The wholesale trade of Asheville is very large just now. Asheville is rapidly reaching out in this matter. Our merchants duplicate other markets, too, in prices and goods.

Some twelve or fifteen wagons loaded with Haywood tobacco drove into the Farmers' warehouse last evening. They attracted some attention as they passed through the streets in line.

Wild Jim, the Texas scout and cowboy gave an exhibition of his skill with the rifle yesterday afternoon in rear of the old Eagle hotel. Several hundred people witnessed the exhibition, among which was the typical small boy, "Jim" is certainly an expert with his chosen weapon, and his shooting yesterday would rank with some of the famous rifle shots of the day, inasmuch as he shot with a solid ball not bird shot. The tobacco sold was mostly from Buncombe, Madison and Haywood counties; however, a great deal of the weed is being hauled and shipped here from the counties in the extreme western portion of this State and East Tennessee. There will be several thousand pounds sold to-day from Mitchell county, where only a small portion of the county raises tobacco. We now have a complete corps of buyers on the Asheville market who can pay good prices for more goods than they will be able to get, even if all the tobacco is sold on this market.
