THE MODERN MUSIC-BOX.
Some Interesting Facts—Not Generally Known—High-Prized Boxes.
"There are a good many facts about music-boxes that the public are not aware of," remarked a dealer to a reporter recently. "In the first place, they were invented 100 years ago and in Switzerland. They all come from that country, even at the present time. Why? Because the labor required to make them is too costly in this country. The length of time a music-box will play varies considerably. They are furnished with one, two, or four powerful springs, and will play for four, six, eight, ten, fifteen, twenty or twenty-five minutes, according to the size of the box and the number of springs it is provided with. As a rule the works are enclosed in highly polished inlaid cases of a variety of rich woods. They never require tuning, as many people suppose, but if the simple instructions which accompany each box are followed, they will last a lifetime, requiring, like a clock, only an occasional cleaning. There are a number of cautions which should be heeded in the use of the music-box. Under no circumstances should it be moved while it is playing; it should never be allowed to remain run down in the middle of a tune, and it should be wound nor any part of the movement should be unscrewed unless it is certain that the instrument has entirely run down."
"What is new in the music-box line?"
"Several things. One with interchangeable cylinders. For instance, Boxes with only one cylinder play from one to twelve tunes. But by just producing a class of boxes with interchangeable cylinders of six tunes each. By means of these the number of tunes to a box may be increased indefinitely. We keep the cylinders in stock and special tunes are often ordered for them. Another new thing is the "Marotte," a musical doll made in Paris. It is a doll's head, with the music-box inside plays a tune. The whole contrivance is about a foot long, and the dolls have very pretty faces and are tastefully dressed in red, white and blue. Another novelty is a cigar-holder with places for a large number of cigars. It is turret-shaped, with doors at each partition, and as it moves around it plays a tune. The dolls cost \$2 each, and the cigar-stands from \$8.00 upwards.

What tunes do people prefer in the boxes?
"Light operatic music and popular American airs. But there is no end to the variety of tunes in them. Our boxes are provided with all the favorite dances, marches, national airs, and ballads, as well as with the best selections from the most popular operas, ballets, etc."
"What are some of the prices?"
"You can buy a music-box for 90 cents, and I have sold one in this city for as high as \$5,000. But this was a number of years ago. Some are as large as an upright piano, and cost \$2,000. These have an unlimited number of tunes, owing to the interchangeable cylinders. The 90-cent boxes have twenty-eight teeth, play one tune, and are made of wood or of japanned tin, wood, or papier-mache."

Condiments and Indigestion.
Cayenne pepper may be selected as a typical example of a condiment properly so called. Mustard is a food and condiment combined; this is the case with some others. Curry powders are mixtures of very potent condiments with more or less innocuous materials and sulphur compounds, which, like the oil of mustard, onions, garlic, etc., may have a certain amount of nutritive value. The mere condiment is a stimulating drug that does its work directly upon the inner lining of the stomach, by exciting it to increased and abnormal activity.

A dyspeptic may obtain immediate relief by using cayenne pepper. Among the advertised patent medicines is a pill, the active constituent of which is cayenne pepper. Temporary relief is commonly obtained by using it as a "dinner pill." If thus used only as a temporary remedy for an acute, and temporary, or exceptional attack of indigestion, all well; but the cayenne, whether taken in pills or dusted over the food, or stewed with it in curries or otherwise, is one of the most cruel of slow poisons when taken habitually. Thousands of poor wretches are crawling miserably toward their graves, the victims of the nauseating and deadly effects of indigestion that are connected with chronic incurable dyspepsia, all brought about by the habitual use of cayenne and condimental pills.

The usual history of these victims is that they began by overfeeding, took the condiment to force the stomach to do more than his beautiful amount of work, and that a little at first. The stomach became tolerant of this little and demanded more; then more, and more, and more, until at last the inflammation, ulceration, and torpidity, and finally the death of the digestive powers, accompanied with all that long train of miseries to which I have referred.

South Carolina's Phosphates.
The phosphate rock bed of South Carolina now supplies the world with the chief part of all the phosphate of lime used in the manufacture of commercial fertilizers, and this industry was unknown there until 1868. The greatest length of this phosphate rock bed is about seventy miles, the city of Charleston being about the center of the most accessible deposits. It crops out at the surface in many places, and is found distributed over large areas at the bottom of many of the rivers.

It is mined in three ways, by open quarrying and digging in the land; by dredging and grappling with powerful mining machines in deep water; by hand-picking and with tongs in shallow streams. Its average price is about \$6 a ton, and the state levies a tax of \$1 a ton on all that is shipped, making it an important item of revenue. These phosphates are the remains of very ancient animal life, and fragments are brought up not only representing the tapir, horse, elephant, and mastodon, but amphibious ones, such as the seal, dugong, walrus, etc.

Incubator-Hatchers (Chickens).
The latest charge against incubator-hatched chickens comes from the cooks of the Saratoga hotels, and is that they are tough and indigestible. The incubator are fed upon corn meal and boiled potatoes instead of their natural diet of grubs and worms, and are kept in contracted and dirty quarters, which is held to account for the inferior flavor.

Starting Statistics.
There are 1,232 men in this country with artificial noses, and over 2,000 with artificial ears, while it is calculated that only one man in every ninety-seven is perfectly sound in mind and body.
