## A GALA DAY.

### ROBINSON & FRANKLIN BROS' GREAT SHOWS.

## A HAPPY EVENT.

### Ceremony at the First Presbyterian Church in Wilmington in the Presence of a Large Gathering of Relatives and Friends.

The Wilmington Star of yesterday gives an elaborate account of a marriage in that city, the bride in which was once a Goldsboro girl, and therefore the account of her marriage will be of interest to many Argus readers hereabouts, and all of them will join with us in wishing the happy pair the fullest measure of life and prosperity.

The Star says: "Within the walls of the First Presbyterian church yesterday afternoon at 5:30 o'clock Mr. Bertram Quelch and Miss Gerda Louise Bonitz became man and wife, the impressive ceremony being conducted by Rev. Peyton H. Hoge, pastor of the church. The interior of the edifice was profusely and yet truly artistically decorated for the occasion with ferns, palms, cypripediums, and the rarest of pot plants. The church was taxed to its utmost seating capacity by the relatives and friends of the popular couple long before the ceremony was commenced, which was promptly at the appointed hour.

"While the strains of Mendelssohn's beautiful wedding march were floating out on the air, direct from the organ, played by Prof. Russell, the bridal party entered in the following order: Mr. H. E. Bonitz, brother of the bride, and Mr. Ed. Huggins, of the two ushers; Miss Lesette Bonitz, sister of the bride, and Miss Harriet Burkholder, bridesmaids; Miss Lela Helbig, of Lynchburg, Va., cousin of the bride, maid of honor; Mr. Will Bonitz, of Washington, D. C., cousin of the bride; the bride attired becomingly in white organdie and veil, and carrying a choice bunch of bride's roses, then entered, leaning on the arm of her father, Mr. J. H. W. Bonitz, and walked up to the altar, where the groom and his best man and brother, Mr. P. Quelch, were in waiting, and in the midst of these dear friends and relatives, Miss Gerda Louise Bonitz and Mr. Bertram Quelch were pronounced man and wife; and as Lohegrena's wedding march was being rendered on the organ, the happy couple and their attendants left the sacred edifice.

"Mr. and Mrs. Quelch left on the 7:15 o'clock north-bound Atlantic Coast Line train for a tour to many cities of interest, including Washington, Boston, New York and Toronto, Canada. Upon the departure of the newly wedded couple the bridal party went to the Bonitz Hotel and were served with a magnificent wedding supper.

"The bride is a daughter of our clever townsman, Mr. J. H. W. Bonitz, and is one of Wilmington's most popular daughters. The groom holds a position in the shipping department of the Atlantic Coast Line, and is well liked and thought of by all.

"At the wedding the gentlemen of the bridal party wore the conventional black, with a small white carnation backed with a fernleaf displayed on the lapel of their coats. The maid of honor was habited in white organdie, and carried a bouquet of La France roses. The Armor Plate Board Preparing Its Report. Washington, October 29.—The naval armor plate board has returned to Washington from its trip down South. The board visited in the order named, Birmingham, Ala.; Sheffield, Ala.; Nashville, Chattanooga and Knoxville, in Tennessee; Bristol in Virginia; and Tennessee and Missouri, Tenn. The results of the trip is a mass of statistical information exhibiting the varied resources of the southern localities as the site for an armor plant, if the government should determine to build one. This information will not be printed in the report of the board, but will be held subject to demand from congress, in case that body decides to embark upon the task of selecting a site for the plant.

The board has now settled down to hard work, for it is under orders to have its report ready for submission to congress when it meets early in December. There is no time to spare for more visits to other towns which aspire to the possession of the armor plant, and to the many applications that are still flowing in upon the board the same answer is returned—a polite declination of the invitation. Mr. Fritz, the expert who has engaged to develop the details of the plant, in conformity with the request of congress, is working fifteen hours a day with a force of six draftsmen and experts, to turn his work completely over to the board before December.

Pleased With Tenor of Spain's Answer. Washington, Oct. 29.—The Spanish reply to Minister Woodford's note, concerning Cuba, which was received here yesterday, will be held before the cabinet at the regular meeting to-day. Meanwhile, the members of the president's official family have not seen the note. It has, however, been talked of informally between the president and several of the cabinet ministers and it may be stated positively that the administration regards the note so far as its tenor is revealed by the abstract cabled by Mr. Woodford, as being conciliatory, and as not calculated to breed animosity. It can also be stated that gratification is felt that the answer was forthcoming within so short a period of time after the delivery of Mr. Woodford's note, having regard to the intervention of the Spanish cabinet crisis and change of the cabinet towards a correction of some of the evils which we complain in Cuba are regarded as an earnest of the intention of the Spanish government to faithfully carry out the entire reform program, and if there should be a speedy alleviation of the frightful condition of the unfortunate reconcentration does it Cuba, through a prompt reversion of Weyler's concentration order, it is felt that our government will have little further to ask.

