WASHINGTON MATTERS.

SENATE AND TARIFF. WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—It is the intention to proceed in the senate with the tariff bill and to take up no other measure until that bill shall be passed. It is probable that there will be some amendments made by the finance committee before the measure shall be again called up. At all events, that is the present indication. The sub-committee has been engaged in considering the amendments which have been proposed by Republican members. Some important amendments have been suggested. Few have as yet been determined upon. Those as to which there is the most pressure relate to the lumber and sugar schedules. Some of the western and northern senators are very anxious that there should be a reduction of lumber; while some of the senators from other sections are quite as anxious that there should be no reduction on the rates of lumber. Those who have been taking an active part in this matter are of the opinion that there will be some reduction recommended in lumber from the rates in the present bill. As to sugar, the sentiment is in the contrary direction. The Kansas senators who wish a reduction on lumber also desire to have an increase on sugar in order that the sorghum sugar interests in that state may be protected. They are supported in this respect by Senator Stanford, of California, who believes that it is desirable that the beet sugar industry should receive more protection than would be given it by the senate bill. It is possible that changes may be made in these two articles by the Republican sub-committee which has charge of the bill. If an agreement can be secured as to the rate on these two articles, there will be no difficulty so far as the Republicans are concerned in passing the bill without any considerable further debate. The only debate which is to be expected now is that which may be necessary to answer specific attacks by the Democrats upon the bill.

CAPITAL NOTES.

Congress has again assembled and the senate is pushing the tariff bill. The treasury department has been informed of the arrest, by an agent of the secret service division, of W. S. Harris, counterfeiter at Chicago. Twenty bogus dollar pieces and a number of blanks were captured, together with a very fine outfit for manufacturing spurious coin. The postmaster general has directed that the eight new postal cars just completed for the New York line be named as follows: Daniel Manning, Mr. Justice Field, Governor Felch (ex-governor of Michigan), George S. Briggs (ex-general superintendent of the railway mail service), Governor Palmer (of Illinois), Governor Gray (of Indiana), W. F. Vilas and Allen G. Thurman. This line, it is said, is the heaviest railway post in the country.

More Bad Blood.

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 3.—A special to the Times-Democrat from Greenville, Miss., says two weeks ago last Saturday Col. Paxton's residence near Osceola, was totally destroyed by fire and it is now known that the fire was the work of incendiaries. Seven of the colored servants, five men and two women, were arrested a few days ago and kept under guard.

Kilrain Eager to Meet Sullivan.

ST. LOUIS, Jan. 3.—The Kilrain-Mitchell exponents of the DeLair movement left the city yesterday. While here Person Davies did the talking for them. He stated that a letter had been forwarded to Kilrain's New York lawyer that would meet the Sullivan party in Buffalo, N. Y., January 7, and the match would be closed within ten days or the party who should refuse to fight would be shown up. Davies claimed that Kilrain was not only willing but anxious to meet Sullivan, and would agree to anything in reason to bring about the match. As to Jackson, the Australian wonder, he did not see money or glory in a meeting with the black. There was nothing to win and everything to lose.

Last of the Great Eastern.

LONDON, Jan. 3.—The work of breaking up the Great Eastern began yesterday and will probably not be completed in less than a year. The fittings of the Great Eastern, which were sold a few days ago, realized over £43,000, the copper bringing £2,900; the gun metal, etc., £4,480; brass, £2,980; lead, £4,185; outer iron plates, £12,500; inner iron plates, beams and rivets, £12,230; anchors, about £300.

Awaiting Stanley's Letters.

LONDON, Jan. 3.—Sir Francis Newington, president of the Emin Bey relief committee, has received a telegram from Leopoldville, saying: "Stanley's correspondence is detained at the Falls and can not reach here before March 1." He hopes to receive news earlier.

TAXING RAILROAD LINES.

A Decision in Dakota Against the Northern Pacific Railroad Company.

A MAGNIFICENT SHOWING

Of Santa Fe County's Varied and Inexhaustible Mineral Resources.

The New York Mining and Engineering Journal, an authority in its line, discourses as follows on the resources of Santa Fe county: Cerrillos, on the Santa Fe railroad just south of Santa Fe, is an important mining district. There are so many mines in this county that it is difficult to name them and yet show such poor results financially. The main reason why Cerrillos has not developed faster has been that about three-quarters of the minerals in the neighborhood has been covered by the Ortiz Juana, Lopez, San Pedro and Canon del Agua land grants, and yet in spite of all the impediments of securing good titles under these grants, the district has prospered had the region to the north of the town been developed as a zinc or lead district from the start, instead of working in the vain hope of making it a gold and silver mine.

THE ROADS.

Sweet Peace Prevails—Cattle Weighing Inaugurated. KANSAS CITY, Jan. 3.—The railroad companies commence the new year with freight and passenger rates fully restored and decided inclination to maintain full tariff. The indiscriminate and unwise cutting of rates that has prevailed for the past year has had the effect of causing more than one road pass a dividend, a thing they never were forced to do before. The capitalists and some of the managers of the roads, will force the capitalists to withdraw their support from the roads. The effect of the threat has been noticed before, and the result is the restoration of rates. Another measure of the new year is the formal inauguration of the weighing system to live stock shipments. Each road has made arrangements to weigh upon its own scales in most cases at the stock yards. The Santa Fe will weigh at Argentine for the present. The prediction is fully made that this system will result in much dissatisfaction so far as the shipper is concerned, on account of the delay consequent upon the weighing of each car. One agent gives them one month for a trial and says that they will make a strong kick before the expiration of that time.

THE SUNNY SOUTH.

Gen. Longstreet Writes a Letter on Southern Affairs.

CHATTANOOGA, Jan. 1.—At the banquet last night at the Stanton house in honor of the election of H. Clay Evans, Republican, to congress, a letter of congratulation was received from Gen. Longstreet, which was the feature of the evening. He said in substance: "Chattanooga is the center of the new south, and being one of the first cities to elect a Republican congressman pleads, in the protection of American liberty and American industries, she has laid out a path to industrial supremacy that her sister cities would do well to imitate. "Our party has to see that Mr. Evans, and every man who is fairly elected, shall take his seat. If there were more 'job-tailors' in the executive chairs of the southern states, there would be less complaint about a suppressed vote. But for the Morrill tariff of 1861, Chattanooga would now be in swaddling clothes. "Nothing is so timid and cautious as capital, and to get into your midst it must feel that it is safe and welcome. Millions are locked up that would be gladly released and seek the fertile fields and the rich mineral deposits of the sunny south if the conditions were believed to be favorable. "Two recent events will produce this end. The first was the heroic action of the Birmingham sheriff, and the second was the visit of Birmingham's delegation to the southern states. I trust that Gen. Harrison will meet with no factions opposition from the south, for our people welcome him more than we can now discern. An approval of Cleveland's policy would be a calamity, notably to our section."
