### Territorial News.

From the Prescott *Miner* of the 28th ult., we condense as follows:

Gen. Crook, upon receiving information that Ochoalima talked of going to the Colorado river to fight the Mohave Indians for the part their Chief--Irataba--and others of the tribe had taken in ferreting out the murderers of the Loring party, went to Camp Hualapai, and ordered Companies K, B and C, of the 5th Cavalry, (Captains J. W. Mason, R. H. Montgomery and Emil Adams) with a force of between 80 and 100 friendly Hualapai Indians, under command of Capt. Mason, to go after them. The good results are given by Capt. Mason to Gen. Crook in the following communication:

HEADQ'S DETACH'T 5TH CAV.,  
September 24, 1872.

IN THE FIELD.  
GENERAL:--I have the honor to inform you that my command struck the Apache-Mohave Indians about daybreak this a. m., after a laborious march of eight (8) miles on foot over a country literally cut up with deep canyons. Our surprise was a complete success, having attacked four (4) rancherias simultaneously, killing forty (40) Indians and wounding many more, also capturing eight (8) women and ten (10) children. The rancherias were on the brow of a deep canyon, and to surround them was impossible, thus allowing some to escape who otherwise would have not.

Officers and men behaved splendidly, and I cannot speak too highly of our Hualapai scouts. Their scouting was excellent, and when the fight came off they were not a bit behind the soldiers. I congratulate the Commanding General and the country in having secured so valuable an auxiliary. They are fully committed now. Guide Seaber did excellent service.

Please inform me, as soon as possible, what disposition shall be made of the captured women and children. Four (4) ponies were captured and turned over to the Indians.

I return to Hualapai by easy marches to-morrow. The fearful foot marching has made us all foot-sore. The Indians were found at the place designated in the accompanying letter, handed me by you while at Hualapai.

Whereupon Gen. Crook issued an order complimenting Captain

Mason and command for their brilliant success.

The recent victory over murderous Indians, by soldiers of the 5th Cavalry and friendly Hualapai Indians, has awakened new hope in the breasts of our citizens, who have suffered so long, while a foolish, mis-called peace policy was being tried. Crook planned this successful expedition against the late Reservation boarders. The officers and men who carried his plans out with so good a result have done well.

John F. Townsend, of Lower Agua Fria, in this county, has made pudding of twenty-eight Indians during the past four years, and ought to have a pension for having done so.

D. O'Leary was the best pleased individual in town when the news of Mason's victory over the Apaches came. Dan O'Leary organized the Hualapais, and but for a summons to attend a court-martial here, would have led the brave Hualapais to victory. They have great faith in Dan, and so have we.

The recent trouble in Mohave county, it seems, arose from the fact that Goodrich, the murdered man, had two young Indians employed in cutting hay, who, thinking that Goodrich meant to swindle them, went and asked their father what course they should pursue. He advised them to kill him, which they did do, with an ax, while he was asleep. The Sheriff of Mohave county--L. C. Wilbourn, publishes a long letter in the *Miner*, in which he states that, with a posse of citizens, he went to the place of murder to arrest the criminals. Failing in this, he arrested Churawoy (Captain of the Indians who committed the crime). When he arrived at the post with his prisoner, he found 260 warriors, armed with guns and bows and arrows. The Commander of the post--Capt. Thompson--ordered him to release the prisoner or leave the reservation. He left the reservation, but taking with him the prisoner to Hardyville, where he was to have a hearing on the 19th, for refusing, as we understand it, to surrender the murderers.

Mr. Geo. Tyng, has finished his portion of the beef contractor's business, and will return to Yuma county, and re-enter the field as a candidate for the office of Sheriff, a step his friends have four months past been advising him to take. While feeling sorry at having to part with so popular a gentleman, his numerous friends in Yavapai hope to hear of his re-election.

From the Tucson *Citizen* of the 5th we take the following:

Last Sunday and Monday nights attempts were made to steal Contreas' stock from a corral within the town limits, at the north end of Main street. The efforts are supposed to be the work of Indians. Other breaks of the kind were made in town this week and some small thefts committed. Every now and then an epidemic of this kind occurs here, and it seems one prevails now.
