Board of Supervisors.

GLOBE, July 24, 1882.
Board met pursuant to adjournment as a Board of Equalization.
Present—A. Bailey, chairman, and F. W. Westmeyer, Absent—Geo. Danforth.
On motion Board adjourned at 12 m. to meet at 3 p. m.

Board met pursuant to adjournment.
Present—A. Bailey, chairman; F. W. Westmeyer and Geo. Danforth.
Mr. Westmeyer moved that the assessment on the stock in trade of S. Klein & Co. be raised from \$4000 to \$4500, and assessment on house corner Pine and Cedar streets be raised from \$900 to \$1,000. Motion seconded by Geo. Danforth and carried.

Mr. Westmeyer moved that the assessment of Geo. A. Allen on two lots (50 feet front) on easterly side of Main street in Globe be raised from \$275 to \$350. Carried.

The assessment of D. M. Roberts on two horse and wagon was raised from \$30 to \$50.

The assessment of ore to Gila County Mining company was reduced from \$1200 to \$500.

On motion the assessment of Gila County Mining company on ten-stamp mill was raised from \$9000 to \$10,000.

The assessment of A. F. Southerland on house and furniture was reduced from \$2750 to \$2500.

Board adjourned at 6 p. m. to meet at 7 1/2 p. m. as a Board of Supervisors.

Board met pursuant to adjournment.
Present—A. Bailey, chairman; F. W. Westmeyer and Geo. Danforth.

The following bills were allowed: H. W. Fiske, \$5.50; J. Abraham, four days on grand jury, \$12; John M. Parrott, four days on trial jury and nine miles, \$14.70; Wm. Whipple, ditto, \$13; C. A. McDonnell, for Coroner's fees, \$13.45.
On motion P. C. Robertson was appointed registering officer at Grapevine precinct, and C. Cline at Reno precinct.
On motion the Little Giant precinct was discontinued and precinct established at Pioneer.

On motion Fred Willmans was appointed registering officer at Pioneer.

Board adjourned to meet at 9 a. m. July 25th.

Board met pursuant to adjournment as a Board of Supervisors. Full Board present.

Bill of Geo. E. White, road overseer, presented.

Danforth moved that the price for man and team be reduced from \$8 to \$7 per day. Motion carried.

On motion warrant was ordered drawn in favor of Geo. E. White, to be paid out of money belonging to Grapevine road district for balance due on his bill as corrected.

On motion the Clerk was instructed to notify the Treasurer to place the sum of \$261, out of the general road fund, to the credit of Globe road district.

On motion, the money standing to the credit of Stanton road district, viz: \$100, was ordered paid to Mack Morris mining company for work performed by them.

F. O. Linforth was appointed registering officer at Stanton precinct, and Thos. L. West at Rickmond Basin.

On motion the Clerk was instructed to advertise for sealed proposals for building foot bridge, as follows:

Sealed proposals will be received at the office of the Clerk of Board of Supervisors until 2 o'clock p. m., Monday Aug. 21, 1882, for building a foot bridge across Pinal Creek at Broad street crossing. Said bridge must be not less than eight feet above water channel, and not less than five feet wide and not to cost more than \$250. Cash on completion and acceptance of work. Plans and specifications must accompany each bid; also time specified for completion of bridge. The right to reject any or all bids is reserved. For further particulars apply to

On motion Board adjourned at 12 m. to meet at 2 p. m. as Board of Equalization.
Board met at 2 p. m. pursuant to adjournment as a Board of Equalization.
Present—A. Bailey, chairman, F. W. Westmeyer and Geo. Danforth.

On motion of Westmeyer, seconded by Danforth, the assessment of the McMillen Silver Mining company was reduced as follows: On mill, from \$10,000 to \$8,000; on hoisting engine, from \$3000 to \$2500; on pipe on hand from \$5000 to \$1500.

On motion of Westmeyer, seconded by Danforth, the clerk was ordered to notify Jos. Thompson to appear before the Board of Equalization, Monday, July 31, 1882, to show cause why a certain mortgage

given by J. D. McCabe should not be assessed.

On motion of Westmeyer, seconded by Danforth, the mortgage given by Knox & McNelly to R. E. Lillenthal for \$5000 was assessed at \$1400.

On motion of Westmeyer, seconded by Danforth, the following agreement was ordered adopted and spread on the minutes:

PHOENIX, Maricopa Co. A. T. }
July 14, 1882. {

This being the day mutually agreed between the counties of Maricopa and Gila for a joint meeting of the supervisors of said counties for the purpose of adjusting the debt between the said counties of Maricopa and Gila. Alonzo Bailey, chairman of the Board of Supervisors of Gila county, being present and it further appearing that said Bailey was duly authorized to represent said Gila county in all matters relative to the settlement of said debt, and after due examination it was found that Gila county was indebted to the county of Maricopa in the sum of \$7385, and it is understood and agreed that the county of Gila shall issue certificates of indebtedness in favor of the county of Maricopa in the sum of \$7385.
On motion Board adjourned at 6 p. m. to meet at 9 a. m. July 26 as a Board of Supervisors.

GLOBE, A. T., July 25, 1882.

Board met pursuant to adjournment as a Board of Supervisors. Present—A. Bailey, chairman, and F. W. Westmeyer. Absent—Geo. Danforth. On motion Board adjourned as a Board of Supervisors and opened as a Board of Equalization.

On motion of Westmeyer, seconded by Bailey, the assessment of stock in trade of D. Sultan & Bro. was raised from \$3000 to \$3200. On motion Board adjourned as a Board of Equalization and opened as a Board of Supervisors. Bill of F. Hatch, five days trial juror, allowed \$15. On motion of Westmeyer, seconded by Bailey, the Treasurer was required to file an additional bond of \$5000 in place of M. A. Baldwin, deceased. On motion of Westmeyer, seconded by Bailey, the clerk of the Board of Supervisors was referred to file a new bond for the sum of \$1000. On motion of Westmeyer, seconded by Bailey, the clerk was instructed to notify the Probate Judge to appoint three disinterested persons to appraise the property of S. Klein on corner of Cedar and Pine sts.; also property of A. H. Hackney, corner Cedar and Broad streets, occupied by Cleo Grime fronting on Broad street 50 ft. and on Cedar street 100 feet; also property owned and occupied by J. C. Robbins as a corral. On motion Board adjourned to meet at 2 p. m. as a Board of Equalization.

Board met pursuant to adjournment. Present—A. Bailey, chairman, and F. W. Westmeyer. Absent—Geo. Danforth.

On motion Board adjourned to meet Monday July 31, at 9 a. m. as a Board of Equalization.

Board of Equalization met at 4 p. m. Present—A. Bailey, chairman, and F. W. Westmeyer. Absent—Geo. Danforth.

On motion of Westmeyer, seconded by Bailey, the following persons were raised on their assessments as follows: B. F. Gardner on house known as Sycamore hotel \$400 to \$600; Mann & Martin on building, etc., from \$300 to \$500; A. Moody, on 30 horses from \$450 to \$600; Numan Ridd, on 2 horses from \$25 to \$50; A. A. and J. M. Ward, on 8 horses from \$96 to \$160; Peter Winkelman on 8 cattle, 2 wagons and 13 hogs from \$103 to \$201; A. Pringle, on account of money on hand, from \$32 33 to \$52.38.

On motion Board adjourned to meet Monday Aug 14th, 1882, at 9 a. m.
