ELECTION OF SCHOOL TRUSTEES.

The general election for School Trustees throughout the Territory occurs June 28th instant. District No. 1, (Globe) elects two—Jewell, present incumbent, holds over. The position of trustee is an important one and, therefore, the selection of candidates should be considerably made.

To be qualified as a voter at any school election, the person, male or female, claiming the franchise must have attained the age of twenty-one years, been a resident of the district for thirty days immediately preceding the day of election, and be the parent or guardian of a child of school age residing in the district, or who paid a Territorial or county school tax during the pending year. Any person offering to vote may be challenged by any legally qualified elector of the district and the judges must thereupon administer the following oath to the person challenged: "You do solemnly swear that you are now and have been a resident of this school district during the thirty days preceding this election; that you are the parent or guardian of a child of school age in this district, or that you have paid in this county a Territorial or county school tax during the past year, and that you have not voted at this election, so help you God."

If he or she takes the prescribed oath the vote must be received. Every person not entitled to vote, who attempts to vote is guilty of a misdemeanor. Every person not entitled to vote who fraudulently votes is guilty of a felony.

WAITING FOR THE CORN TO RIPEN.

One million eight hundred thousand pounds of beef has been contracted for for the sustenance of White Mountain Agency Indians, for the current year, 1,800,000 of which is for San Carlos and 500,000 for Apache.

Agent Wilcox, in his report to the Commissioner in 1883 said, "Complying with the wishes of General Crook, I consented to an arrangement by which some six or seven hundred White Mountain Indians were permitted to live near Fort Apache, in the northern part of the reservation. The conditions of my consent were that such Indians that chose to live there should be self-supporting, and that Gen. Crook should be responsible for their good conduct. During the fall and winter little trouble was experienced from the arrangement but the clamor for supplies has been loud this summer, and under the plea that they were planting and needed rations until the ripening of their corn, they have drawn heavily on the agency. The original number has been largely increased from the agency by relatives and friends, who seeing the advantages of a pleasant summer resort, have from time to time abandoned the hot valleys of the San Carlos and Gila." They are still there, doubtless, waiting for the corn to ripen.

The Phoenix Republican, of the 8th, says: E. F. Kellner this morning ships to Kansas City twenty-two car loads of Arizona beaver, gathered from alfalfa fields of the valley, but driven from the ranges of Tonto Basin. Mr. Kellner will in person accompany the train. It will be gone but a short time, returning here to prepare for another shipment. This rustling gentleman has engaged for the delivery to him during the next few months of about 2000 head of steers.

Mr. Huzman has opened a boarding house at the north end of town, in the large frame building which he recently purchased from Mrs. M. J. Moore. The location, near the smelter, is convenient, and besides containing a first-class restaurant, Mr. Huzman has lodged accommodations, desirable for men employed at the mine or smelter. July 1st will witness a change of contracts in carrying daily mail from Florence to Globe. Mr. Eugene Middleton, present carrier, who has the contract for carrying Wells, Fargo & Co's express freight, will remain on the road, making three round trips a week, arriving in Globe, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays, return trips Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. He is prepared to carry passengers in covered coaches.

GLENN REYNOLDS' WATCH RECOVERED.

Correspondence Reintne Thelero. We are indebted to Attorney E. H. Cook for the following correspondence between the Mexican and United States authorities relating to the recovery of the late Sheriff Reynolds' watch and chain, stolen by Apache convicts when they killed Mr. Reynolds, near Riverside, Nev., 24, 1889: THE OFFICE OF THE GOVERNOR, PHOENIX, June 9, 1890.

Sir:—I have the honor to advise you that I have this day received from the State Department, Washington, the watch, property of the late Glenn Reynolds, and the same will be forwarded by express to your address to-morrow for delivery to the rightful owner. I also send you enclosed herewith the correspondence between United States and Mexican authorities—and letter from Secretary of State, the Hon. James G. Blaine, transmitting the same and advising of the sending of the watch. Please have the kindness to cause a proper receipt to be signed and executed and sent to me for transmission through the State Department to the Mexican Government. Yours respectfully, LEWIS WOLFEY, Governor.

DEPARTMENT OF STATE, WASHINGTON, June 2, 1890. The Hon. Lewis Wolfey, Governor of Arizona, Phoenix, Ariz.: Sir: I have the honor to transmit a copy of a dispatch from our Minister to Mexico, regarding a gold watch, the property of Mr. Glenn Reynolds, late Sheriff of Gila county, [copy reads Tucson] Arizona, which has been recovered by Mexican custom guards from Apaches. The watch will be forwarded to you by express for delivery to the rightful owner.