Johnson's Chill and Fever Tonic Cures Fever in One Day. Bryan in Ohio. Cincinnati, October 29.—The meetings of W. J. Bryan to-day and to-morrow at Mount Vernon, Newark and Shawnee, and were all largely attended. Mr. Bryan discussed the silver question at all his meetings and also reviewed the records of President McKinley and Senator Hanna. He said the first six months of the McKinley administration were the most disastrous in the history of the country. He charged Senator Hanna with hostility to labor interests and also with being the chief conspirator in the presidential campaign of last year, when the result was due to the twin agents of fraud and coercion and traceable to the money powers of this and other countries. Mr. Bryan warned his hearers against friends in Ohio. He said the Democrats got as many votes in Ohio last November as expected, but that the Republicans got many more than there is any reason to expect.

Princeton, N. J., October 29.—A son was born to the household of Grover Cleveland, the former president of the United States, at noon yesterday. It is said that the new comer resembles his parents in points of good health, but neither Mr. Cleveland nor the three family physicians will say anything in regard to the new comer other than that he is getting along nicely and is a fine boy. All the afternoon Mr. Cleveland had received at his home the many callers who wished to pay their respects to him in honor of the occasion. Some have congratulated the ex-president personally, but many preferred to leave their cards with congratulations and best wishes for mother and son. A great many telegrams of congratulations were received. Among the first to congratulate were his parents, his wife Mrs. Joseph Jefferson, H. C. Benedict, ex-Secretary Thurber and ex-Secretary Carlisle.

Princeton undergraduates have taken a great interest in the new Princetonian. The fact that a Cleveland heir was born was announced during the varsity practice this afternoon. There was a large gathering of undergraduates on the field watching the varsity and scrub teams practice. When the announcement was made, three Princeton cheers were given for the boy, three for the mother and three for the father. It is probable that the undergraduates will serenade Mr. Cleveland and his heir at some future date. On the college bulletin board in front of Keenon Hall was posted this notice:

"Grover Cleveland, Jr., arrived to-day at 12 o'clock. Will enter Princeton with the class of 1916 and will play centre rush on the championship football team of 1916, 17, 18 and 19."

The new baby's sisters are Ruth, Esther and Marion, whose ages are 7, 5 and 3 years.

Not long before his death General Neal Dow, who was nearly 97 years old, was asked the secret of his long life. He said it was that he had never worried. There is no doubt that worry drives many men and perhaps, more women to premature graves. It is impossible, however, for some persons, not to worry. They are so constituted that the slightest trouble, or even inconvenience, makes them miserable. They fret over imaginary ills as well as real ones. The habit grows and its wearing effect becomes worse constantly until the physical frame weakens and breaks down under it.

But the habit of worrying like any other habit can be resisted with more or less success. The battle against it should begin early in life; it should be part of the self-education of every individual. Natural tendencies can often be checked and in many cases entirely overcome. We have all seen persons who had exceptional reasons for worrying and yet were the gentlest and sweetest tempered of our acquaintances. These illustrations of self-conquest should be inspiring to us all. Most of us are apt to look for trouble when things are going reasonably well with us, we worry because they are not better. When there is no real trouble in sight we imagine that there is plenty of it just beyond the reach of our vision, and make ourselves unhappy without cause.

It has been said that we suffer more from dread of troubles that never come than from any actual experience. Old General Dow has given us a valuable hint and if we use it rightly it will conduce to our comfort and happiness and to our prospects of long life.

Old Cannon Cast Late A Tablet. Hagerstown, Md., Oct. 29.—Gen. Ezra A. Cannon, Maj. Geo. A. Davis, and Henry Heath, of the Antietam Battlefield Commission, are having an old 1,955 pound bronze cannon, which saw service in the battle of Antietam, recast at the McShane Foundry, in Baltimore, into a tablet 15-1/2 feet by 15-1/2 feet, which will be placed on top of a hollow column 100 feet high, which will be erected on the battlefield. The tablet will contain interesting incidents connected with the battle of Antietam. A platform will be built at the top of the column, from which tourists can view the whole battle-field and at the same time read the story of this great battle told on the tablet.
