

Balance Will Broken.

A Peoria, Ill., dispatch states that a decree for inheritance tax has been entered in the county court in the matter of the estate of the late John Green Ballance. This decree will entirely unless there is an appeal. The respective amounts to be enjoyed by the heirs and the respective amount of inheritance tax assessed against the heirs were named and are part of the record. Virginia Ballance Cash, Charles Ballance, W. H. Ballance, Robison and William S. Brackett are to receive 75,082, and their share of the inheritance tax is \$550 respectively. Lillian Ballance, Rice Chase, Caroline M. Rice, Mary Virginia Rice and Montgomery Rice are to receive \$15,011 and their share of the tax is \$250. Hejice Ballance, Collins Bath and Constance D. Collins are to receive \$37,541. Fannie G. Ballance is to receive \$2,000 and Leslie Robison \$500. Messrs. Brackett and C. W. Robison are to pay inheritance tax of \$7,923.

Of the heirs above named, two—Charles Ballance and W. H. Ballance—are Yuma valley land owners and former residents of this county. Lillian Ballance is an osteopathic physician in Los Angeles. Fannie G. Ballance, is Mrs. Burt Dunlan.

Pleasure Plunge

The Natatorium, recently purchased of Tom Underhill by Messrs. Fogarty & Langdon, is being rapidly prepared for the opening of that resort on a pretentious scale. For a convenient and ample water supply they are sinking a well and hope to develop a good flow of clear water. The plunge will be opened within ten days. Everything in connection with the place will be re-modeled and put in first-class shape. The dressing-rooms in front will be improved and a reading room fitted up in the front part. The rear room will be transformed into a gymnasium and Turkish bath will be provided during the winter season, adjoining the gymnasium. The well is in a corner of the rear room. To invoke interest in healthful exercise Messrs. Fogarty & Langdon are planning the organization of an athletic club.

New Passenger Trains

That Yuma will get a new passenger train each way, at least tri-weekly and possibly every day over the Southern Pacific, is the announcement expected soon from official sources. There is already confirmation that these trains are being considered.

It is known that the Southern Pacific will completely revise its passenger schedules within the next two weeks. There will be some changes in the arrivals and departures of trains, because there will be an attempt to reduce the time of some of the trains in crossing the two territories. For instance, No. 4 is to have her time reduced in Arizona about 25 minutes.

Yuma Theatre

Canning Tomatoes Whole

This from the Rural New Yorker may work all right in the north, but it does not follow that it would be successful in Southern Arizona; still it is worth trying.

Select perfect tomatoes of even size, fully ripe, but not soft. Skin them by scalding, then pack in wide mouthed jars. Put them in carefully without squeezing, and do not fill the jars so full that the topmost fruit will press against the lid. Put in a little salt, then wrap a wet cloth around the jar and fill it with boiling water. Put on the lid and seal it tight, then put the jar in a kettle of hot water, deep enough to come right over the top, leave it there without any further cooking until the water becomes cold; then wipe the jar and keep in a cool place. It is said by those who have tried this recipe that the tomatoes when canned thus are like those freshly gathered, when used in a salad.
