Christy; junior vice commander, R. K. Farnsworth; medical director, C. D. Belden. John L. Burrows of Phoenix was elected delegate to the national encampment at San Francisco and R. H. Greens alternate.

Letter From Rome.

Mr. and Mrs. Louis Carrigan, who are well and pleasantly remembered in Yuma, are now in Rome. Mrs. Carrigan has written Mrs. Herbert Brown of their European wanderings. They went abroad in the interest of Mr. Carrigan's health, which, when they were here, was not of the best. They now have been absent two years and have visited many of the most interesting cities and scenes to be found in the Old World. At the date of writing—April 3—they were doing the Eternal City. She says, in part: "St. Peter's cathedral is too tremendous, too grand, to describe in words, although the hideous bronze St. Peter, whose great toe has been so worn away by kisses of the devout and faithful that, to protect it, the foot is now encased in a steel shoe, polished bright by kisses, seems to me to be the only thing to mar a perfectly gigantic whole. We have heard mass in the Crypt—an almost unknown privilege; have seen the treasures of the Sacristy with its gorgeous vestments; the Vatican museums; the statues; the frescoes by Raphael; the Sistine chapel, the crowning work of Michael Angelo; have gathered flowers in the Pope's private garden, but as yet have not seen the Pope. The portrait of Beatrice Cenci and the frescoes of Guido Reni's Aurora are, as yet, my favorite pictures. We visited the church of Giovanni Laterano—the cathedral of the people. We saw the table upon which Christ and His disciples ate the Last Supper, and the slab from Jerusalem on which the Roman soldiers are said to have cast lots for Christ's raiment. We ascended the sacred marble steps, 28 in number, which tradition says are steps of Pontius Pilate's palace, up an down which the Savior of mankind had to pass. A number of devout were also there ascending them on their knees. In the Baptistery we saw the old urn in which Constantine I. was baptized and in which Rienza bathed; heard the musical bronze doors, the construction of which was formerly attributed to a miraculous intervention of the Deity. We visited the Catacombs, that charnel house of the Italian dead; but, thanks! I would not care to see it again."

Indians on the Colorado side of the river are busy preparing their land in anticipation of a big rise in the river, due to the big snowfalls in the upper country. As a rule the crops raised by the Yumas are confined to corn, beans and watermelons, and while these things last they work not, neither do they spin, but loaf and eat. As on the great Nile of old, the one overflow of water must suffice for growing and maturing the crops. Additional moisture is drawn to the plant life by planting the seed in holes from six to twelve inches deep, it therefore has this depth of drainage to draw on. Watermelon vines, particularly, thrive well under these conditions and produce abundantly. To dig holes for a field of corn would entail too much hard work for poor Leo, hence he leaves it to rustle as best it can, on top of the ground.

Mrs. Bessie Trimble, convicted of being accessory to rape and sentenced to life imprisonment in the penitentiary, was returned to Graham county, by Sheriff Parks, on Wednesday last, the supreme court having granted her a re-hearing. The sentence against her husband, as principal in the crime, was affirmed. This is a case in which the woman is said to have held her daughter, an eleven-year-old child, while the husband and step-father committed the offense. He also received a life sentence, which he is now serving.
