WOODS DISCHARGED.—It will be remembered by our readers that on the afternoon of the 20th ult., James Woods stabbed and killed a man named Wm. McCarty at Panaca Flat. As stated by us the morning after the occurrence, the two men had been playing cards, and at the end of the game Woods accused the other two of playing unfairly. This was denied, and McCarty called Woods a s-n of a b-h. Woods offered to go out and fight, but McCarty declined. Woods then left and soon after returned with a large knife. A gentleman present tried to induce Woods to give up the knife, and had almost succeeded in getting it away from him, when McCarty came in and struck Woods a heavy blow. Woods then used the knife with fatal effect. He surrendered himself to an officer and was taken to jail. His examination before a committing magistrate was purposely and properly deferred until the Grand Jury could investigate it, and yesterday, after hearing the evidence in the case, the Grand Jury ignored the bill and Woods was set at liberty. We never thought that Woods should be convicted, and feared that the circumstances of the killing might lead to a verdict of guilty before a petit jury, believing that an innocent man stood more in danger of conviction than a guilty one.

COUNTY HOSPITAL.—We visited this institution yesterday, and from E. S. Williams, the steward, we gathered some statistics of the hospital for the month of November: In hospital, Nov. 1, 17; admitted during the month, 22; died, 2; discharged cured, 15; in hospital Nov. 30, 22. None of the patients are dangerously ill, all are convalescing, and several will soon be able to go to work again. The hospital is in good condition as possible; it is well provisioned, kept warm and comfortable, and it is too small for the number of patients now occupying it. Dr. Deal is the attending physician.

COUNTY JAIL.—Yesterday morning there were eight prisoners in the County Jail, two of whom were charged with murder, three were serving out fines imposed by the Justice of the Peace for Pochie, one is an insane man, one is in on a charge of robbery, and another is awaiting examination. Since interviewing the Jailer, Woods, charged with murder, has been discharged.

DR. C. G. FOLTZ, formerly County Physician, has left for the celebrated Paso Robles Hot Springs, in San Luis Obispo county, Cal. The Doctor is suffering from the effects of a tumor on the liver, and it is hoped his sojourn at the Springs will restore him to health.

THE FIRST RAILROAD IN POCICHE.

Yesterday was the time set for putting in motion the cars of the Pochie and Bullionville Railroad. The announcement of the event in our columns yesterday morning, drew a large crowd to the summit near the head of Meadow Valley street, being attracted by the interest felt in the success of the enterprise, and a just pride in the energy of the gentlemen who projected the first railroad in Eastern Nevada. The locomotive bearing the name of our fellow-citizen Col. C. W. Lightner was first fired up, to which were attached the cars for the accommodation of those who wished to avail themselves of Gen. Page's invitation to take the first railroad ride in Pochie. The cars were run around Spring Mountain as far as the old Meadow Valley office, and the loudest cheering and the wildest enthusiasm of the multitude. The locomotive is a four-wheeled driver, the cylinder 8 inches in diameter and 15 inch-stroke, fire bed 24x30, tank on engine boiler to hold about 300 gallons of water. The whole machinery worked to a charm, considering that it is all new and had never been used. The locomotive is from the works of Dawson & Bailey, Pittsburgh, Pa. Gen. Page is President of the company; Col. Carter, Superintendent; New Churchman, master mechanic and engineer. The road is what is termed the broad narrow gauge, being 36 inches between the rails. The work on the road is progressing satisfactorily, and under its present efficient management will be in running order early in January.
