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SHALL OUR SECTION BE REPRESENTED AT THE LONDON EXPOSITION?

In a former article, we announced the appointment of Prof. J. M. Tiernan (by Gov. Scales) to be commissioner to represent the State of North Carolina at the London Exposition of 1886. We at the same time called the attention of our readers to the importance of making a creditable exhibit of our products and resources, and hope and trust that the inhabitants of the entire State will realize the necessity of making an exhibit so as to attract the attention of foreign capitalists to the many advantages offered for investment in our State.

Words would fail to describe the many benefits that will be derived by our people, if they join hands, and work with a will in responding to the requests of our Commissioner Prof. J. M. Tiernan, who has shown by his indefatigable energy, and interest in all affairs connected with our State, that he is the proper man to fill the office to which he has been appointed, and is fully conversant with our State and its requirements. His capacity has been already proven, as the sale by him of the Warm Springs and adjoining properties make manifest; the parties who purchased this property are able to invest capital, and have already begun improvements there, which will run up into hundreds of thousands of dollars. This could only be accomplished by one who has the confidence of the leading capitalists throughout the entire country. Besides the above mentioned sale, numerous tracts of land, and mineral properties have changed hands through his recommendations, and some of the latter are being worked. LATEST BY TELEGRAPH.

From All Parts of the World.

The gas works exploded Thursday morning at Kansas City wrecking the surrounding buildings. No one badly hurt.

Mr. Robert Garrett has been re-elected President of the Baltimore and Ohio Road.

The two negroes, Nelson Stuart and Anderson Davis, were hung for burglary on Wednesday, in Charlotte.

W. H. Vanderbilt's funeral will take place to-day.

Congressman delegate Craine, of Utah, has addressed the President a letter declaring the peaceful intentions of the Mormons, assuring him of the terrible persecutions to which his people are subjected, and appealing for protection.

Gen'l Logan will become chairman of his old committee on military affairs, of the Senate.

A large number of foreign glass workers have had to return to their native land, as the workers in Pittsburg and other places refused to allow them to be employed with them.

The liberals in the English Parliament are five ahead of Tories and Parnellites combined.

The death of Vanderbilt caused a heavy decline in American stocks on the London market, but they recovered.

The Sultan of Turkey has notified the German government that if Serbia opposes the right of Turkey to administer the affairs of eastern Roumelia, he would at once send a Turkish army to enforce his rights. This creates great excitement in Germany.

CONGRESS.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9.

SENATE—Senator Sewell introduced a bill to increase the annual allowance for arms and ammunition for militia.

Hale of Maine—A resolution, re-electing one S. S. Brown, of Maine, has had Postmaster Gen'l Vilas to furnish a list of changes recommended by said Brown. Agreed to.

Vest of Missouri—Calls for information relative to the refusal of Austria & Co., to accept Mr. Kelley, Agreed to.

Florida—To facilitate the loan granted to the Atlantic and Pacific Railroad Company.

Blair—Amendment to the constitution extending right of suffrage to women.

Brown, of Georgia—Resolution removing disabilities of Gen'l A. R. Lawton of Savannah.

House—The Speaker appointed committee on Rules: Speaker, Randall, Morrison, Reed and Hiscock.

Mr. Morrison, of Illinois, offered a resolution for reference to the committee on rules when appointed. The resolution proposes to continue in force the rules of the forty-eighth congress, with the modification referred to in these dispatches of yesterday, namely: The distribution of the work of the appropriations committee among the other standing committees of the house; it leaves the committee with jurisdiction over the legislative and sundry civil bills; amends rule 21 by taking out the clause which provides that no provision in the general appropriation bill or amendment thereto changing the existing law be in order, except such as are germane to the subject matter of the bill and shall retrench expenditures. Referred to the committee on Rules.

Charver, of Buncombe, 58 lbs. for \$9.40; Cas Brown, 43 lbs. at \$3 per 100 lbs.

THE TERRIBLE STORM.

Death and Destruction.

CHICAGO, Dec. 9.

The frightful gale that swept the lakes Friday night was followed yesterday by another of almost equal violence, which was still raging this morning. Fears were entertained for the safety of every vessel known to have been caught out in the storm, and it is generally predicted that many disasters will be heard from.

The waves danced high into the air and completely submerged the breakwaters in the outer harbor. The weather was bitter cold, and the frigidity of the temperature was made more aggravating by the fierce wind. Furious snow squalls swept up the lake in rapid succession, and at times it was impossible to see the end of the piers from the top of the life-saving station. The few vessels arriving reported an unusually severe trip. In each case they were covered with ice from stem to stern and their crews worn out from exhaustion and exposure.

The Signal Service quoted the temperature at Winnipeg 20 deg. below, St. Paul 14 below, Fargo 19 below, Dubuque 6 below.

Boston, Dec. 9.—Capt. Martin, the keeper of the Minot's Ledge light-house, was able to leave his post yesterday for the first time since the great storm of last week. The storm was surpassed in violence only by the great one of 1851, when the first Minot's Ledge light-house was carried away. No other light house in the world is so exposed to the mercy of the sea and wind. The pinnacle of the structure towers nearly 200 feet above the waves, and yet the tremendous seas, last week dashed 60 feet above the peak. The storm struck New York a full broadside, and much damage and suffering ensued.

In Canada, the thermometer went down from 14 to 16 degrees below zero.

DETROIT, Dec. 9.—The storm of the past two days has been almost unparalleled in its severity. Old lake men, who have been on the lakes for the last quarter of a century, say it is heavier than they have ever known. Fears are entertained for the safety of every vessel known to have been in the gale.
