### Suicide for Love.

A melancholy occurrence recently took place in Naples. In the riviera di Chiaja resides Sig. Seraphine Rissi, the official agent of the Royal Lottery bureau, owner of a magnificent silk bazaar and a private banking house on the Toledo. He has a son, Giovanni, and two daughters. Mrs. Rissi died several years ago. The son had long lived in an English boarding house, in the strada Santa Catrina di Chiaja, kept by one Byrne.

Young Giovanni Rissi had been for several years a visitor at Byrne's house, ostensibly to procure a knowledge of English, but really to court one of Byrne's daughters. Mr. Byrne had two daughters, Eliza and Martha, who were accomplished and of great beauty. Eliza, the elder, formed a union with young Rissi, and both lived with the determination of becoming one day man and wife. The marriage day was finally settled upon, but Rissi's father objected. Mr. Byrne was indignant at the elder Rissi's objection, and refused to permit his daughter to hold further communication with the banker's son.

From the 6th to the 9th instant, nothing was heard of Miss Byrne or Giovanni Rissi. Rumors of an elopement were inevitable, the general belief being that they had fled to Scotland, where Miss Byrne had many friends. About 7 o'clock on the evening of the proposed nuptial day, when the sun had just set over the grand bay of Naples, and while thousands were going to the princely grounds of the Villa Reale to hear the music, the attention of a policeman was attracted to something which was occasionally rolled by the tide up the convex wall of the public garden on the bay. Tresses, the folds of a silken dress, and also the garments of a man made the gen d'arme hasten to the authorities of the dead-house and announce what he had seen. The morgue boat, with its dusky covering, was sent to the spot and the objects were hoisted on board. A young man and woman, bound

together with cords around the ankles and necks, were revealed to the men in the boat. The girl had been beautiful. The pearly teeth, chiseled features, and splendid auburn tresses, put the corpse-mongers out of their routine of cold carelessness for once. The portly form of the well known and universally admired Giovanni Rissi was then discovered.

The music in the garden was hushed, and the news of the discovery sped through every circle within the Villa Reale. A phial of prussic acid was found on Rissi, and it was proven that he and the girl died from the effects of poison. The bodies were taken to the late dwelling of Miss Byrne, and afterward the remains of Giovanni were sent to his father's house.—*Conservatore Romano.*
