

## THE PROSPEROUS WEST

### The Day of Legitimate Mining Now At Hand

The mining industry of the western part of the United States has today a most satisfactory outlook. The labor situation seems to be improving along natural lines and the building of railroads and extension of transportation into many new districts is already under way or assured. The development of the region in agriculture and in some cases in manufacturing and the inauguration of the expensive irrigation programme by the government, will all benefit mining. More than that, the active men in charge of mining in the west are today more skilled and competent than ever before.

These reasons alone would insure prosperity, but in addition to this, there is a general upward tendency of business throughout the whole country and the recently discovered new mining districts in the west are attracting general attention from investors everywhere.

There is a better understanding today of the nature of the mining business and the legitimate ways in which to engage in it than ever before, and the growing records of dividends from the western mines are bound to attract men and money. The day of the bonanza proposition is passed and the day of legitimate mining seems to be at hand and with the better understanding of the mineral resources of the west there will surely come more extensive and systematic development than has ever yet been undertaken.—Mining World.

### Salton Basin Filling With Fresh Waters

The great Salton basin, lying west of the Colorado river in California, which is two hundred and forty feet lower than sea level, is again filling with fresh water from the Colorado river. It will be remembered by those familiar with history that Fremont, in his expedition to the Pacific, recommended that the government cut a channel from the Colorado river to the Salton basin, which in time would be the means of establishing a great inland fresh-water lake in the very heart of the desert country of the southwest. The effect of such a vast body of fresh water on climatic conditions is somewhat problematical but all scientists agree that it would be vastly beneficial, and might in time transform the arid southwest into a natural agricultural section, where cereals and other crops could be grown without irrigation. What man has neglected to attend to for all these years nature now seems to be doing, and it may be that a great inland sea will soon exist in a section noted the world over as the driest and hottest spot on the face of the earth. In this connection the following from the Yuma Sun will be read with interest: "The opening of the river into the Padrones is small and in former times, except in flood season, no water flowed from it into the Salton sink, and the floods seldom lasted long enough for the overflow channel to be cut to any great depth. The opening of the intake on Mexican territory has allowed the unprecedented and long continued floods of this spring to run into the canal, and being turned into the Padrones at the check gate, the water has been running down New river and other overflow channels so long and in such volume that it has cut the passages to great depth, and it will cost many thousands of dollars to dam them. The water in the sink is now as high as in 1891 and is still rising. It will take many years, even if unchecked, to rise high enough to reach the lands of the irrigated districts, but it is nearing the main track of the Southern Pacific and unless something is done quickly this will be covered, and many miles of the track will have to be changed and rebuilt on higher ground."

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
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
