Acting Land Commissioner Stockslager has issued the necessary instructions to carry into effect Secretary Lamar's recent order, restoring to settlement and entry certain indemnity railroad lands.

The Florence Enterprise states a few perpendicular facts in regard to the climate of Southern Arizona. It says: "People suffering with almost any kind of disease and especially those affected with pulmonary complaints will find permanent relief by sojourning in the mild climate of Southern Arizona."

The people of the Pacific Coast are to be congratulated on the very material reductions which have been made by the Central and Southern Pacific railroads in the rates of freights and fares.

Following are the reduced rates of fares to principal points on the coast, 1st class unlimited: From Yuma to San Francisco, \$26.30; Sacramento, 25.80; San Jose, 26.15; Lathrop, 23.80; Stockton, 24.15; Ogden, 28.80; Santa Barbara, 13.10; Los Angeles, 10.75; Colton, 9.00; Maricopa, 8.10; Casa Grande, 9.15; Tucson, 12.40; Wilcox, 16.70; Bowie, 17.90; Benson, 14.70; Deming, 23.40; El Paso, 27.75.

The Los Angeles Herald, which has always maintained a firm stand upon the side of the people of Arizona on the Indian question, referring to the present Ute outbreak in Colorado, has this to say concerning the Indian policy of the Government: "Well, the usual Indian policy of the Nation has had its usual result. That devil in human form, the old chief of the Utes, Corolow, said with fiendish ferocity the other day: 'Me want big fight, me no want little fight.' The authorities waited, paralyzed, held back, coaxed, thinking he could be got back on the reservation by these means. The Indian question will not be settled until there is a law passed that every Indian must remain on the reservation; or if caught off his proper allotment, any man who finds him, with the mark of Cain on his murderous brow, may then proceed, as judge, jury, and executioner, to shoot, or kill in any other way, any full-grown, male Indian of any tribe or people."

Yuma county in the near future will produce immense quantities of cotton. The soil and climate are exactly suited to the cultivation of the king of textile plants. The few patches of cotton that have been planted in this vicinity, have grown magnificent cotton, and what is even more remarkable, these successful results have been obtained without any cultivation whatever. Dr. J. H. Taggart has cotton growing in his garden that will compare favorably with any "Peeler" or "Bend" cotton of Mississippi; the bolls are full and clean; the cotton of pure white, and the staple long, silken and elastic. In Judge Brinley's garden can be seen a cotton plant that is fourteen years old and bears cotton every season. It is problematical whether cotton growing for over one season would produce as good staple as that planted each year, but it is likely that cultivation would give the plant sufficient vigor to form perfect bolls and thereby obviate the necessity of replanting every season. The valleys of the Gila and Colorado are undoubtedly the true home of the cotton plant.

The subject of storage reservoirs for water for irrigating purposes, is beginning to receive attention in this territory. There are millions of acres of lands here that might be made productive if proper storage reservoirs were built so that the water which annually runs to waste during the rainy season could be stored for use when needed. The mountain ranges of the territory furnish hundreds of fine places which, by the expenditure of a small amount of money, could be transformed into storage reservoirs of great capacity. Millions of acres of government lands which are now comparatively worthless could be reclaimed by this means and sold for a fair price. If congress would appropriate money to build reservoirs of this kind the government would be more than reimbursed for the outlay from the sale of public lands which otherwise will remain unoccupied except for grazing.—Hoof and Horn.

The Arizonian is decidedly unhappy now-a-days. It raises a long, loud and disconsolate howl because Governor Zulick presumed to accept the invitation to deliver the opening address at the coming Territorial Fair at Phoenix. We are really of the opinion that there is no man in the Territory better able to perform that duty than Governor Zulick, and we believe the invitation to him was altogether appropriate and his acceptance thereof entirely proper. The Arizonian likes and dislikes has nothing to do with the matter and it only belittles itself when it tries to throw cold water upon the Fair because its feelings were not consulted in the matter. There is no doubt but that the Governor will acquit himself with honor to himself, the occasion and the Territory.

Justice Field, of the United States Supreme Court, has delivered an opinion on the application of the Pacific R. R. Commission to compel Senator Stanford and other officers of the Central Pacific to answer certain questions in regard to the expenditure of funds for the purpose of influencing legislation. The opinion of the court is to the effect that part of the act of Congress creating the commission which invites co-operation of the court in assisting the commission to carry on the investigation is unconstitutional. The court, therefore, declines to make an order compelling the officers to answer questions, and also declines to make an order giving the commissioners access to the books of the various construction companies.
