COMMUNICATED

To the Editor of the SILVER BELT: On the 27th of July last appeared in the Los Angeles Times the following item:

"He can't keep from cattle. No sooner gets out of prison than he again steals.

"Incident suggesting unusual criminal propensity observed in action of former Arizona sheriff, recently released from Yuma penitentiary on parole."—By The Associated Press F. M. Phoenix, Ariz., July 26.—An incident suggesting unusual perversity of character is instanced in the arrest by officers of Pinal county of W. T. Armstrong. He was formerly sheriff of Gila county and shortly after the expiration of his term of office was arrested by rangers on the charge of stealing cattle. It is alleged that he had been engaged in doubtful transactions for a long time. There were several counts and on one he was convicted and sentenced to the penitentiary at Yuma.

Armstrong's time in prison is now approaching an end; but a few weeks ago he was released on parole on promise of good behavior, for the reason that a daughter was believed to be dying of consumption and he desired very much to be at home. He had been re-arrested on the charge of again engaging in crooked operations with live stock and will be sent back to finish his term after which it is probable he will be tried for his later crime."

On the 31st of July an item substantially similar to the above appeared in the El Paso Times and similar items

have been going the rounds of the newspapers of Arizona.

It is evident that the foregoing items were not prompted by a sense of justice, but a feeling of resentment and malice.

The items contain a gross misstatement of facts, and are only designed to mislead and prejudice the public against Mr. Armstrong and to prejudice his case before he can be given an opportunity to be heard in his own defense.

As a matter of fact Mr. Armstrong was sentenced to serve in the penitentiary at Yuma a term of five years. Instead of his time being about to expire, as stated, he would still have about four years more to serve. Mr. Armstrong is not out on parole or promise of good behavior, as stated; but because on the 30th of March, last, the supreme court of the territory, not only reversed the proceedings of the lower court, but absolutely dismissed all proceedings against him and ordered his immediate discharge, and which was accordingly done.

It is beneath the dignity of the supreme court to extend to any individual any special favors because of sickness in his family, or otherwise, as stated in said items. The reading of the opinion as delivered by Kent, C. J., will convince the most biased and prejudiced of the correctness of the views entertained by the entire court.

The fact that Mr. Armstrong was once sheriff of Gila county can scarcely be considered of much weight either one way or the other. In that official position he had more opportunities to steal, and if he had the disposition accorded to him he could, like others, have become a defaulter, which would have been far more profitable than stealing a few head of cattle.

The writer of this only desires to see justice done, and does not wish to cause any reflection to be cast upon the officials of this or any other county, or the ranger forces. Perhaps, sometimes in their zeal, they may overstep the limits of their authority and unintentionally commit an injustice; and, too, after, impatient of delay, proceed to try an accused in the newspaper or upon the streets, with self-made evidence manufactured for the occasion, without the interposition of a court of justice, that will always indulge in the presumption of the innocence of the accused until his guilt is established beyond a reasonable doubt.