As the Mexican government would be glad to doubt to be apprised of its receipt, I trust that such an acknowledgment may be made by the recipient through your office, as seems proper. I will forward the same to our Minister. I have the honor to be, Sir, Your obedient servant, JAMES G. BLAINE.

LEGATION OF THE UNITED STATES, Mexico, May 23, 1890. To the Hon. James G. Blaine, Washington, D. C.: Sir: I have the honor to forward to the Department in today's mail-pouch, a gold watch and chain delivered to this Legation by the Mexican Foreign Office, with the information that it is the property of the late Sheriff of Gila county, [copy reads, Tucson] Arizona "which was recovered in a recent encounter led by Mexican customs guards with some Apache Indians." The Mexican Government "with characteristic kindness and courtesy, has taken this method of returning the property to the sheriff's family. Upon the interior case is the inscription: "Glenn Reynolds, Albee, Texas, June 10, 1881."

Copies of the correspondence relative thereto is herewith transmitted. I am, Sir, very respectfully, (Signed) THOM. RYAN.

DEPARTMENT OF FOREIGN AFFAIRS, Mexico, May 20, 1890. Mr. Minister:—I have the honor herewith to transmit to your Excellency copy of a communication which the Secretary of the Treasury has addressed to me, advising me that in an encounter had by some of the customs guards with Apache Indians the former recovered various articles among which was a gold watch and its chain, the property of the Sheriff of Gila county, [copy reads, Tucson] Arizona. Said watch is in this Department subject to your Excellency's orders, so you may send for it, whenever you desire.

I renew to your Excellency the protest of my distinguished consideration. (Signed) M. AZPERRAZ. To His Excellency THOMAS RYAN.

LEGATION OF THE UNITED STATES, Mexico, May 23, 1890. Sir:—I am in receipt of your Excellency's esteemed note, of 20th instant, informing me that a gold watch and its chain, the property of the Sheriff of Gila county, [copy reads Tucson] Arizona, which was recovered in a recent encounter had by Mexican customs guards with some Apache Indians, is now in your Department, subject to this Legation's order. I beg that your Excellency will kindly cause the said watch and chain to be delivered to the bearer and that you will be pleased to accept this note as receipt therefor. Thanking your Excellency for the kindly courtesy shown in this matter, I take pleasure in reiterating the assurances of my highest considerations of friendly esteem. (Signed) THOM. RYAN. To His Excellency MANUEL AZPERRAZ.

The Belt is informed that the military authorities are making a most determined effort to capture Kid and his band, who are supposed to be hiding somewhere in the mountains in Southeastern Arizona. Troops and scouts from every post in Southern Arizona are on the lookout for them. If they make a move it is very probable that they will be captured. Secret service men are out in all directions.

BOARD OF SUPERVISORS.

Globe, Gila County, Arizona, May 13th, 1890. Board met pursuant to adjournment. All members of the Board present. On motion the District Attorney was directed to take the necessary steps to collect the delinquent tax for 1889.

The following claims were then allowed and warrants ordered drawn in payment: S. C. Heinenman, \$2; F. W. Westmeyer, \$2; W. Zimmermann, \$2; T. J. Blackburn, \$2; W. McFadden, \$2; B. G. Fox, \$279.75; J. M. R. Purrott, \$92.50; A. J. Arans, \$5; Jerry Ryan, \$164; Jerry Ryan, \$152.95; Jerry Ryan, \$216.30; Reuben Whiteman, \$20; Randall Delshay, \$20; The Sang, \$97.98.

On motion it was ordered that the County Treasurer be and he is hereby authorized to transfer a sufficient sum of money from the general fund to the redemption of bonds fund, to pay the bonds now due and the interest thereon.

Pine Creek Road District was extended to where the Upper Tonto and Rye roads fork.

The sum of \$2 was allowed to the six Indian witnesses, attending the District Court, for actual expenses in coming to and going from Globe. Board adjourned to May 14th, 1890, at 10 o'clock a. m.

Motion made by Supervisor Danforth that said J. H. Thompson be appointed to the office of Sheriff of Gila County, seconded by Supervisor Powers, all members voting "aye," Mr. J. H. Thompson was declared appointed to the office of Sheriff of Gila County, made vacant by the death of Jerry Ryan late Sheriff.

On motion the Clerk was directed to notify said Thompson of his appointment, and require him to file an approved bond within ten days from the receipt of such notice.

On motion A. Mauriel was appointed Overseer of Globe Road District, and his bonds fixed at one thousand dollars, and the Clerk directed to notify him of such appointment, and require him to file an approved bond within ten days from the receipt of his notice of appointment.
