Another Alaska.--New Settling Grounds South of Cape Horn.

In answer to a letter of inquiry in regard to a recent return from the Custom-house at Stonington (Conn.), the Bureau of Statistics has received from Mr. Hubbard, Collector of that port, an interesting statement with regard to important group of uninhabited islands situated south and east of Cape Horn, in latitude 61 to 63 degrees south, longitude 54 to 63 degrees west, and known as the New South Shetland Island.

These islands had not been visited for about twenty years until within a year or two past, during which time thousands of seals of a very fine quality, as well as thousands of gallons of sea elephant oil, have been obtained. Mr. Hubbard expresses the opinion that if these islands were properly surveyed and their positions well defined, a very profitable business could be done there. He says the nature of the voyage is such as to require a large crew, being somewhat like a whaling voyage in this respect. The vessels carry three or four seal-boats, twenty-six or twenty-eight feet in length each requiring a crew of five or six men. After reaching the islands they cruise about the group very cautiously, and often leave a boat's crew where they find a "rookery" of seals or sea elephants. These the crew kill as they deem proper, or hold possession of the "rookery" in case of competition. It sometimes happens that the seals are not in a proper condition to be taken, or that not enough have collected to warrant an attack. As the season is extremely short--not exceeding six or eight weeks--it is necessary to have a strong gang to take advantage of this kind of business. The voyage is usually of about ten months' duration from the time of leaving port.

Rich and Poor.

Now and again a Stewart or an Astor, or some similar success startles the rules of propriety, but the majority plod along from cradle to grave, with partly ambitions unsatisfied. A Reminiscence of the Siege of Paris.

So many balloons came out of Paris during the siege that those who received their letters by this means began a last to look upon the aeronaut as a very safe courier, and on his aerial trip as one of pleasure rather than of peril. Among the balloons which occupied over the iron girdle of Trentons was the Jaquart. It was intrusted to the care of a sailor named Leprince. Tearing through space before a gale of wind, the gallant young tar and his new kind of craft were sighted at New Rochelle, just as the wind bore him over the Atlantic. On the way he must have met with an atmospheric current which drove him eastward for there have now been found in Selly islands the dispatches carried by the Jaquart. As the sacks have not been picked up in one and the same place, it is supposed that when Leprince saw this group of island he gradually got rid of his dispatches, casting them overboard whenever he saw land beneath him. This must, of course, have considerably lightened the balloon, and consummated his own destruction by imparting to it an ascending force which wafted him once more over the terrible ocean.
