THE WATCHMAN ON THE STATE GUARD.

We will only note one feature of an article in the last number of the Salisbury Watchman in reference to the Encampment. One branch of the subject discussed has been disposed of by Governor Seales over his own signature, and is emphatic enough to convince the Watchman, and might satisfy our ardent young friend of the Winston Sentinel.

In regard to another branch of the subject, we must express our surprise that our usually judicious and cautious friend of the Watchman should have accepted so unreservedly the loose and slanderous assertions of an anonymous correspondent of the Winston Sentinel, which paper, by the way, in its zeal in defense of a special position, has made itself the mouthpiece of hostility to the officers of the State Guard of higher rank than the editor of the Sentinel, and strangely in conflict with military principles, and in direct violation of the Rules and Regulations which he is sworn to obey, and which are set forth clearly and distinctly in printed form.

The News & Courier of the 27th, is filled with additional details of the great storm of the 25th. The hurricane seems to have hugged the coast very closely, more seaward than inland. This is shown by the fact that Savannah escaped damage, and that the rice crops are not hurt materially. Charleston seems to have borne the brunt of the tempest, and the latest accounts do not materially modify the extent of the damage, except that the estimated injury to wharves and waterside property is reduced from \$500,000 to \$350,000. The damage to the shipping in the harbor is very great.

THE BUSINESS PROSPECTS.

The Philadelphia Times of a recent date, has several columns of interviews with the leading firms in this city in regard to the business outlook. It thus presents the result. The general tone of hopefulness pervading the business interviews, published in another column, indicates that an active fall trade may be confidently expected.

The following telegram was sent today by Oxford's leading tobacco merchant to Messrs. Charles Watkins & Co., of Richmond: "A visit through the country confirms the worst reports. The curings are an entire failure; worse than those of '81." Also the following: DURHAM, August 27. The rains of Tuesday were merely local showers. They were of little benefit to the tobacco crop in this section. In consequence of very unfavorable crop reports both in North Carolina and Virginia, there is a sharp advance of about 15 per cent on bright tobaccos. The local markets are considerably excited.




