TRUSTS DUE TO TARIFF.

The industrial commission that is engaged in investigating trusts heard some very straightforward testimony when it called Mr. Henry O. Havemeyer, president of the sugar trust, to the stand. He told them that the tariff is "the mother of all trusts." Ten per cent. is as high as any tariff ought to be, added Mr. Havemeyer. As the present tariff carries an average rate of about 50 per cent., it is plain that Mr. Havemeyer sees much margin for reductions.

Mr. Havemeyer tells the truth frankly, even bluntly when he says: "There probably is not an industry that requires a protection of more than 10 per cent. ad valorem, and it is to obtain what is provided over such percentage in the tariff that leads to the formation of what are commonly spoken of as 'trusts.'"

"With a protection to an industry not exceeding 10 per cent., all menace to the community by trusts would cease. This 10 per cent. would represent the difference in cost of production, and likewise act as a protection against surplus products of foreign countries being dumped in upon our local markets, thereby interfering with the regular and economic working of our industries. Any advantages that might then accrue to such combinations they would be fully entitled to, and the public would not be damaged thereby, as any expansion of price would be met by foreign competition."

Mr. Havemeyer speaks as an expert—a trust and high tariff expert. "I repeat," he says, "that all this agitation against trusts is against merely the business machinery employed to take from the public what the government in its tariff laws says it is proper and suitable they should have. It is the government, through its tariff laws, which plunders the people, and the trusts are merely the machinery for doing it."

There is not much more that need be said. If Mr. Havemeyer, who is in the trust business, whose trust, too, is a beneficiary of the tariff bill—if he does not understand the tariff-trust scheme, then no one does. His business has been conducted under it, he has fought for and against it, and when he describes its operations, all may know that an inside man is speaking.

IS THIS HUMANITY?

No other nation ever went to war on such high professions as our government made to its own people and to the outside world when it entered upon the conflict with Spain.

It was distinctly declared that we were to fight not for any advantage to ourselves, not for the expansion of our territory, the increase of our power or the glory of our arms. We proclaimed that we were entering upon a war for humanity, a war the sole object of which was to carry freedom to a down-trodden and suffering people who had bravely but ineffectually struggled against their oppressor.

That was a beautiful theory, but we will be judged by our contemporaries and by posterity by our conduct, not by our professions. We began the war for the liberation of men a little over a year ago.

Today we have an invading army in a land ten thousand miles from our capital. We are making war upon a people who are fighting for the same cause which in Cuba moved us to interfere as friends of freedom and humanity, the cause of self-government, and the people whom we are now trying to subjugate and hold in vassalage are admitted to be better qualified for self-government than the Cubans for whom we took up arms and whose struggle for independence we declared to be so righteous that we

could not stand by and see it fall.

The Filipinos had almost won their independence from Spain when we bought them. They were complete masters of all the Philippine islands except Luzon and held all of that except a few coast cities and a narrow strip of surrounding territory.

As a result of our war for the liberation of less than 1,500,000 people's 10,000,000 people of a higher grade, who long for independence and have fought for it as bravely as ever the Cubans did and who are better qualified for it, find themselves confronted by a stronger enemy than the one from whom they were rescued (?) by our war for humanity.

In a few months we have killed more of these people who are fighting for their freedom than their Spanish oppressors killed in as many years previous to the time when we began to bestow the blessings of our government upon them. The manner in which this war for humanity and freedom is being conducted is illustrated by many reports which come to us from eye-witnesses of unquestioned veracity.

Charles Brenner, of Minneapolis, writes that one company of his regiment took a few prisoners at the battle of Caloccar, how the colonel sent Captain Bishop to the company with orders as to the disposition of the prisoners and how then "there occurred the hardest sight I ever saw. They had four prisoners and didn't know what to do with them. They asked Captain Bishop what to do, and he said, 'You know the orders,' and four natives fell dead."

Arthur Minkler, of the same regiment; in a letter to his family, tells how one afternoon "we advanced four miles, and we fought every inch of the way," that he "saw twenty-five dead insurgents in one place, and twenty-seven in another, besides a whole lot of them scattered along that I did not count," it was like hunting rabbits, an insurgent would jump out of a hole or the brush and run, he would not get very far," and finally: "I suppose you are not interested in the way we do the job. We do not take prisoners. At least the Twentieth Kansas do not."

Is this a record of which the people of the United States may be proud?

Does this look like a war for humanity?

Did Spain ever do anything worse to Cuban patriots?

No Disarmament.

Berlin, June 19.—The Koinische Zeitung to-day announces the "complete failure" of the disarmament committee of the Peace Conference at The Hague.

Several provisions, it asserts, have been adopted in the committee by equal vote; but all of these, it predicts, will fail in the plenary sitting.

There is the greatest general disappointment manifested over Germany's refusal to consent to the court of arbitration. The Brussels Petit Bleu characterizes the conference as a farce if Germany does not yield.

The Hague people are particularly distressed, as all were hoping to see The Hague the permanent seat of the court. Germany's attitude is most unfavorably commented upon everywhere.

Murder Denied.—Hong Kong, June 19.—The report of the murder of the three missionaries, Rev. H. S. Phillips and wife and Miss Bir, and seven native converts, by a Chinese mob at Kien Yang, has been contradicted.

Trial Postponed.

New York, June 19.—The trial of Mrs. Barrow, the kidnapper, was postponed until next Monday upon application of Counsel Howe, who asked time for the employment of experts as to the sanity of the prisoner. The World to-day prints a photograph of a package of five thousand dollars in bills and asks who furnished them to Howe for the defense.

The Boers Campaign.

London, June 19.—The St. James Gazette publishes what it claims as exclusive information concerning the plan of the Boer campaign drawn up by General Joubert and approved by President Kruger. The plan includes the invasion of Cape Colony by the Boers, the capture of Cape Town and Kimberley, and the destruction of the Deber diamond mines.
