

HOLLOW HORN.—The disease commonly known as "hollow horn" has no immediate connection with the horns as animals without horns manifest the same symptoms. The disease in question is the result of inflammation extending from the mucous membrane lining the nostrils into the sinuses of the skull and horns, there being a direct communication between these parts. Debility, improper and insufficient food, exposure, and all other causes that tend to weaken the system, may give rise to this condition. The treatment must be such as to counteract this deficiency, and should consist mainly of good nursing. The animal should be kept in warm, dry, well ventilated quarters; pay particular attention to carding and brushing; give nourishing food and a little physic, if necessary. Boring the horns is useless and barbarous and is to be placed in the same category as cutting off the tail as a remedy for the "wool" as still practiced by the ignorant.—*American Agriculturist*

SELECTING CORN SEED.—Many good farmers make a practice of going through their corn fields before harvesting, and cutting out for seed the stalks having two or more good ears. This is a good plan for making the corn more productive, but should be remembered that much of the seed corn grown two ears to a stalk is fertilized by the pollen from stalks that do not produce a single ear. Thus the tendency to increase productiveness is more than neutralized. It would seem a good precaution to go through the field as the corn is in tassel, and remove all stalks that do not show signs of producing even a single ear. The labor required to do this would be in part offset by the labor saved in cutting and in handling stalks without ears when husking.
