BULLION SHIPMENT.

BULLIONVILLE RAILROAD.—To-day Gen. A. L. Page will commence the grading for the Bullionville Railroad—when to show his good will on behalf of the enterprise our friend Pat Holland proposes to propel the first wheelbarrowful of earth. He probably will not make a full day, but while he is at it he expects to scratch dirt amazingly. Gen. Page intends to push the work right ahead, and as he has all the iron and rolling stock engaged, and some of it on the way hither, there will be no let up until the completion of the undertaking and the freight cars are carrying large quantities of the rich ore that has already made Picoche so famous—what with the daily developments taking place in our mines, the improvements shown by the increased yield of bullion, when the facilities afforded by the railway of cheap and expeditious transit of ore extended, Picoche will roll out a silver tide that will make even the famous Comstock look to the preservation of its laurels.

DRY GOODS COMING.—J. Finlayson, formerly of Hamilton, leaves Picoche this morning's stage for San Francisco, where he will negotiate for a large stock of ladies' wear and gentlemen's furnishing goods. He has arranged with Mr. H. Ward who will rebuild and refit his store, which, when completed, will be 23x45 feet. Mr. Ward will remove his furniture establishment upstairs. Mr. Finlayson is well known by many in this portion of Nevada, and they all know he keeps none but the best articles of dry goods, etc. It is calculated the store will be open in six weeks from date.

EXCELSIOR.—This great mine improves daily. Eight hundred tons of ore now on the dump ready for the mill, which would have been worked long since, but for the fact that a large quantity of tailings from the old Burke ores, which has lain in Bullionville for a long time, is to be worked first, when the Excelsior will have a chance. The old 5-stamp has been idle for a time undergoing repairs, but will be in readiness this week. Late assays from the Excelsior show as high as \$2,268 per ton. Good results will be looked for when this lot of ore is milled.

REV. FATHER SCANLAN.—We regret to learn that this gentleman, who has discharged his clerical duties with so much acceptability to his congregation, departs this morning. Father Scanlan leaves behind him many warm friends, who will always remember his sojourn with feelings of the sincerest regard. He labored zealously in the cause of christianity, and through his exertions the neat little church was erected on Meadow Valley street.

THE BOARD OF EQUALIZATION will meet daily from 10 to 12 in the forenoon and from 2 to 4 in the afternoon of each day, until the business of the Board is completed. Those who have received notification respecting a contemplated increase on their assessments will do well to be on hand and show cause. Parties having complaints to make respecting the amount of assessments had also better be on time.

JOLLY TRAVELER.—The shaft on this mine has reached a depth of 100 feet. A drift will shortly be run across the vein. Saturday evening, just before the contractors left, they discovered a small vein coming into the shaft—no doubt a leader to the main ledge. Mr. Caldwell, the Superintendent, has great faith in the Traveler and we have no doubt but the mine will prove itself of great value before long.

WESTERN UNION TELEGRAPH.—We are glad to be able to announce that this new line is in working order and will be ready to transmit messages to-day. The opening of this line will afford increased telegraphic facilities that have long been needed, and of which the citizens of Picoche will no doubt avail themselves. The office of the company is at Bishop's drug store, Main street.

FINE BULLION.—Another fine bar of bullion has been produced from ore from the Chief of the Hill, which can be seen by dropping into the State Bank of Nevada. Its weight is 1616 ounces and \$32 fine—gold value, \$33.45; total value, \$1,771.78. This makes \$6,900 turned out by the Chief and more will be brought from the mill in a day or so. This will help swell the already immense shipments from Picoche.

ARRIVING.—Our streets are daily crowded with teams bringing goods from either Salt Lake or Toano. Immense quantities of supplies are being received by our merchants, who show that they not only believe in the continued prosperity of Picoche but also that ere winter sets in sufficient stocks will be on hand to meet all contingencies.

POSTOFFICE WANTED.—The people of Eagle and Rose Valleys are sadly in want of postal facilities. Having no postoffice they are put to the inconvenience of coming to Picoche for their mail. We would suggest that the people most interested petition the Postoffice Department for a redress of their grievances.

SUNBEAM.—The owners of this mine have been timbering the shaft for some time past. They will complete their hoisting works and steam up by the 5th of the present month. Considerable ore is in sight and the vein widens as sinking progresses.

CHIEF DISTRICT.—Work is being commenced on the Black Hawk Ledge, by Raymond & Company. Ore is being taken out valued at \$100 per ton, and the ledge is looking fine. The claims in the district by proper development will prove to be worthy the interest taken in them by capitalists. By Raymond buying an interest in this district it has given a new impetus to the mining interests there. Miners are returning and starting in to work, and we will soon have good accounts from all the mines there.

REGISTRATION.—In order to facilitate the registration of voters Judge Knight will be in attendance from 7 to 10 o'clock each evening at the room over Danner & Pierson's saloon on Main street. This is a convenient locality and miners and others engaged during the day will be able to register without loss of time or personal inconvenience. Voters will recollect that there is no charge for registering and that payment of the poll tax is not now necessary to entitle electors to be placed on the lists.

An important suit has been commenced against the Raymond & Ely by the Kentucky S. M. Company. The plaintiffs allege that defendants are in possession of certain mining ground which is the property of the plaintiff, and asks for the restitution thereof with \$1,000,000 damages. Messrs. Bishop & Sabin are the attorneys of record for the plaintiff.

NAMES REGISTERED.—Yesterday afternoon there were 456 names entered by the Registry Agent. This is proceeding but slowly, and we again call the attention of voters to the necessity of having their names enrolled at once. The matter should not be left to the last moment, as sickness, absence or pressing business may prevent registration.

Frank Klaine, formerly chief engineer of the Meadow Valley Company, has resigned his position at the Dry Valley mill, and has now started in as engineer at the Hermosa Mining Company's hoisting works. Frank is known as one of the best engineers on the coast.

BULLION FOR SEPTEMBER.—The total bullion shipped from this place during the month of September is \$450,865.42, which is at the rate of \$5,410,335.04 pr annum, or \$17,340.08 each working day. This certainly makes a good showing for our camp.

CONSOLIDATED.—The stage lines to Bullionville have consolidated. Two daily lines will be run each way as heretofore. The line is now owned by Messrs. Worley & Warren, who will do their best to accommodate the public.
