THE ISSUES BEFORE THE PEOPLE.

The partisan press has raised the statehood fetic in an attempt to blind the voters of the territory to the real issues of the campaign. Republicans as well as democrats know full well that statehood for Arizona is a very remote possibility. As a talisman it has lost its power to conjure with. The records of the nineteenth legislature and of the McCord administration are mighty poor credentials with which to go before congress asking autonomy for Arizona. The statehood bantling was accouced and nursed by the political push of both parties with the design to create more offices, and more opportunities to plunder the taxpayers. The political history of Arizona furnishes an almost unbroken record of corruption and imbecility in the administration of affairs, and the territory is today groaning under excessive taxation and a debt, including county and municipal, of more than \$3,000,000. It is certain, if under the restraints placed upon territories by the federal laws Arizona has reached the breakers which wash the rocks of bankruptcy, these restraints removed, we could not hope to escape financial destruction.

The vital issues before the people of Arizona are the reform of territorial and county government, and the silver question. The first is more important at this time, because it is more urgent, and there is opportunity of accomplishing much toward securing better government and an abatement of taxes if the business men and property owners can be aroused from their apathy and induced to take an active interest in political affairs. We believe that reforms could best be accomplished by the organization in every county of a citizens' league independent of any political party. An organization of this kind, comprising the business men, property owners, and representatives of the mining, cattle and agricultural interests, could exert a powerful influence upon the existing political parties by urging the nomination of clean and competent men for office, and by supporting only such men in elections.

There is too much disposition among business men to shirk their political responsibilities, because they do not want to give the time from their private affairs, or for fear that they might make enemies which would injure them in their business. So long as the influential business men of the territory pursue this narrow, short sighted policy, just so long will we have corruption and mismanagement in our government. A citizens' league in Globe might exert a salutary influence in many directions. There are many abuses to correct and questions affecting the welfare and progress of the town and county to determine.

The silver question is one upon which we cannot hope for immediate action, but it is nevertheless advisable and necessary to keep it prominently before the people, as the one great issue intimately affecting the prosperity of the west. Arizona, although she has no direct voice in national affairs, nevertheless, exerts an influence which is of no small importance to advocates of silver coinage, and the agitation of other questions should not be permitted to dwarf the issue of free silver coinage.

REVENUE STAMPS NOT NEEDED.

Rules Governing Applications For Pardon.
Notice of application for pardon should be published at least two weeks in some newspaper in the county where the crime was committed for which the application was made.
All applications for pardon should be accompanied by a petition signed by at least twenty-five reputable citizens of the locality where the crime was committed.
These should accompany the application a recommendation to clemency and reasons therefor, signed by two-thirds of the Grand Jury which indicted, two-thirds of the trial jury which convicted, the District Attorney who prosecuted, and the judge who sentenced the prisoner.
If the required signatures of Judge, District Attorney and jurors cannot be obtained because of death or absence of any number of them from the Territory, the facts in that regard should be stated.
After an application for a pardon in due form, and in accordance with these requirements, is received at the Executive Office, it will be forwarded to the Superintendent of the Territorial Prison for report as to the prisoner's conduct while in confinement, and for the recommendation of the Superintendent.
After the latter recommendation is received by the Executive, the case will be reviewed and considered by him and such action taken as he may deem proper.
These rules do not apply to pardons for the restoration of citizenship at the expiration of a prisoner's term, when such pardon appears desired.
A strict compliance with the above regulations will expedite action in pardon cases.
