Land Office. The United States land office here is doing a rushing business. From July 5th, (the date when Judge Duff qualified), to the end of July, the office examined and passed upon 260 entry papers, wrote 390 official letters, fixed the time for hearing five contested cases, issued 11 notices for publication of application for patents to mines and 48 notices for publication of proof on agricultural lands.—Star.

A Leadville special to a Denver paper says that Pat Donahue was killed there while resisting an officer. He was at one time in jail in Socorro county for assaulting a lady but escaped and going to Tucson killed a one-armed peddler. Convicted, he was sent for thirteen years imprisonment, and after remaining three years at the Yuma penitentiary made his escape.—Ex.

Col. Geo. W. Norton has returned from Los Angeles where he has been for the past month working in the interest of the canal enterprise. He succeeded in interesting a number of capitalists in the matter, and a syndicate was formed, which proposes to begin water developments at an early day if the report of the expert, Mr. Joel B. Parker, who is now here investigating the matter, should prove favorable. Mr. Parker is thoroughly practical and from his investigations so far, believes that this section is rich in natural resources of soil, climate, and water.

Reavis, in a Los Angeles interview, brazenly says that his stupendous fraud is "practically acknowledged" by the people of Arizona. He will put in an appearance in the Salt River valley and press his suit with the same brazen effrontery as he does on the outside, he will get a decision in his favor mighty quick if Judge Lynch can only be induced to hold court, and there is but little doubt that in this particular instance he will gladly preside.—Citizen.

Mr. Ed. Mayes, president of the Antelope Canal Co., is in town having arrived on Tuesday last from Los Angeles. His company is ready to begin work on their canal as soon as the contract can be let. The money is now on deposit to pay for the construction of the canal and the contract will be let in a day or two. It is expected that the work will be completed by the middle of September or the first of October.

A large irrigating scheme on the Santa Cruz will be in the course of development in a few days. The entire valley west and north of Tucson for several miles down the valley will be brought under the new scheme. The money is all up and the water and land are there to make the same successful. Twenty thousand acres will be reclaimed.—Star.

Mr. Palmon Avila, one of Yuma's most popular and industrious young men, was down from his ranch on the Gila a couple of days this week. He has a large force of men prosecuting work on a large irrigating canal above the Mohawk. Two miles are already completed and before winter he will be ready to irrigate a large area of that rich valley. When completed the canal will irrigate 40,000 acres.

Quite a painful accident happened to Mr. C. W. Hackett, of Aztec, one day last week. While handling a bottle of ammonia it exploded, throwing the liquid into his face and eyes. He came down to Yuma Saturday and remained one day and went on to Los Angeles. He was suffering severe pain from his inflamed eyes, but no fears are entertained of an injury to his eye-sight.

Dallas McCord, Sheriff of Kern county, accompanied by his father, passed through yesterday with two prisoners, brothers, Theo, and Thurston Lee, who are charged with murdering a young man near Caliente six months ago, and who were captured in New Mexico. They will be tried for the crime, in Bakersfield, Cal.

Last week in noticing the accident which happened to Joaquin Olaete, we were in error in stating that he was knocked down by the engine. He stepped off the track until the engine passed, and then stepped back, not noticing the car which was following after until too late to get out of its way.

Mr. Mel. Greenleaf, for five years section boss on the other side of the river, having resigned that position, left last Wednesday with his family for Santa Ana. After a short visit there he will return to India, where he has accepted a position as manager of the Indian hotel.

While en route home last Tuesday, Deputy Marshal Will Smith discovered quite a lot of cigars and cigarettes in the possession of some Chinamen. On investigation he found that the goods had been smuggled from Cuba, and at once confiscated them.

GOVERNOR'S PROCLAMATION.

TERRITORY OF ARIZONA, EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT. Whereas, The Live Stock Sanitary Commission of the Territory of Arizona have directed my attention to the fact, that reliable information has reached them that contagious pleuro-pneumonia has made its appearance in a large number of animals within the States of New York, Vermont, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Delaware, Virginia, Illinois and the District of Columbia, and is liable to make its appearance in the State of Missouri; that the cattle interests of the Territory are greatly endangered by the prevalence of this plague in the said States, owing to the importation of cattle therefrom, and Whereas, The immense cattle interests of Arizona are thus menaced and a heavy loss upon this one of the most important of our industries is liable to occur, unless precautionary measures are adopted. Now, therefore, I, C. Meyer Zulick, Governor of the Territory of Arizona, by virtue of the authority of law in me vested, do hereby order, establish and declare a quarantine, to take effect on the first day of June, 1887, against all territory heretofore mentioned, embracing also England, Scotland and the Dominion of Canada, on all bovine cattle from said localities coming into the Territory of Arizona unless they are quarantined at the point of entry prescribed by the rules and regulations of the Live Stock Sanitary Commission of Arizona, for a period of sixty days, and retained there until they shall receive a certificate of health signed by the Veterinary Surgeon of the Territory of Arizona, or some duly appointed deputy under him.
