The failure of property owners and business men to attend the meeting called for Tuesday night, to devise means to pay for the water privilege for fire protection is greatly to be regretted. It is imperative that immediate action be taken, to avoid the disbanding of the hose company and the serious consequences which would follow.

The energetic preparations going on in many parts of the territory for the celebration of the Fourth of July, insure a more general and enthusiastic observance of the day than was ever witnessed in Arizona. Globe will vie with other communities in the territory for a patriotic demonstration. The detonation of giant powder will resound in this dimple on Pinal mountain, the eagle will scream, flags will float on the breeze, and martial music will inspire the multitude. Globe will ably maintain her reputation for progress and patriotism.

There is consternation in the ranks of federal office holders in Arizona over the appointments already announced, and the further changes foreshadowed in press dispatches. C. H. Akers, who has made an acceptable secretary of the territory, will give way to I. T. Stoddard of Yavapai county, and William Griffith, whom we thought everybody liked, and who has filled the office of United States marshal with ability, is to be succeeded by M. H. McCord of Phoenix. U. S. Attorney Morrison and Surveyor General George Christ, both good men, are to be turned down also, it is said. Governor Murphy is the high lord executor, and heads must fall when he gives the word. Such is politics. The most fortunate are permitted to hark in the favor of the administration for a brief season and then the axe falls.

A MORMON'S WILL

The will of George Q. Cannon, the dead Mormon leader, is an interesting document to the resident of the east. The will provides for the four wives of the dead Mormon and gives to each one of his thirty-three children a small portion of his farm of 33,000 acres. After taking care of the offspring in further manner and making sundry bequests of various importance, the residue of an exceedingly valuable estate is placed at the disposal of the George Q. Cannon association, which is composed of the thirty-three children of the decedent, along with some others near of kin who have been included. The estate is to be managed by the association for the profit of the members for a series of years.

MINING DIVIDENDS

The dividends disbursed in the month of May by concerns identified with the mineral industry, as reported to the Engineering and Mining Journal, amount to \$6,586,925, which is a falling off from the total of the previous month. Nevertheless, the dividends paid since January 1st amounted to the satisfactory total of \$62,095,046, and from reports received we may expect an increase in the payments by metal miners this year over 1900.

In May a number of companies reduced their dividend rate to satisfy certain expenses for the betterment of their properties; others increased it, while a few resumed payments after a long absence from our dividend list, and some made their first declaration. Of the dividends disbursed in May the copper, gold, silver, lead, zinc and quicksilver mines and metallurgical plants, paid \$2,520,599, or 38.3 per cent of the total.

Of course the dividends paid by reporting mines represents only a moderate proportion of the total profits realized from the mining industry, as many of the large producers, especially of copper and the precious metals, refuse to make public their transac-

tions, but the published reports are sufficient to indicate that mining is the most profitable industry in the United States today.

Pastour Treatment was Effective.

Sheriff W. C. Truman, of Pinal county, and Fletcher Doar, son of Judge Doan, have returned to their homes in Florence, from Chicago, where they went more than a month ago for treatment at the Pasteur Institute for bites of a dog suffering with hydrophobia. It was maintained for years that rabies were unknown in Arizona, but in this case there was no room for doubt, as the dog which bit them exhibited all the symptoms in a marked degree, and two Belgian hares which were inoculated by virus from the afflicted dog died within twenty-four hours.

Considerable anxiety was felt for Messrs. Truman and Doan by relatives and friends; and they themselves were apprehensive of the result of the bites until they reached Chicago and begun the treatment, which was continued for fifteen days, the period which authorities aver removes all danger of the development of rabies.

Judge Doan is gratified by the news of their safe return home, in good health and spirits.
