Silver 102 1/2. The steamer Gila arrived at the Thursday evening. The district court adjourned on Wednesday morning.

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After thirty Years.

In the year 1876, during the month of June the mining camp of Castle Dome was the scene of a bloody fight between Fernandes Subiate and Francisco Acosta which resulted in the death of the latter. Immediately after the killing Subiate left for parts unknown. Within the past few years Sheriff Tyler learned that he had returned to the Territory at intervals making his home in Sumner. About six months he was informed that Subiate was employed at the Vulture mine, in Maricopa county, and with out delay secured his prisoner and brought him to trial on last Tuesday evening. The prisoner was defended by Judge G. M. Knight and owing to his counsel's able efforts escaped with a three years sentence to the Territorial Prison. Mr. Tyler was aided in his search very much by that energetic officer Wm. Blankenship of Phoenix. Sheriff Tyler is entitled to great praise in connection with this capture as well as the recovery of Canuto Soto, for whose apprehension the Territory offered a reward of which as yet nothing has been paid although the criminal was captured eight months ago.
