COPPER.

The statement made in last week's Belt, that the quotation of copper which appeared in the San Francisco Chronicle for ten consecutive days, was erroneous, is verified by late New York advices, giving the price of Lake Copper at 12 cents.

Eastern mining journals, which are in a position to learn the exact status of the market, express the opinion that prices are now near the "borderland." The N. Y. Engineering and Mining Journal gives as a reason for this belief that if prices should be advanced much they would probably lead to the prompt reopening of some of the Western mines, and it may be deemed expedient to keep them near their present point to prevent a step that could not fail to put them down again to an unprofitable point.

The Lake companies control the market and it is not reasonable to suppose that they will permit the price to advance to a figure that would invite competition from Western mines.

It may be accepted as an unquestionable fact that copper will never return to a price much above what it is at the present time, and the probability is strongly in favor of its ruling lower. Every succeeding year new discoveries of copper are made in the United States and in other parts of the world, and the decline in prices of the metal has made necessary the cheapening of processes for reduction and of the transportation of supplies and bullion to and from the mines, and the copper companies in this country realizing the exigency of the case, are improving their plants and facilities to meet these requirements.

Copper mining in the West is yet in its infancy. Only deposits of extraordinary richness have been worked and these, with the crude methods followed and their isolation from railroads, have not been extensively developed. Yet it is now well known that the copper deposits in the Western territories, notably in Arizona and Montana, are of vast extent and richness. The mines at Butte and Anaconda, Montana, have become famous for their great production of copper, which has had a very decided influence upon the course of the market during the past few years. While their operations have been temporarily checked, it is evident that mines of such great value will not be allowed to remain long idle. In fact vigorous steps have been taken looking towards the resumption of work. Wages have been reduced, and the companies are making extensive additions and improvements to their plants, and within a few months will doubtless be in full blast again, better prepared to meet the competition of the Lake companies.

In Arizona, too, a revival in copper mining and a greatly increased production in 1887, is assured. The richness and other valuable qualities possessed by Arizona ores are well known and our copper in Eastern markets stands next to Lake in reputation and is, in fact, equal to it in every respect. Of the Arizona mines, the Old Globe, located in this district, stands prominent for the value of its ores and the ease with which they are smelted, carrying their own flux, and being run through an ordinary water jacket furnace, producing pig copper 98 to 99 fine. The mine never looked more promising than now. Large bodies of high grade ore have been uncovered in the past few months, which strengthens the opinion that the Old Globe is one of the most valuable copper properties known, and with cheaper transportation facilities it is destined to become one of the great producers of this country. The Copper Queen and Copper Prince mines, at Bisbee, Cochise county, and the mines at Clifton, Graham county, are next in importance, the Clifton properties having been until recently the largest producers. Their plant is an extensive and costly one. New furnaces are being erected at Bisbee. Next year will doubtless witness an increased output by copper mines in this territory.

Mr. Blaine's refusal to accept the proffered hand of Senator Edmunds, at the Arthur obsequies, has been the subject of general comment among politicians in the East. The significance of this episode is that should Blaine run for the Presidency in 1888, he will be openly opposed by Edmunds, and as goes Edmunds, so goes Vermont.

Two years ago not more than six rolling mills and steel works in the United States used natural gas as fuel, now we have a record of sixty-eight rolling mills and steel works which use the new fuel, and of sixteen which are making preparations to use it.

The latest scheme hatched by Oklahoma boomers, to gain possession of that coveted territory, is the alleged discovery of gold. It seems to have had the desired effect in causing an influx of prospectors.

Mr. Chas. Putnam hauled another shipment of ore to Tucson from his Riverside property this week. He gets \$100 per ton for the ore delivered at the depot. It carries silver, gold and copper.—Florence Enterprise.

The Florence Enterprise speaks of a gold washer, invented by a Mr. Sanders and now in use in the Catalina mountains, as a very successful machine, combining simplicity and effectiveness to a high degree.

A gentleman who came in from Globe this week says an Apache Indian gave him a remarkable specimen of silver ore a few days since. The specimen consisted of a piece of white quartz containing two slabs of virgin silver nearly one-half an inch thick. The Indian would not show him the mine, but led him to believe that it lies in the mountains in the vicinity of Dripping Springs. He will hunt for the mine as soon as the snow melts off the mountains.—Enterprise.

THE PROSPECTS FOR A BOOM.

[From the Denver Tribune-Republican.] There has not been a time during the past five years when the Eastern papers have contained so many notices as they now contain of fortunate investments in mining property. It is a common thing to read that "our esteemed fellow-citizen, Mr. John Smith, has made a very fortunate investment in Sky Rocket mining stock, and is in a fair way to grow wealthy from his share of profits." Men who have "taken a flyer," just in a spirit of adventure, find they have made more money by their venture than legitimate profits in hum-drum business would have amounted to in twenty years or more. They are looked upon by their neighbors, most likely, with some degree of envy, and the natural result will probably be that some of those neighbors will feel like taking a chance in the lottery themselves. It is what happens every time any man makes a fortune through a lucky venture, whether it be by a purchase of a lottery ticket, railway stocks, oil, ground or mining property, and probably will continue to be the case as long as the gambling spirit remains a part of human nature.

If these fortunate investments are reported over a wide enough portion of the country, the resulting interest in mining will amount to a boom. It looks now as if it might be widespread enough to accomplish that result, because newspapers in the East, from Maine to Missouri, are reporting these things. The community at large is divided, perhaps, upon an opinion regarding the effects of a mining boom. Some would welcome one, while others profess to believe that it would carry a train of evils in its rear which more than overbalance the good results. The good consists in a rapid and general development of mining sections of the country, and the creation of numerous profitable and productive mines, which in the ordinary course of development would have been many years in becoming known. The evil results we all know. Some of them are accompanied by depleted pocket-books, seared consciences, dissipated fortunes and shattered hopes. It is the old story which the world has been illustrating over and over again ever since the record began, and which there is little hope will ever be changed.


