

It is reported the renegade Apaches have killed another man, a Chinaman, just across the border in Sonora.

We have received the annual report of the Superintendent of the Territorial Insane Asylum, which gives the average number of patients confined in that institution last year as 75.

A railroad through the Gila valley in this county would secure all the Globe freight, nearly all the cattle business of Southern Arizona, and build up a country equal in every particular to the Salt River valley.

The damage wrought by the storm in Northwestern Iowa, on the 25th ult., seems to have been widespread and serious. The inundation covered portions of ten counties, and in addition to the loss of a dozen or more lives, hundreds of houses were washed away.

Louisiana is to have a sugar school, which will be conducted in connection with the regular sugar experiment station at Audubon Park. There is a sugar school at Brunswick, Germany, and steps are being taken to organize one in Belgium.

Advices from Yuma yesterday are to the effect that the Colorado river has found a subterranean passage into the great basin of the Colorado Desert and is emptying its floods therein. On Sunday last a lake of fresh water five miles wide had taken the place of the parched desert, and at Salton Station the water was approaching so rapidly that the machinery was being removed out of the salt works for safety.

Richard Goederle, a professor of music in New Jersey, sailed from New York for Germany on the 27th ult., with the avowed intention of fighting a duel with the Emperor of Germany, whom he has challenged. The professor's trouble began twenty-nine years ago.

A San Francisco dispatch to the Star says: An evening paper says that Lieutenant Benjamin S. Weyer of the First United States Infantry, stationed at Benicia, is missing, and it is rumored he has deserted and gone to Chili with a young woman from Fort Bidwell, who passed under the name of Miss Rose Hooper.

Last Saturday twenty-six Cliftonites and Morencinites were in the city en route to Florence to serve as jurors in the United States court. There were twenty-seven men summoned, but only one man, Cashier Hopkins, was smooth enough to get off.
