Some of the Eastern papers are calling upon the Senate to consider all nominations made by the President in open session. The main support of the proposition comes from the Republican Senators.

Truckee proposes to get rid of its Chinese by ceasing all business relations with them. That method, rigidly followed throughout the country, would effectually settle the Chinese question.

Thos. Gates, chairman of the democratic territorial central committee has called a meeting of the committee for Jan. 8th at Tucson, for the purpose of appointing the members of the next territorial convention and fixing the place for holding the same.—Tucson Star.

The Democratic caucus at Fall City, Nebraska, in an election held there for the purpose of deciding who was the choice of the party for postmaster of Fall City, elected George Dorrington, a brother of "ye Sentinel man," he receiving a majority over all other candidates.

The U. S. Grand jury, who were recently discharged in Prescott, in their final report criticised the late legislature for allowing Clark Churchill \$800 extra pay, but failed to say anything about the \$3,600 appropriated to pay the present judges of Arizona. It is all extra pay. The deliberations of this jury were carried on under the instructions of Chief Justice Shields.

A member of the new Legislature of New York has been detected doing the Parson Dowine's act in helping the wife of a friend to pack her trunk. An enraged populace has firmly invited the prospective statesman to pack his own trunk and leave the place. Strangely enough, one member of a Legislature has been found who did not refuse to carry out the wishes of his constituents. He obeyed with alacrity.

Says the Phenix Gazette; The United States grand jury at Prescott charge Hon Clark Churchill with receiving eight hundred dollars in violation of law. This should be sufficient cause for Governor Zulick to remove the Hon. C. C. at once, or better still make him restore the money illegally appropriated into the treasury and then "boost him."—Tucson Star.

—What about the Democratic judges who draw extra pay from the territory? The U. S. laws says what their salary shall be and the U. S. pays it to them, yet they receive extra pay from the territory. This is sufficient reason for the President to remove them.

A Swedish inventor named Lagerman is credited with having overcome the chief defects in the many devices which have been made for setting type by mechanism. Even those who are unacquainted with the technicalities of the "black art" recognize that caution demands that the printed lines of a column or page shall be of a uniform length. This is accomplished by inserting blank spaces of varying thicknesses between the words. In all former machines this "justifying," as it is called, is done by hand after the letters are set in position by the apparatus, Lagerman's machine "justifies" each line automatically as it is set up and before the line takes its place in the column.

On a test, matter was set up and justified at the rate of 7,950 ems per hour, and its ordinary working speed is 9,000 per hour, while only an exceptionally fast compositor sets 1,200 ems in the same time. Two men may work at the apparatus simultaneously, one operating the lower key-board in setting the type, and the other at an upper board distributing type which has been used. From first to last the types are untouched by the fingers of the operator. The machine is on working exhibition in London, and is described as a marvel of ingenuity and constructive skill; the "justifying apparatus" being styled "the brain of the machine."

The press of San Francisco used to indulge in unseemly levity over dynamite "accidents" in England, but now that it has been discovered that right in the heart of San Francisco dynamite fiends were making preparations to destroy life and property, it does not seem quite so funny. For some time past the most inflammatory kind of utterances have been indulged in by Dr. O'Donnell and his satellites, at their Sunday sand lot meetings. Much of this was known to be the idle vaporing of cowards, but the extreme vehemence of some of these agitators, who had evidently European education on masonic subjects, led the Police authorities to some vigilance in the shadowing of these cranks. As a result, on Tuesday, four of the conspirators were arrested in their den, and a considerable quantity of death-dealing explosives was found on the premises. The names of the parties arrested are Henry Weisman, Charles Mitteltoedt, Julius Cesar Koosher and Oscar Eggers. The very names of the arrested are suggestive of Nihilism and rapine. Not the least startling revelation in reconnection with the arrest of these conspirators was the finding in their possession a document wherein twenty-two persons of prominence, mostly residents of San Francisco, were singled out to be made a sort of sacrificial or blood atonement of, to whet the appetites of these champions of human rights for the feast of blood and carnage they were about to inaugurate. At the head of the list stands the name of W. T. Coleman and at the bottom Dennis Kearney, sandwiched in between these are twenty names, such as Governor Stoneman, Leland Stanford, Judges Hoffman, and Sawyer, Mayor Bartlett, together with others of marked prominence. What good end was expected to be subserved by this "slaughter of innocents," it is difficult to imagine. But intelligent reason seems to be on part of the stock in trade of the class of malcontents to which these arrested parties belong. Wherever congregated, they will find ready pretext for resort to the cowardly use of explosives to accomplish their diabolical ends. In San Francisco, the presence of the Chinese is pled as the justifying cause. But similar organizations, with like lawless and destructive tendencies, exist in the principal cities of the East, where Chinese are so few as not to be taken into serious account. From this it is apparent that these dynamite organizations are not the outgrowth of local causes, but is, rather, and inbred perversion of human nature akin to that monomania that impels some to commit arson for no other apparent motive than to see the heavens made lurid with the devouring flames. If these extremists ever had a shadow of just grounds for resistance to or evasion of the edicts of these European rulers, it will become them to turn the weapons they used against tyranny upon the free and tolerant Government that has accorded to them safe asylum and complete equality before the law. A month has hardly run its course since one of the arrested was clothed in the full habiliments of American citizenship by a San Francisco court. Yet, the ink was hardly dry upon the naturalization papers before he is found involved in a plot subversive of the laws of the land, and which in full fruition would not only have trifled with the lives of valuable citizens, but struck down the Chief Executive of the Commonwealth. Men with such crude conceptions of the duties and obligations incumbent upon them, under their newly chosen citizenship, are not very desirable accessions to our population. The proper place for such is behind dungeon bars.

News from Walnut Creek, forty miles west of Prescott that Deputy Sheriff J. M. Murphy had been murdered there Sunday night, while attempting to arrest D. W. Dilda, charged with burglary. Murphy was warned of the desperate character of the man and was offered assistance, which he refused. Shortly after leaving a neighboring ranch firing was heard, and Murphy's failure to return caused a search for him. The searchers found where he had apparently fallen and had been dragged away, and his body in Dilda's cellar tied up in a sack. Sheriff Mulvenon and a posse have just left, heavily armed, for the scene of the tragedy. If Dilda is captured he will probably be lynched, as Murphy was one of the most popular men in the county.

One United States grand jury in Arizona indicts federal officials for contributing ten dollars to their party. Another jury refuses to indict legislative criminals for stealing thousands of dollars out of the public treasury. If this is democratic reform, the less we have of it the better.—Tucson Star
