### TERRITORIAL.

From our Exchanges.

The Moqui Indian reservation has been established. It comprises 60 square miles and is situated northeast of Prescott.

The hills surrounding Tombstone present a fine appearance with their towering snow-capped peaks, glistening in the sunlight.

One of Pinal county's copper bonanzas has been bonded to a San Francisco company for 15 days with a good prospect of the bond being taken up.

Every dollar of Pinal county's indebtedness has been paid and there is still money in the treasury. What county in the Territory can equal that showing?

The Globe Silver Belt of December 30th says: "Three oxen of E. F. Keilner's logging team perished on the Pinal mountains night before last in consequence of the intense cold."

Hon. W. B. Horton, Superintendent of Public Instruction arrived in Prescott a day or two since, and is attending to the duties of his office here. We learn that Mr. Horton will locate his office in Tucson.

The statistics of the growth and development of the stock interest in Arizona show that before many years the cattle ranges of the territory will rival in wealth the rich silver bonanzas of which we have been so proud. It may yet be the leading interest in the territory.

Two rustlers were shot and one of them killed in La Noira on last Friday night. The dead man had been going under the name of Fleming, but stated before he died that his name was Benoit. The wounded man is named Woodbury and escaped. They were shot while attempting to rob a store.

The controversy over the title to the Reward mine, Coconino district, has been amicably settled and the owners are making preparations to erect a tunnel near the mine. They are now prospecting for water and think they will have no difficulty in finding an abundant supply. The mine makes a splendid showing of ore in sight.

Copper Queen is now working 5-per-cent ores at a profit. This is a most marvelous statement, but said to be a fact nevertheless. With the cheapening of coke and cost of transportation, hundreds of mines now lying idle will be worked at a profit. The copper interests of Arizona bid fair to equal her gold and silver produce.

The hillsides at Mineral Hill were dotted with camp fires New Years night and a large number of claims were relocated. People are beginning to recognize the merits of that camp and are anxious to secure properties there.

Another year will see it a booming district and there will be some developments there, the results of which will surprise the doubters.

The Mohave County Miner says: From a gentleman who has been topping at the Needles we learn that everything is very dull there and that there is no prospect of the bridge being commenced before next spring. Our informant tells us that out of six or seven hundred people who were there two months ago there are scarcely one hundred and fifty left and that it is a regular case of "dog eat dog" with them.
