\$75,000 MINING DEAL IN CENTRAL DISTRICT.

Silver City, N. M., Feb. 22.—Another big mining deal which means much to the Central district and to this county was consummated here last week when B. F. Baker of Hanover, sold to the Native Copper Mining Company of Milwaukee, Wisconsin, the Philadelphia group of mines, consisting of the Philadelphia, Philadelphia Extension, Chicago and Maggie Bell properties for a consideration said to have been \$75,000. The same company owns fifteen other claims adjoining the Philadelphia group and with the new purchase now owns a large acreage between the Hanover and Santa Rita camps. The Philadelphia mine is one of the old producers in the county and has now an annual output of over fifty thousand dollars. This output at the present price of copper would be worth over one hundred thousand dollars. The management of the Native Copper Company intends to at once commence active development work, increasing the main shaft on the Philadelphia to a triple compartment and also to sink two additional shafts. The Philadelphia mine has been under bond and lease to B. F. Baker of Hanover who has made a decided success of the operation. All of the ground owned by the company has been thoroughly prospected and is known to contain great mineral values.

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
