QUEER EXPLANATIONS.

On Saturday evening the Review said:

The people are indebted to Pete Miller and Harry Henderson for a square record of the infamous proceedings of which we publish a synopsis on the second page.

On Monday they went back on these gentlemen in the following:

We do not wish to be understood, in our article on County Commissioners, in Saturday's issue, as saying that the facts and figures therein contained were furnished us by P. B. Miller and W. H. Henderson, but their books would show the facts as stated.

Yet in the same issue it says that Mr. Henderson, the Auditor, made the estimate. Again on Saturday it said:

aking this as a basis of calculation, it is evident that to-day its indebtedness should be next to nothing, seeing that there were no old debts of 1867-70 to pay and that the pres. Bd had the use of nearly \$5,000 of surplus money transferred to them by the Republican administration.

On Monday it makes the matter still worse by the following lucid explanation:

In the expose of county matters which appeared in the Review of Saturday, we stated that on the 31st of December, 1870, the indebtedness of the county did not exceed \$10,000. This was the estimate made by the Auditor. Since then the official report for that quarter has been examined, and the true sum found to be \$11,982.97, making a difference of \$1,982.97 against our figures.

From all this, the only matter that is clear, is that the Review is not very clear on what it does mean. It is like Harold Skimpole in Bleak House—figures always confuse it.

H. C. Johnson has accepted the challenge from Mr. Adams to run a foot race in this city of one hundred yard heats, best three in five.

Wood in Virginia, since the burning of the American Flat tunnel, is selling at \$25 per cord, and we doubt not the price will be considerably advanced before the road is in running order again.

The new steamer sent East for by Washoe Engine Company, No. 4, Virginia, will be shipped on the 1st of November and sent over the big railroad in a hurry.

Gov. Booth and J. P. Jones spoke at Dayton on the 25th; Gov. Woods at Carson on the 26th. Col. M. N. Stone addressed the citizens of Virginia City on the 26th; General R. M. Clarke those of Genoa on the 28th.

About 12 o'clock yesterday, one of the coaches of the Virginia and Truckee Railroad company, standing on the main track, caught fire from the heat of the stove in the rear end.

STATE ITEMS.

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GENERAL NEWS.

Mr. E. M. Havens, a correspondent of the Utah Mining Journal, has been examining the Goose Creek Mining District and says "nothing of much value appears in sight."

We learn from Mr. L. G. Woolley, agent of the U. P. R., that from date and until further notice, the rate on ore and bulion from Ogden to Omaha will be \$12 per ton of 2,000 lbs.

The Salt Lake News says: A number of very handsome buggies passed through the city to-day, said to be the property of Charles Ely, who, it is reported, has purchased a splendid lot of carriages and some very fine horses with the view of furnishing a livery stable in Pioche.

We find in the Salt Lake News of the 23d that the empanelling of the jury in the mining suit, between the Illinois Tunnel Company of Utah, and the Emma Mining Company of London, was completed this morning.

Specials from St. Louis represent the smallpox raging there fearfully and states that the number of cases in the third week of October was over two hundred.

Another expedition in search of the mythical treasure of the Cocos Island will soon leave San Francisco. The visionaries have purchased the schooner J. D. Saurbome, and are fitting her out for the voyage.

The monthly return of "pure silver" received by the New Jersey Milling and Furnace Company, from their works in Ophir City, Utah, for the month of September, 1872, is \$2,823.60.

Mr. Earl, agent of the U. P. R. at Ogden, informs us that 150 men have been sent out on the first hundred and fifty miles of the road east of Ogden, to make what ever needed preparations may be required for winter.

Colonel M. N. Stone, of Virginia City, while on his way back from Empire, where he had been addressing a Democratic meeting last evening, was stopped by two highwaymen and robbed of a gold watch and chain and \$60 in coin.

We learn from the Enterprise that the work of erecting the new Odd Fellows' building, on the corner of C and Smith streets, is going forward rapidly.

L. Rhodes, a teamster who was in the employ of Flunkhorn, hauling lumber from General Marlette's mill north of Carson, came to his death about 6 o'clock last evening.
