Pima County.

From the *Citizen* of July 1st:

The farmers of Arizona, at least of this part, are successful this year in growing good crops and selling them at larger prices than for two years past, and mostly for cash. We learn with great pleasure that most of the farmers in Pima county will realize sufficient to pay all their debts and have money left. We hear of some having several hundred dollars to their credit now, whereas in years past they could not pay their debts. Notwithstanding the general talk of hard times, the success of the farmers is one worth rejoicing over.

The report that rich placer diggings had been found in the Chiricahua mountains, is not true according to all we can learn, but will not be surprised if such diggings are found. Many men are there prospecting for them.

The Arizona and New Mexico Express Company is in financial trouble. Whether it will be able to settle up and go ahead, we are not advised, but from appearances the prospect looks gloomy. We shall know more by next week and speak accordingly.

Captain James A. Moore, of the southern overland mail came in on Thursday and left yesterday in the direction of Yuma. He showed us a letter from Mr. Kerens stating new coaches had been bought for the line and also more horses.

Lieut. Philip Reade, the energetic and competent superintendent of the government telegraph lines arrived in Tucson on Thursday and will remain a few days.

Placer gold to the amount of 110 ounces has been received in Tucson this week, and perhaps more that we have not heard about.

Gov. Bashford left Prescott by Thursday evening's stage for Tucson.

McCracken Mine.

Decision of an Important Case.

A very important mining case has just been decided at Cerbat. We refer to the case of John Baker and Robert Orr, vs. Jackson McCracken, H. A. Owen and A. E. Davis, involving the title to the "San Francisco" claim on the McCracken lode. The case came up for hearing at the last term of the Mohave District Court, and was tried before Hon. Chas. A. Tweed, Judge.

It appeared from the facts that the plaintiffs took armed and forcible possession of the claim, driving off the defendants, or in other words—to use a *Piocheism*—"jumped the claim," and also that the plaintiffs obtained a deed from defendants, granting one John Tolvey, who had previously given a deed to McCracken & Owen for the same property. It appeared that the deed previously given by Tolvey was imperfectly acknowledged, and although recorded, did not impart notice. The defendant traced actual notice to plaintiff. The case was on trial 14 days, and was closely contested on both sides. The plaintiffs were represented by Judge Pitzer, of Pioche, Nevada, Judge Goodwin of Prescott, and Sam'l. Hamilton, Esq., of Cerbat. The defendants were represented by Murat Masterson, Esq. and Hon. John A. Rush of Prescott, and John Leonard, Esq., of Mineral Park. Judge Tweed found for the defendants on all the issues, and held that the possession of plaintiffs is not such a possession as is contemplated by the Statutes. The Court "went for" jumping claims generally. The value of this mine was admitted on the trial to be \$2,000,000.

The Winnemucca Register has been informed by parties connected with the Eureka and Palisade Railroad that the Company has contracted for 300 miles of track iron, and it is their intention to push the road through to the Colorado river at once.
