Territorial News.

The Prescott *Miner* of the 21st ult., commenting upon the Date Creek affair on the 8th, says that Gen. Crook had just returned to Fort Whipple when he received a dispatch from Dr. Williams, Indian Agent at Date Creek, informing him that Jemaspie, Chief of the Apache-Yumas, with between 80 and 100 of his people, had returned to the reservation, professing friendship for the whites and a desire for peace. Gen. Crook immediately went to Date Creek; held a council with the Indians, who agreed to stay upon the reserve; to report the fact to their Agent whenever bad Indians came among them; to help the whites chastise bad Indians, should they be called upon to do so, and to aid the authorities in bringing those Indians who had murdered the stage passengers to justice. The protection of the Government was pledged to them in return, so long as they would live up to their agreement, and they were assured that their past misdeeds should be forgiven. Gen. Crook is again at Fort Whipple, organizing a force of soldiers and friendly Indians to operate against the Apache-Mohaves and all other bad Indians.

From the same paper:

W. B. Hellings and E. W. Grover, two old citizens of Maricopa county, and who have been intimate friends for many years past, came here from East Phoenix several weeks ago, and were on the best of terms—sleeping under the same roof and eating at the same table—until a few days ago, when Hellings heard that Grover had made some remarks about Ed. W. Hellings, brother to W. B., which so enraged the latter that he sought Grover in the street, struck him, and, drawing a pistol, told Grover to defend himself. Grover was not armed, and everybody was of the opinion that nothing more would grow out of the affair, but, as bad luck would have it, Hellings, while coming up Montezuma street, on the night in question, met Grover, who was accompanied by C. H. Grubb. Words followed; Hellings asked Grover to take back what he had said about his brother Ed. Grover refused to do so, when, it is said, Hellings drew a large pistol and fired. The ball hit Grover below the right shoulder blade,

passed through the upper portion of the right lung, and coming out, made a slight wound on his left arm, above the wrist. He was carried to Col. Jackson's, where medical and every other aid was afforded him; and, at this writing, 12 o'clock M., Friday, hopes are entertained of his recovery. Hellings went immediately and surrendered himself to a Deputy Sheriff. He is now in jail. His version of the affair is that it was understood that the difficulty between himself and Grover was to be settled the first time they met after the street row, and that upon Grover's refusing to take back what he had said, and after he had stepped back and moved both his hands towards his back, he (Hellings) concluded that Grover was going to draw his pistol, which conclusion led him to commit the rash act.

The crops in Yavapai county are reported as pretty fair, more particularly the corn.

Dr. Bendell has succeeded in purchasing a great deal of flour from W. B. Hellings & Co., to be fed to such Indians as may come upon the reservations and behave themselves.

Prescott is having warm days and pleasant nights. Showers of rain occasionally.

The soldier who, a short time ago, shot and killed an Apache Chief named Sulele, at Camp Verde, has been tried and acquitted, upon evidence that the killing was done in self defense. Gen. Crook ordered the trial.

Gov. McCormick is in Prescott, and we are sorry to learn that he is suffering from a nervous affection of the eye. This, no doubt, will delay his promised visit to Arizona City.
