating Christmas is undoubtedly exciting, but it has too many elements of danger mixed up with it to ever become popular with Americans. This thing of shooting at sleeping men may be all right when viewed from a Cuban standpoint and Cuban ethics of "getting even," but a little civilization injected into Cuban morals will do no harm.

The report sent out from Alaska that the increase in the output of gold from the Dawson district would exceed that of last year by 100 per cent would look suspiciously like a transportation company boom for the northern country were it not accompanied by the announcement that "several persons are reported frozen to death" and that "several river steamers are certain to be destroyed when the ice breaks."

It seems that the raising of the stars and stripes over Havana on December 7 was a mistake. The intention was not to raise the American flag over the capital of Cuba until January 1, but on being ordered to take possession of a portion of the fortifications with his command, Major Harrison promptly "dug up the stars and stripes." Mistake or no mistake, the flag has not been lowered and the Spaniards seem to be willing to give it wave.

The "Anti-Imperialist" Society, of Massachusetts, which started out to secure 100,000 signatures to a protest against the annexation of any new territory, has succeeded in securing 2,000 names on the cards sent out, 1,500 from the state of Massachusetts and 500 from the rest of the country. Judging from the expressions on the subject read in the papers from all sections, 2,000 "antis" constitutes the entire strength of the opposition to retaining the islands which have been ceded to the United States by Spain.

By this time Santa Claus and his reindeers are back at their north pole home, and the old gentleman must be pretty well satisfied with his work in the United States. In Uncle Sam's sock he left something like 2,000 new islands, the respect of all European and South American nations, if not their good will, a united country, a prosperous people, and last, but not least, the consciousness of having performed every duty that was imposed by destiny in a thorough and conscientious manner.

Those in a position to know, are certain that Captain Max Luna, representative-elect from Valencia county, will be the speaker of the lower house of the 32d legislative assembly, which convenes in this city on January 16; that the other members-elect who had ambitions to preside over the deliberations of that body have withdrawn from the race, and that the Rough Rider officer will be elected without opposition. Captain Luna will make a splendid presiding officer. In the 32d assembly he was a hard working member, prompt in his attendance and careful in the discharge of his duties to his constituents and the people of the entire territory as well. The experience gained two years ago fits him for the position in every way, and should he have no occasion to regret that action.

NEW MEXICO MINES.

The new developments in the various New Mexico mining districts for the period ending December 24, are shown as follows:

TAOS DISTRICT.
The Copper Hill company, operating near Tinconado, is now working 20 men, and more will be employed as soon as more working space can be gained. A recent strike in this property, in a cross cut run from the 75 foot level of the Champion claim, disclosed an ore chute giving 40 average values. The vein is eight feet wide. Assorted ore from the pay streak returns from \$100 to \$125 per ton. The high grade or assorted ore is shipped to Pueblo for treatment, and the low grade ore is being saved pending the erection of a local treatment plant. About 1,000 feet from the Champion workings, where the ore chute was first encountered, a shaft was sunk to 200 feet depth, and four feet of good ore encountered, thus demonstrating the continuity of the ore chute. The Copper Hill property is one of New Mexico's recent bonanzas. Thin streaks of copper glance occur in the quartz with sufficient frequency to give an average value of \$60 per ton to 15 inches of the vein matter. The company will secure water supply from the Rio Grande river, two miles distance from the works, for future operations.

The Copper Hill stock is in the hands of New York and Washington capitalists, Mr. Metekohn, assistant secretary of the navy, being one of the principal stockholders. The pay roll of the company now exceeds \$2,000 per month.

LA BELLE.
The Rebecca tunnel is now in 80 feet and vigorous development work will be continued.

The new Edison mill and cyanide plant will be in place by January 15.

The Ajax mill has resumed operations. A new crew of Cripple Creek miners have been set to work on the Black Copper mine.

Denver capitalists are negotiating for several promising prospects in the Hematite district.

Ground is being broken for a new mill building in Humburg gulch. The Confidence Mining and Milling Company has the matter in charge, and proposes to equip the building with two 160-foot Huntington and Wilfley concentrating tables. Erie, Pa., capitalists are backing the enterprise. They have no property sufficiently developed to warrant the plan, and will depend largely on custom ore.

