It is a long time before the negro gets his wish in this respect. That time may come when his educational necessities require it. These necessities do not exist now.

The Franklin Press says: The lumber company at the mouth of Tuckasee is about five miles below the mouth of Alarka Creek. Their machinery is now in progress, about 50 or 60 hands at work at the saw mill and reservoir, and a number of teams hauling, but the greater portion of their logs are conveyed by the railroad.


