At the Monday meeting of the board of supervisors the tax rate was fixed for the ensuing year at \$3.30 for the county except in School District No. 1, in which the rate is \$3.40. The different levies are as follows:

Military Encampment.

The militia encampment will be held this year at Camp Atascadero, California, which the men are expected to reach by October 5. Company H will leave Yuma for Phoenix September 26, and go from there to the encampment by the Santa Fe route.

During the encampment period the militiamen are paid by the territory at the rate of \$1.00 per day each. The government pays them as follows: Privates, \$15 per month; corporals, \$21; cooks, \$30; sergeants, \$30; 1st sergeant, \$45 per month, with free board, guns and uniform.

Doings of City Council.

At a meeting of the City Council Tuesday night, the tax roll was turned over to the tax collector. City taxes are now due and collectable, and become delinquent September 15, with penalty added.

The Pioneer Transfer company's bid to furnish 30,000 yards of crushed rock at \$1.14, was the lowest, but for some reason the matter was re-referred to the street committee.

The finance committee recommended that a record of all sales of lots by the Mayor be reported to the Council and entered in the minutes, and that the Mayor keep a record of sales in tabulated form so that information may be more easily obtained.

It was decided upon motion, that proceeds of sales of cemetery lots be used for improvements of cemetery.

The city attorney was instructed to draft an ordinance providing for the issuing of building permits within the fire limits and for the creation of the office of building inspector.

KINSBURY SENIOR ASSISTANCE FUND.

Mr. J. W. Kingsbury, president of the Farmers & Merchants Bank, than whom Tempe has no more public spirited citizen, has instituted a most practical and beneficial enterprise on behalf of the young men and women of the territory, who have an ambition to graduate from the Tempe Normal school of Arizona, but whose finances may not permit their doing so.

As the financial difficulties of such students are usually more pronounced during the senior year, when the expenses are naturally greatest, and then the desire to complete the course and receive the diploma more intense, Mr. Kingsbury has made this benefit to apply to the members of the senior class.

The benefit mentioned consists of a fund of three hundred dollars, to be set aside in the bank to be known as the Kingsbury Senior Assistance Fund. This fund is to be in charge of the faculty of the Tempe Normal school, represented by a committee, and is to be loaned at a low rate of interest with or without security to such seniors and under such conditions as the faculty committee may recommend. The object of the interest being to make the loan a business proposition to the student, and to perpetuate and increase the fund.

None but those intimately connected with the school can fully realize the extent of the benefit to be derived from such a fund. Every year a few of the most reliable senior find themselves in a position where a little financial assistance is an absolute necessity.

There can be no doubt but that many worthy seniors of the future, will be in a position to benefit by, and most heartily appreciate this practical donation and consideration of Mr. Kingsbury.

President Matthews of the Normal, in speaking of the Kingsbury Senior Assistance fund, says that it will result in untold good and will prove the way for many a worthy student to complete the Normal course who would otherwise find it impossible to do so.

Doc Carter's Nerve-trying Experience

Traveling 150 miles, with his hand shattered and torn by a .44 Winchester bullet while searching for a lost mine in the Castle Dome district last Saturday afternoon, was the painful and nerve-trying experience of Doc Carter, one of the best known prospectors in the territory. He slipped and fell and his rifle dropped and was discharged. The bullet struck the forefinger of Carter's left hand, crushing the bones and tearing away most of the thumb. He walked thirty miles to Kofa, where he says the doctor gave him small encouragement that he could save any part of his hand, so he came on to Yuma, nearly one hundred miles further, arriving here yesterday. He went to the hospital, where Dr. Ketcherside amputated what remained of the shattered thumb. He thinks the rest of the hand may be saved.

News From Up-River Country.

Quartzsite, Arizona, Aug. 17.—Petitions will soon be circulated in this district asking for an improvement in our mail service. One petition will ask for a mail service six times a week from Vicksburg instead of three times. The other will ask for a service three times a week between Ehrenberg and Blythe City.

The company which owns the ditch at the Blythe ranch has had a large force of men at work all summer on the canal. The force will be increased as soon as the warm weather has passed. As many men as can be used to advantage will be employed. The ditch is now completed for fifteen miles and when it is done it will cover 100,000 acres of the Colorado bottom land, which cannot be beaten for fertility.

At Blythe City, which is about four miles from Ehrenberg, L. J. Carrigan & Co. have a store which is doing a big business. They have two large kilns of brick burned. A Mr. Salano is burning a kiln for a building of his own and another party has 20,000 adobes ready for use just as soon as he can get the masons. This is only a part of what is doing at Blythe City.

At Neighbors, which is about five miles below Blythe, there is considerable activity in improving the place and a town will be built there. Palo Verde is the principal place on the west side of the river south of Needles, and is fifteen miles south of Neighbors. Hodges Brothers have the mail contract and run a stage three times a week from Glamis, on the S. P., to Palo Verde.

Mr. McArthur, at Neighbors, runs to Glamis daily with his automobile. In the cool weather he makes the round trip in one day. One might say that that part of California is in Arizona, for it has to look to Arizona for its markets.

The next twelve months is going to demonstrate that the Blythe estate will not take second place with any agricultural land on God's green earth. There is a party of surveyors in the field locating a road for a line to connect the S. P. branch which runs up by the Colorado with some point on the Santa Fe west of the Colorado.
