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Territorial News.

From the Prescott *Miner* of the 7th we learn that the Democratic Convention held in Prescott on the 31st ult. turned out a very inharmonious one. The trouble, it seems, grew out of the question of who should be nominated for County Treasurer. The friends of the two aspirants—Foster and Tompkins—were numerical in strength, and nothing could be arrived at. The Convention then adjourned from that day to Monday, September 2d, when it finished its business, and adjourned *sine die*. The ticket placed in nomination is as follows:

For the Legislative Council—John G. Campbell, of Prescott.

For Representatives—Wm. Cole, of Bradshaw; Thos. Stonehouse, of Williamson Valley; Thos. W. Brooks, Del Pasco Mill; C. H. Veil, of Prescott, and M. Peralta, of Wickenburg.

For Treasurer—John H. Marion, of Prescott.

For Sheriff—James S. Thomas, of Woolsey Valley.

For District Attorney—H. H. Carter, Jr., of Prescott.

For Public Administrator—Thos. G. Poddick, of Kirkland Valley.

For Supervisors—Gideon Cornell, Edward Kerr and Gideon Brooke, of Prescott.

It will be seen by the above ticket that the proposed compromise between the two parties did not "take." The *Miner* gives as a reason for this that the action of the Central Committee of the People's party displeased a good many Republicans, and gave rise to a feeling of disgust for the old People's party, and a desire to re-organize and set up the Republican party.

From the same paper:

A lively excitement has broken out here about diamonds. I. Q. Dickason, T. W. Brooks, W. W. Hutchison, Geo. Hogle and a score of other well known citizens are fitting out. All believe diamonds exist here, and as matters now look, the *Miner* force and a few store-keepers will be compelled to garrison Prescott.

NEW INDIAN AGENT.—We have a letter informing us that General Howard has relieved Maj. Dallas, of Camp Apache, from the position of acting agent for the Apaches, and has appointed Dr. M. Soule as such agent, temporarily. Major Dallas is, of course, pleased at having got rid of his Indian duty.

TWO MORE MEN MURDERED BY APACHES.—Writing from Camp McDowell, under date of Septem-

ber 1st, C. W. Beach says: "Two men killed on the San Carlos, by Indians—one a Mexican, the other a poor white man."

From the Tucson *Citizen* of the 14th, we learn that in accordance with instructions from the Indian Department, on the 29th ult. Gen. Howard issued an order relieving Ed. C. Jacobs as Special Indian Agent at the Grant Agency, and appointed George H. Stevens in his stead. Mr. Jacobs is ordered to report to the Superintendent of Indian Affairs at Prescott, for assignment to duty at Date Creek or Verde.

That reserve has heretofore been nothing but a den for Indian thieves and murderers, and whenever they brought in their plunder, Mr. Jacobs, a humanitarian, of course, thought it proper to reward them for their *bravery*. In support of which assertion we make the following extract from the *Citizen*:

"Time and again have the citizens trailed their stolen stock to the limits of this reserve, and in but one instance has any of it been recovered by aid of the agent in charge—that, one of Mr. Rickman's horses. Even then Mr. Jacobs said the Indian from whom he was obtained deserved a reward, and that if Mr. Rickman did not reward him, he (Jacobs) would."

We understand that Mr. Stevens is a man of a different style from Mr. Jacobs, and we have no doubt he will manage the reserve differently, thereby doing justice to both whites and Indians.

From the same paper:

SUPERVISORS' PROCEEDINGS.—J. S. Thayer appeared before the Board and declined to renew his bond as Public Administrator, whereupon the office was by order declared vacant.

The resignation of J. E. McCaffry as District Attorney was received and accepted.

TERRITORIAL SCHOOL BUSINESS.—The Territorial Board of Education met August 9th, when the following business was transacted: The amount of money on hand for distribution among the several counties was found to be \$563 76, which was apportioned according to the average daily attendance of the pupils. The average in Pima county was 109; in Yavapai, 31; in Yuma, 81; in Maricopa, 43. Upon this basis Pima county is given \$239 64; Yuma, \$174 60; Yavapai, \$66 83; Maricopa, \$91 69. An order was drawn on the Territorial Auditor in favor of the several County Treasurers for the amount due each.
