ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE DURANGO MINING AND SMELTING COMPANY.

We, the undersigned, being desirous of forming a corporation under and in accordance with the laws of the Territory of Arizona, do hereby adopt the following articles of Incorporation:

First, the names of the incorporators are Curtis Coe Bean, Thomas J. Hand and C. H. Dillingham, who, with their associates, shall constitute the Board of Directors for the first year.

Second, the name of the corporation is the Durango Mining and Smelting Company. The principal place of business shall be the City of Yuma, and Territory of Arizona, but the corporation proposes to carry on business in such other portion of the United States and the Republic of Mexico as may be found necessary for the proper conduct of its business. The time of the commencement of this corporation shall be the day of filing of these Articles in the office of the County Recorder of the County of Yuma, Territory of Arizona, and the termination thereof shall be twenty-five years thereafter.

Third, the amount of capital stock authorized is five million dollars divided into five hundred thousand shares of the par value of ten dollars each, and which is to be paid in cash or property within one year.

Fourth, the highest amount of indebtedness or liability to which this corporation shall subject itself, shall be one million dollars.

Fifth, the corporation proposes to engage in the business of placer mining; operating, developing and improving mineral and other lands owned or controlled by the company; mining, boring, digging for and otherwise obtaining from the earth gold, silver and other mineral ores; oil, coal, and stones; milling, smelting, reducing and refining the same; and the doing of all things incidental to such a business or necessarily connected therewith.