The Jumbo-Poll mine has started two shifts on development work.

A. G. Stevens, patentee of the Hematite mill, will erect a custom plant at Elizabethtown.

THE JARILLA MOUNTAINS.
The St. Louis United Copper Company, operating 50 miles north of El Paso, is increasing the working force on the mine and preparing to make regular ore shipments to the El Paso smelter over the new White Oaks railroad.

RED RIVER.
R. Kelly has purchased H. C. Bradley's interest in the Deer Trail claim on Copper mountain.

The assessment work on the Black Diamond property, located on Bobcat creek is finished.

A. B. Heard, of Erie, Pa., has purchased Theo. Wild's interest in the Rebecca claim on Bitter creek. Six men are at work developing the property.

J. M. Mood is pushing development work on the Wild Rose property located in Road canon.

Assessment work is being prosecuted on the following claims: Kerby lode, located in Road canon; Bigelow locations on Bitter creek; Bend lode, Bitter creek; Ragged Pants Dick, Road canon; Lindsay & Kelley properties, Placer creek; Deer Tail, Placer creek; Tinker claim, Placer creek.

The Stella mine is working three shifts daily and producing ore for treatment.

WHITE OAKS.
The Old Abe Company has ordered new hoisting machinery from Zanesville, O. The new hoist will be a first motion, link reverse, 50 revolutions per minute affair. It will hoist 75 tons per minute and make 80 revolutions. The cylinder drums are 60 inches in diameter and 38 inches long. Complete, the hoist weighs 45,000 pounds. The Old Abe shaft is now down 1,050 feet, and 2,250 feet of inch and one-eighth steel wire cable has been purchased for future work.

HACHITA.
The Carbonate King property is being reopened by J. E. Sheridan, of Silver City. The mine shows large bodies of lead ore.

SOCORRO.
The Timber Peak Mining Company has 11 carloads of machinery on the ground for their new Water Canon mill. The process to be used will include both amalgamation and cyanide and the daily capacity will be 150 tons. April 1 is the date set for the mill to begin the work of crushing ore.

SANTA RITA.
The Santa Rita Copper and Iron Company is shipping five cars of iron ore to Pueblo per day.

Ashton & Roach, leasers on the Romero, are making regular shipments to the Silver City smelter.

Work has been resumed on the Carrasco shaft and the depth attained is now 210 feet. At the 300 foot level a drift will be run under the old workings. The mine was worked 70 years ago by the Spaniards and a vast quantity of copper ore produced. The surface workings caved in and a legend has it that hundreds of peons were buried in the mine. The rich old ore chute will be tapped from the new workings.

BLAND.
A large body of high grade ore has been opened in the Black Girl property and regular shipments are now being made to the Bland custom mill.

The Lone Star Mining Company has let a contract to drift 30 feet on the lead in the 5th or lower level of the mine.

Arthur L. Finch has secured a renewed lease and bond on the Union mine and resumed operations. Last week, while sinking a shaft on the lead, a large body of high grade ore was opened.

The recent ore body struck in the T. S. K. property is holding up well and the mine is fast being placed in position

to furnish an unlimited quantity of milling ore.

Development work is being pushed on the following claims: Ivanhoe and J. S. H. Peralta canon; New York and Governor, Pino canon; Iron Cap, Medio Dia canon.

A 30-foot vein carrying 312 per ton free milling values, has been opened in the East of the Woods mine, owned by Henry Lockhart.

The Glencoe property shows a foot of ore which gives \$15 per ton value. The Glencoe is operated by the Crown Point Mining Company.

GOLDEN.
The Cullen mines, located two miles from Golden, are shipping regular to the Graves mill. There are 1,000 tons of ore on the dump ready for hauling and the mines show 1,000,000 tons more available.

CENTRAL.
A cross cut is being run in the Texas mine from the 500-foot level of the shaft to cut the vein. The mill is running steady and producing a good grade of concentrates.

The Grand Central, adjoining the Texas on the same vein, is being developed on the 300 foot level of the Texas shaft.
